

Lindsay City Council Election To Be Held Tuesday, March 3

Friday, February 06, is the last day to apply for voter registration in order to be eligible to vote in the March 3, City of Lindsay Municipal Election, according to Garvin County Election Board Secretary, Cathy Brinley.

Ms. Brinley said that persons who are United States citizens, residents of Oklahoma and at least 18 years old may apply to become registered voters.

Persons who have never been registered to vote before or who are not currently registered in the county of their residence and persons who are registered but who need to change their registration information may apply to register or to change name, address or political affiliation, by filling out and mailing an Oklahoma Voter Registration Application form in time for it to be postmarked no later than Friday, February 6.

Ms. Brinley said that applications postmarked after

that time still will be accepted, but the applications will not be approved until after March 3.

The County Election Board will respond in writing to each person who submits an application for voter registration. The response will be either a Voter Identification Card listing the new voter's precinct number and polling place location or a letter that explains the reason or reasons the application for voter registration was not approved. Brinley said that any person who has submitted a voter registration application and who has not received a response within 30 days should contact the County Election Board office.

Oklahoma Voter Registration Application forms are available at the County Election Board office located at the Garvin County Courthouse, Room 8, at most Tag Agencies and they can be down loaded from <http://www.elections.state.ok.us/>

SCMRC Achieves Long Sought After Goal

South Central Medical and Resource Center has achieved the long sought after goal of becoming a Federally Qualified Health Center Look Alike, the first in the state of Oklahoma. Since opening its doors February 1, 2007, SCMRC has operated under the guidelines of this federal program, one of the most important features being that all uninsured patient's charges are based on income and family size. This translates into a \$10 office visit charge for many patients.

The FQHC Look Alike status is significant, according to Director Melissa Busby. "Being deemed a Look Alike provides us with additional funds that allow us to continue to provide health

care for our community at prices that are affordable for everyone." Look Alike status is especially difficult to achieve, as clinics are required to operate as if they are receiving the benefits of the program without the additional revenue to offset the costs. "This would never have come to be without the support and dedication of our community," said Busby. "We are a non-profit, community owned and governed organization. Access to health care is a challenge nationwide. Participation in this federal program helps insure that quality, affordable health care will always be available right here in our community."

SCMRC is a non profit

organization and community board governed. Board members include president Lynn Scruggs, vice-president Doyle Greteman, secretary Mike Somers, treasurer, Sherwood Eastman, and members William Belknap, Kim Boeckman, Penny Herndon, John Martin, Todd Parker, Jeanette Rogers, Isidro Teran, and Debbie Whitehead.

SCMRC provides primary care for all ages, prenatal care, and behavioral health services. The clinic is open Monday through Friday. Hours are Monday and Wednesday 7 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Tuesday and Thursday, 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Friday 7 a.m. to 11 a.m. They are closed for lunch from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m.

Matchbook Memories

CLIFFORD BALL A LEGEND PASSES

Clifford Ball left this earth on January 22, 2009, at the age of ninety-two. Clifford was a long-time farmer-rancher in the Bradley-Alex area. His family was a pioneer family in Bradley soon after the town was established. Clifford may have known and lived more of the history of Bradley and Alex than any other person alive when he left this life. His outgoing personality, his easy smile, and his wonderful stories made him a memorable character.

Clifford's father, Ben Ball, and his uncle, Joe Ball, were early-day Bradley businessmen. Ben Ball was a broomcorn buyer who had a broomcorn warehouse near the Bradley railroad depot. His broomcorn buying business thrived until the railroad was abandoned and the rails sold for scrap iron to support the war effort in 1942-43. The railroad tracks ran near the new Bradley School. I recall seeing the tracks being taken up when I was in the fifth grade. With no way to ship the broomcorn, Ben Ball's business soon closed.

