

Lindsay Drinking Water Tests Raise Concern

The City of Lindsay recently tested the quality of Lindsay's drinking water. Recent tests have shown coliform bacteria in the Lindsay PWA water. The water system violated a drinking water standard. The incident was not deemed an emergency, but the City of Lindsay felt the customers had a right to know the situation.

The water is routinely monitored for drinking water contaminants. Eleven samples of water were tested for the presence of coliform bacteria during December 2007 and three of the samples showed the presence of total coliform bacteria. The standard is that no more than one sample pr month/5 percent of samples may do so.

There is no need to boil water or take other corrective actions. However, if you have specific health concerns, consult your doctor. People with severely compromised immune systems, infants, and some elderly may be at increased risk. Those people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. General guidelines on ways to lessen the risk of infection by microbes are available from EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

This is not an emergency, during an emergency citizens would have been notified immediately. Coliform bacteria are generally not harmful themselves. Coliforms are bacteria which are naturally present in the environment and are used as in indicator that other, potentiallyharmful, bacteria may be present. Coliforms were found in more samples than allowed and this was a warning of potential problems.

Usually, coliforms are a sign that there could be a problem with the systems treatment or distribution system (pipes). Whenever we detect coliform bacteria in any sample, followup testing is done to see if other bacteria of greater concern, such

as fecal coliform or E.coli, are present. No bacteria was found in subsequent testing.

The distribution system has been disinfected and additional samples do not show presence of coliform bacteria.

Two Killed In Plane Crash--

Lindsay Mourns Loss Of Bronc Jackson

Lindsay lost one of it's own Saturday. Local veterinarian and school board member Bronc Jackson lost his life in a plane crash north of the Lindsay Airport.

Bronc owned Jackson Animal Clinic in Lindsay and Arbuckle Veterinary Clinic in

He was on the Lindsay School Board for 13 years. Bronc was running for reelection to his school board

Doyle Greteman, superintendent of Lindsay Schools said, "He leaves some big shoes to fill, and a hole in Lindsay's heart.

Jackson and Joe Grimes, of Maysville were pronounced dead at the scene.

According to Oklahoma Highway Patrol Captain Chris West the crashed plane is a 2006 Cirrus SR22, a fixedwing single-engine, propellerdriven aircraft.

West went on to say the plane crashed about 5:30 p.m. Also killed in the crash was in an isolated area just north Joe Grimes, 52 of Maysville. of Lindsay Municipal Airport near Highway 59B.

> The plane lost altitude for an unknown reason and burst into flames upon impact, igniting a small grass fire that emergency crews extinguished, West said.

> The plane, bearing tail number N824Bj, was registered in Jackson's name at a Lindsay address. It was certified airworthy by the Federal Aviation Administration.

> The National Transportation Safety Board personnel from Dallas were on the scene Sunday to investigate the crash. The cause of the crash is still under investigation.

Citizens Of Lindsay Voice **Concerns Over Treadwell Case**

Nearly 50 people showed up at the City Council Chambers last Thursday to hear from A.D.A. George Burnett and to share their views concerning the Mike Treadwell case.

Burnett hosted over 18 interviews with REC members. The case is proceeding as usual and trial was still in the preliminary stages Burnett said. Burnett is working with Treadwell's attorney in pretrial negotiations.

According to court documents, Treadwell was

accused of embezzlement and falsifying corporation records while in a leadership role at the Rural Electric Cooperative offices in Lindsay. Treadwell was released on bond and is awaiting a preliminary hearing.

According to the Oklahoma District Court Records, the preliminary hearing has been rescheduled for 10 a.m. on Friday, February 29th.

The Treadwell family was contacted for comment. They chose not to comment at this time.

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Matchbook Memories

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTIONS **PART I**

This week, we vote in the presidential primary. It will be our first vote leading up to the presidential election in November. As I listened to the last appeals of the candidates and as I cast my vote, I thought back to my memories of the presidential elections I can recall. I can remember the last twelve presidents, some who served more than one term. Of the last twelve presidents, six were Democrats, and six were Republicans. And each one seemed to meet the demands of the era in which he served. Perhaps the President shaped the years during which he served, or perhaps the events of the time shaped the President. That historical question has always intrigued me. Does the President shape history, or does history shape the President?