Clifford told me about a business his father founded in Bradley. Clifford remembered when his father and A.T. Brown opened a hardware store in Bradley across the street from where the Bradley School would later be built. Ben Ball and A.T. Brown built a two-story rock building that housed the new hardware store. The two men were brothers-in-law, with A.T. Brown married to Ben Ball's sister. In a few years, Ben Ball sold his share of the business and building to A.T. Brown, who operated the store until the mid-1940s. In 1944, I recall sitting on the fence in front of Bradley School and watching

German POWs carrying boxes and tubs of small items up the outside stairs to be stored on the second floor. On the second floor, some coffins were stored, left over from the days when hardware stores sold coffins. Clifford told some wonderful Bradley stories from those days.

Clifford bought a farm near Alex in 1935, where he lived until 2004 when his health began to fail. In 2002, my friend, Gail Poole, and I spent several hours visiting with Clifford in his home south of Alex. He told us about building one part of his house in 1936 then adding to it as the years went by. As we sat in his comfortable home, he described how the house grew and the farm expanded and flourished. He built a dairy barn across the road and for many years operated a prosperous dairy. By farming, ranching, and operating a dairy, Clifford prospered. The oil industry contributed to his success. Clifford used his intelligence and hard work to become an outstanding citizen in the Alex community.

A chance encounter that my wife and I had with Clifford in 2002 characterizes the kind of person he was. As we entered the Alex Cafe, we saw Clifford sitting at a table talking to Carl and Lee Stephenson. Clifford was wearing an interesting cap. On the front was an emblem and the words "Authentic Antique Farmer." We could see some words printed on the back of the cap. My wife was determined to read those words before we left.

Clifford came over to our table to talk. He said that when he got his Lindsay News, the first thing he did was turn to my "Matchbook Memories" column

and read it through. After we had talked some Bradley talk and told some Bradley stories, my wife asked to see his cap. On the back were stitched the words, "Been There. Done That. Still Plowin'." What a perfect cap to reflect that man who had lived so much of the history of Bradley and Alex and had witnessed so much of the life of those two towns through the years. If the cap reflected the man, surely Clifford Ball wore the perfect cap.

Clifford Ball was buried in the Alex Cemetery on Saturday, January 24, 2009. Only a short distance from that cemetery stands the farm where Clifford lived for seventy years. Clifford returned to the land he loved after a long, productive life which will long be remembered by his family, his friends, and his community.

If you meet the income requirement you can call the Regional Food Bank at 428-2459 to reserve your pick up. Please do not call the church. For the month of February the pick up date will be Saturday the 14 at the Lindsay United Methodist Church located at 114 W. Chickasaw from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. It is important to call and sign up before the distribution day.

If you are unable to pick up the food items by the times posted and cannot make proper arrangements, the order will be given to other qualifying families.

LPD To Hold March Against Meth Day

The Lindsay Police Department and the Lindsay Elementary and Middle Schools will observe March Against Meth Day Thursday, March 12 at 1:15 p.m. The fourth annual event will be in memory of all law enforcement who have lost their lives due to drugs.

The March will be in honor of Trooper Rocky Eales #632 who was killed in the line of duty September 24, 1999 while trying to serve a search warrant at a residence in rural Sequoyah County. Trooper Eales was involved in drug interdiction with the Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs during his career.

They will march from the school on Chickasaw east to SW Second then north to Choctaw.

They will march east to Main Street and then south. They will stop briefly in front of KBLP so that a DARE student can draw the winning ticket in the DARE bike raffle.

They will continue south to Creek Street. The march will then proceed west on Creek back to the school.

Free Tax Services Offered

In recognition of efforts to help put more money in the pockets of working Oklahomans, Governor Brad Henry declared January 30 as Earned Income Tax Credit and VITA Site Awareness Day.

Tax return filing season has begun and local non-profit organizations are teaming up with community partners to prepare and electronically file federal and state returns without charge for thousands of low and moderate income Oklahoma families. Some tribes and most military installations will have sites. AARP will operate sites specializing in seniors.

Locally, Delta Community Action will be offering this service. The service will be available on Thursdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at 308 SW 2nd in Lindsay.

As increasing numbers of working families and individuals are struggling financially, trained preparers at these free tax preparation sites, called Volunteer Income Tax Assistance or VITA sites, will help eligible families apply for a federal earned income tax credit (EITC). This year, eligible families can get as much as \$4,824 from the tax credit.