In the Nineteenth Century, the great English essayist Thomas Carlyle wrote a series of essays in which he argued that the history of the world is actually the history of great men. Others countered with the argument that leaders in history are shaped by the events which they cannot control. If we applied these theories to the American presidents from Franklin Roosevelt to George W., Bush, we could raise some interesting questions of our own. And our own personal answers to the questions might be influenced by our own political beliefs. Democrats and Republicans would surely reach different conclusions based both on history and their own political beliefs.

Before I begin to attempt to apply the question of "Do men make history, or does history make men?" I must first say that I was born a Republican. My father was a conservative Republican. I grew up listening to his political beliefs. I was born in November of 1932, the month that Franklin D. Roosevelt was elected President for the first time. For the first thirteen years of my life, President Roosevelt was the only President our country had known. Since that time, I have observed eleven more Presidents, have studied their actions and the history of their time, and have voted in every election since Eisenhower's presidency. Even though I have remained a Republican, I consider myself an independent thinker, one who votes for the person, not the party. Even though my political friends tell me this is a futile practice, I feel good inside when I vote this way.

Many Americans considered Franklin D. Roosevelt the savior of our nation in the bitter years of the Great Depression. When President Roosevelt was elected in 1932, America was mired in the greatest economic depression the nation had ever known. President Herbert Hoover, a Republican, had become the symbol for economic disaster. Although the entire world was in a great economic depression, President Hoover was blamed for America's plight. Historians today are not so ready to place all of the blame on Hoover, but the Americans of that era blamed Hoover for our disaster.

When President Roosevelt took office in January, 1933, he immediately began drastic measures to solve the problems of the times. With the American people and Congress behind him, he began to create organizations to start America on the road to recovery. The National Recovery Act provided money and the power to bring about change through such organizations as the WPA and the CCC to put people to work. With his intellect, vision, and power to persuade people, Roosevelt changed the course of history. Without his charisma,

his program would have been impossible to implement. Even his enemies recognized his skill as a politician, although they still opposed his policies.

As prosperity began to return to America, World War II erupted in Europe and Asia. Again, Roosevelt's charisma and leadership abilities began to shape history. Just as his famous radio speeches, called "fireside chats," reassured the American people in the dark Depression days, his wartime speeches helped unite the nation in our fight for freedom. Before his death on April 12, 1945, Roosevelt had become not only the leader of the most powerful nation on earth, but also the recognized leader of the Allied Forces, which would soon defeat the Axis and bring peace to the world once again.

Some of Roosevelt's political opponents would argue that his legendary success and fame were a result of the times. They would say that the economic depression had reached its natural end and that recovery was bound to happen. Others would say that World War II demanded a strong leader, who was a product of the times. But who could imagine Wendall Wilkie or Thomas Dewey as world leaders? And who could conceive of these two opponents of Roosevelt as men who could earn the respect of men as powerful as Winston Churchill and Joseph Stalin?

In my opinion, Franklin D. Roosevelt was an excellent example of Thomas Carlyle's belief that men make history. I cannot believe the opposing philosophy that had there been no Franklin Roosevelt, history would have created someone to take his

As we begin the process to choose a new President, Carlyle's question arises again. Are we about to elect a strong leader who can shape history, or is history waiting to find a person who will be swept along by world events? The next few months will answer that all-important question.



Financial Focus

When Can You Start Tapping Into Sources of Retirement Income?

When you retire, it would be convenient if all your expenses were to "retire" as well. But they won't. In fact, you'll likely need between 80 percent and 100 percent of your pre-retirement income to maintain your standard of living in retirement. And you may even need more, depending on what you plan to do during your retirement years. So, well before you retire, ask yourself a couple of key questions: Where will the money come

from? And when can I get at it?

Let's take a look at some of your likely retirement income "pools," along with the rules governing withdrawals from these sources.