The EITC helps working

Oklahomans bridge the gap between minimum wage and a living wage. It ensures that Oklahoma's business community, particularly small businesses, will continue to find an affordable pool of workers by providing an incentive for low-income family members to continue working when wages alone do not cover the cost of living.

While the EITC benefits both business and workers it also provides a multimillion dollar stimulus to our economy. Over 63,000 Oklahomans claimed the tax credit bringing in over \$128,000,000 to Oklahoma's economy. Yet thousands more who were eligible did not claim it. Generally, families with a household income of less than \$40,000, or singles with income of less than \$12,800 are eligible.

Free assistance with EITC eligibility and free tax return preparation is available at VITA sites across the state. Sixteen members of the Oklahoma Association of Community Action Agencies and their partners will staff VITA sites in more than 60 communities. Tall Tales

As I gazed out my window this morning, (Tuesday) it was both a welcome and un-welcome sight. Welcome because we had received some much-needed moisture. Unwelcome because it meant another day of watching the weathermen and trying to determine at what point we could resume school.

Monday was an interesting day, as, after watching the weather forecasts Sunday evening, we got up early and tested the roads. Fortunately, we were able to get through the school day, as the temperatures hovered above freezing.

After reviewing the weather forecasts all day, we made a determination that it would in all likelihood not be feasible to have school today (Tuesday.) It was one of those times when we could make the decision early enough to let our faculty and students know a day ahead of time.

Now, as I sit here at my computer, writing this column and visiting with fellow superintendents in the area about what to do about tomorrow (Wednesday) the fact comes to mind that each school district is unique in its road conditions, and that in order to make the best informed decision, we need to weigh many factors.

I'm sure most of you recall two winters ago when we missed four days of school in succession because of an ice storm somewhat similar to this week. During that time, it was fairly simple to make the decision for the next day simply because of the extremely low temperatures and the fact that conditions were not improving.

Even though we have some bad weather days built into our calendar, it is easy to use them up pretty quickly when we experience the type

of weather we have had this week.

The question was raised as to whether we would dismiss school early Monday because of the imminent weather. Let me re-iterate that we will rarely do this. We feel it would create too much of a problem for many of our households who may not have parents at home if those small children come home early.

Parents are always welcome to pick up their children early if they feel they must. However, in the best interests of the majority of our students, we feel it is usually safer to keep them until regular dismissal time. We never say never because there could always be the threat of blizzard conditions, but under most circumstances, we will not dismiss early.

Last, but not least, let me emphasize once again that we will make the best decision we can based on the information available. It is physically impossible to drive every road in our district before making that determination.

If we decide to have school and you, as a responsible parent or guardian, feel the roads in your area are unsafe, you have the right to keep your child at home. We do ask that if you make that determination, please call the principal's office and let them know in order that they might be excused.

As you basketball fans know, we postponed Monday night's junior high games and Tuesday night's high school games. It has not been determined yet as to if, or when, those games will be able to be played.

Hopefully by the time this column is read, the roads will be substantially clear and we will be back in school. Until then, we pray that you will stay safe.

Disaster Declaration For All Of Oklahoma

With much of Oklahoma being impacted by an ice storm, Gov. Brad Henry today declared a State of Emergency for all 77 counties in the state.

"Oklahomans know all too well that severe winter weather poses serious challenges to everything from roads and power lines to debris removal, and so it is important that we be prepared for the worst," the Governor said.

The executive order marks a first step toward seeking federal assistance should it be necessary.

Additionally, the executive order allows state agencies to make emergency purchases and acquisitions needed to expedite the delivery of resources to local jurisdictions.

The Governor also issued an executive order aimed at helping utility crews handle storm-related repairs, allowing a 30-day waiver on permit requirements for use of overweight and oversized vehicles.

In the meantime, Gov. Henry is in close contact with state emergency management officials to determine the needs of areas impacted by the storm.

The Governor urged Oklahomans to be careful and cautious in the midst of the storm.

"I would urge motorists to slow down or, better yet, stay off the roads if they can," the Governor said.

Drivers Encouraged To Drive Safely During Icy Weather

Driving in winter conditions requires planning, patience and special skills.