401(k) plan - If you have a 401(k) plan at work, take full advantage of it. Your earnings have the potential to grow on a tax-deferred basis and you typically contribute pre-tax dollars, so the more you put in, the lower your adjusted annual taxable income. Generally, you have to be at least 59-1/2 to withdraw money from your 401(k) without incurring a penalty of 10 percent of the taxable amount of your withdrawal. However, you can avoid

this penalty under the following circumstances:

You leave your employer when you are at least 55 or you become disabled.

You take a series of equal periodic payments, made at least annually, for your life or life expectancy.

You "roll over" your 401(k) withdrawals into an IRA. Of course, you may not want, or need, to tap into your 401(k) at either age 55 or 59-1/2. If that's the case, you can leave your account alone and, hopefully, watch it continue to have the potential to grow. But you will have to start taking withdrawals when you reach 70-1/2, if you haven't already done so.

IRA - As is the case with your 401(k), you will, in most cases, have to pay a 10 percent tax penalty if you take distributions from your IRA before age 59-1/2. And you must begin taking required minimum distributions from a Traditional IRA once you reach 70-1/2. If you have a Roth IRA, you face no mandatory distribution rules, so you never have to touch the money, which means it can potentially grow tax-free for years.

Social Security - You can start taking Social Security when you reach 62, but your monthly payments will only be about 70 percent to 75 percent - the exact amount depends on your age - of your payments if you waited until your reached "full" retirement age, which is probably 66 or 67. (Social Security determines your full retirement age by your year of birth.)

When we heard the news about Bronc Jackson's death, it seemed so surreal. How do you describe the impact his passing has on this community? It's difficult, when one realizes how many lives he touched.

He served on the board for 13 years. Witty and professional, he always encouraged us to pursue excellence in education for our students, and supported us in that endeavor. He was a strong board member, but he never confused strength with rigidity. His mental toughness was matched by his compassion and open-minded approach.

Permanently ingrained in my mind is the vision of him hustling into the board room, just a minute or two before time to start, and getting right down to business. Board meetings were always fun when he served as president.

He had an ability to always look for the good in people. When dealing with tough issues, he was a voice of reason, looking for ways to find win-win situations if at all possible.

He was also very active in church, where he was a leader as well, taking part in many activities, and serving as an apostle for several years in the dramatic production of <u>The Last Supper.</u>

His involvement in the community of Lindsay has been far-reaching. Along with the roles mentioned above, he also served as a volunteer firefighter, helped

establish the Lindsay Youth Council, and was an integral part of installing the new Skate Park, just to name a few of the activities in which he was involved. He leaves some big shoes to fill, and a hole in Lindsay's heart.

When moving here 14 years ago, I remember picking up a newspaper and seeing a story about some people who were raising money to start a sports complex for the youth. Bronc Jackson was the name quoted in the news article. I thought to myself that with a name like that, this guy would probably be somebody I would be dealing with, and hoped that he would be a reasonable person.

Needless to say, upon meeting him and getting to know him, his name was a little misleading. Although "Bronc" was a good name for him in describing his mental and physical toughness, as well as his zest for life, it didn't portray the gentle nature of the man.

I've always felt that one could tell quite a bit about a person by the way they treat animals. Bronc was an exceptional veterinarian. When dealing with his patients, he exhibited skills above and beyond medicine. According to the British author Caroline Norton, "They serve God well who serve His creatures."

We had several opportunities to witness his gift. In tribute to him, I would like to share a poem with you that was written by my wife Brenda shortly after his death:

"From the Animals"

"When we saw you from our wounded vision, we knew it would be all right.

The minute your expert hands touched us, and compassionate eyes met ours, we knew.

It was never about our owners or the meager payment required....

It was always about us.
It was about soothing ou

It was about soothing our pain and making us right.

You spoke little to our owners; you spoke to us.

You spoke in a language and tone that we always understood.

If we were skittish or afraid, your touch brought peace.

We left happy, glad to have been with you, eager to see you again.

You always knew if there was nothing more to be done.

There was no one else to whom we would rather succumb.

We knew that you had exhausted every measure.

We trusted you.

We are one of God's gifts to man.

You were one of God's gifts to us."

The Leopardettes shot 80% from the free throw line with Jones shooting 100% from the stripe.









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
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