PLAN AHEAD

Check weather conditions in the areas you'll be driving. Choose major routes.

Allow extra time to get there.

Carry an emergency kit including jumper cables, ice scraper, snow brush, warm clothing, windshield washer solvent, working flashlight, orange triangles or flares, bag of abrasive material such as clay-based kitty litter or sand,

first aid kit with extra bandages and, most importantly, a cellular telephone with charger cord.

If you have a rear-wheel-drive vehicle, place added weight in the car trunk or pickup bed for greater traction. Cinder blocks work well.

Dress in layers.

Clear off all windows.

Turn on your lights.

AS YOU ARE DRIVING

Remember that bridges and overpasses will ice up first.

Anticipate the flow of traffic to avoid sudden stops or quick lane changes.

Increase following distances to eight to ten seconds.

All vehicles take about the same distance to stop, whether 4-wheel drive or not.

Do not use cruise control when driving on any slippery surface.

If you start to skid, don't panic, let up on the brake or accelerator and look and steer in the direction you want the front of your vehicle to go.

Be aware that your vehicle's traction is greatest just before your wheels start to spin.

Ordinance No. 457

An ordinance of the mayor and council of the City of Lindsay, Garvin County, State of Oklahoma, amending chapter 7, animals and fowls, Article II dogs, Division 1 generally, Sections 7-24 and 7-25 of the City of Lindsay Code of Ordinances; providing for severability; and declaring an emergency.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Lindsay, Oklahoma:

Section 1. Chapter 7, Animals and Fowls, Article II, Dogs, Divisions 1 generally, Section 7-24 of the City of Lindsay Code of Ordinances is hereby amended and shall hereinafter read as follows:

Sec. 7-24:Definitions:

1. "Dangerous dog" means any dog that:

a. has inflicted severe injury on a human being without provocation on public or private property,

b. when unprovoked inflicts bites on a human either on public or private property,

c. when unprovoked kills or severely injures or kills a domestic animal either on public or private property,

d. has been previously found to be potentially dangerous, the owner having received notice of such by the animal control authority in writing and the dog thereafter aggressively bites, attacks, or endangers the safety of humans, or

e. has been previously found to be potentially dangerous, the owner having received notice of such by the animal control authority in writing and the dog thereafter aggressively bites, attacks, or endangers the safety of another domestic animal;

2. "Potentially dangerous dog" means any dog that:

a. when unprovoked makes threatening actions towards humans resulting in fear, injury, death, or dismemberment,

b. when unprovoked aggressively bites, attacks, or endangers the safety of humans, or

c. when unprovoked aggressively bites, attacks, or endangers the safety of another domestic animal;

3. "Severe Injury" means any physical injury that results in broken bones or lacerations requiring multiple sutures or cosmetic surgery.

4. "Proper enclosure of a dangerous or potentially dangerous dog" means, while on the owner's property, a dangerous or potentially dangerous dog shall be securely confined indoors or in a securely enclosed and locked pen or structure with at least one hundred fifty (150) square feet of space for each dog kept therein which is over six (6) months of age, and which is suitable to prevent the entry of children and designed to prevent the animal from escaping. Such pen or structure shall have secure sides and a secure top, and shall also provide protection from the elements for the dog;

5. "Owner" means any person, firm, corporation, organization, or department possessing, harboring, keeping, having an interest in, or having control or custody of an animal;

6. "Attack" means the act by any dog of approaching a domestic animal or person in such a manner that hostile contact with the other animal or person occurs, or an act of aggression against a person or domestic animal that requires the person or the other animal to take evasive action to prevent injury.

Section 2. Chapter 7, Animals and Fowls, Article II Dogs, Division 1, generally, Section 7-25 of the City of Lindsay Code of Ordinances is hereby amended and shall hereinafter read as follows:

Sec. 7-25 Registration of dangerous and potential dangerous dogs.

(a) It is unlawful for an owner to have a dangerous or potentially dangerous dog within the municipal boundaries without obtaining a certificate of registration issued under this section. This section shall not apply to dogs used by law enforcement officials for police work.

(b) The city clerk shall issue a certificate of registration to the owner of a dangerous or potentially dangerous dog if the owner presents to the city clerk:

(1) Sufficient evidence of a proper enclosure to confine a dangerous or potential dangerous dog and the posting of the premises with a clearly visible warning sign that there is a dangerous or potentially dangerous dog on the property. In addition, the owner shall conspicuously display a sign with a warning symbol that informs children of the presence of a dangerous or potentially dangerous dog.

(2) Sufficient evidence of a policy of liability insurance, such as homeowner's insurance, or surety bond, issued by an insurer qualified under Title 36, of the Oklahoma Statutes in the amount of not less than fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000.00) insuring the owner for any personal injuries inflicted by the dangerous or potentially dangerous dog; and

(3) Two (2) color photographs of the animal clearly showing the color and approximate size of the animal.

(c) Before any certificate of registration shall be issued under the provisions of this division the applicant therefor shall pay to the City Clerk an annual license fee of ten dollars (\$10.00).

(d) The owner of a dog that has been declared "dangerous" or "potentially dangerous" shall register the dog, as required under this section, and comply with all requirements of this chapter within twenty (20) days of receiving notice that the dog has been declared "dangerous" or "potentially dangerous".

Section 3 Severability

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction said portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holdings shall not effect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

Section 4 Emergency

It being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public health, peace and safety of the citizens of the City of Lindsay and the inhabitants thereof, an emergency is hereby declared to exist by reason whereof this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect as from and after its passage and approval is provided by law.

Ordinance No. 458

An Ordinance of the Mayor and Council of the City of Lindsay, Garvin County, State of Oklahoma, amending Chapter 31, traffic, Article I in General, Section 31-1 and Chapter 31, Traffic, Article 1, in General, Section 31-20 of the City of Lindsay Code of Ordinances; providing for severability; and declaring an emergency.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Lindsay, OK:

Section 1. Chapter 31 Traffic, Article I in General, Section 31-1 of the City of Lindsay Code of Ordinances is hereby amended and shall hereinafter read as follows:

Sec. 31-1 Definitions.

For the purposes of this chapter, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings respectively ascribed to them:

Golf Cart: a motor vehicle primarily designed for carrying golfers and their equipment over a golf course.

Section 2. Chapter 31 Traffic, Article I in General, Section 31-20 of the City of Lindsay Code of Ordinances is hereby amended and shall hereinafter read as follows:

Sec. 31-20. Operation of Golf Carts on City Streets.

Pursuant to 47 O.S.§11-116 (C)(1), golf carts may be operated on city streets subject to the following conditions:

(1) the owner of the golf cart must first obtain a permit from the City Clerk of the City of Lindsay,

(a) before a permit is issued, the golf cart shall undergo an inspection by the Chief of Police to insure that the golf cart meets all requirements of state law and any section of this Chapter,

(b) upon approval of the Chief of Police, the City Clerk of the City of Lindsay shall issue said permit

(c) the permit fee shall be \$25 and shall be renewed annually at a cost of \$25.

(2) the operation of golf carts on city streets shall only occur during daylight hours;

(3) the gold cart shall be equipped with brake lights, head lights, turn signals, and horn;

(4) no golf cart shall be operated on city streets with posted street limits greater than thirty-five (35) miles per hour;

(5) the operator of such golf cart shall possess a valid driver license and be at least twenty-five (25) years old;

(6) the golf cart shall not be operated on a state highway, unless making a perpendicular crossing of a state highway located within the boundaries of the City of Lindsay;

(7) the owner and/or operator of the golf cart shall maintain liability insurance covering the golf cart in the amount required by 47 O.S.§ 7-324;

(8) it shall be unlawful for any person to operate a golf cart in a manner prohibited by state law or any section of this Chapter.

Section 3. Severability

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction said portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holdings shall not effect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance.

Section 4. Emergency

It being immediately necessary for the preservation of the public health, peace, and safety of the citizens of the City of Lindsay and the inhabitants thereof, an emergency is hereby declared to exist by reason whereof, this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect as from and after its passage and approval as provided by law.


