

Land Run Ride Of Oklahoma Makes Stop In Lindsay

30th Annual 89'er Land Run Ride of Oklahoma began at Marlow, OK. A procession of approximately 20 wagons and 35 to 40 outriders was led by president Lisa Wright, wagon master Jim Gaines, and trail boss Jonathon Cowan.

The 89'er Land Run Ride of Oklahoma celebrates 30 y ears of commemorating the spirit of Oklahoma's first settlers and pioneers. The wagon train rolled out of Marlow Saturday morning, traveling 15 miles to Rush Springs for an overnight stay at Gerald Fairchilds Arena.

Sunday morning found the wagon train traveling 17 miles to Sparks Cattle Company just south of Bradley. Monday morning the train traveled north and east and south arriving in Lindsay after traveling 15 miles.

Matchbook Memories

READING MOLLY GRIFFIS PART I

Molly Levite Griffis is an important Oklahoma literary figure. In addition to founding the Levite of Apache press, she has written a number of books that are valuable additions to the literature of Oklahoma. Her books range from an award-winning children's book to a history book about the first transcontinental foot race to a series of three novels for young readers to a historical novel about the "orphan trains" that brought immigrant New York City orphans to the frontier to begin new lives with people they had never seen. Her wide range of subjects, her wonderful storytelling talent, and her dedication to her Oklahoma heritage make these books wonderful reading for children, adolescents, and adults.

The Buffalo in the Mall is an illustrated book for children. It is a funny story about choosing a buffalo for a pet. The book contains wonderful examples of why a buffalo makes a better pet than other animals such as rabbits, gerbils, kittens, puppies, fish, and hedgehogs. The illustrations by Kim Doner are as fascinating as the rhymed text. Every page has a sly joke in both the words and the pictures. At the end of the book, the reader discovers that the buffalo is a stuffed toy buffalo. Children love this book.

The Great American Bunion Derby is the story of the first international transcontinental foot race. In 1928, a promoter named C.C. Pyle planned a cross country foot race from the Ascot Speedway in Los Angeles, California, to Madison Square Garden in New York City. The winner would receive a check for \$25,000, an enormous sum in those days. Runners from around the world entered the race. One of the runners was a twenty-yearold part-Cherokee Oklahoman named Andy Payne from Foyil, Oklahoma. The race drew worldwide attention. Newspapers from around the world covered the race with daily reports.

Much of the race route was along Route 66 from Los Angeles, California to St. Louis, Missouri, where the runners continued eastward toward New York City. The Weatherford News reported the story of the runners coming down Main Street on their journey. I knew a Weatherford man whose father took him to Bridgeport, near Hinton, to watch Andy Payne and the other runners pass along Route 66.

The Great American Bunion Derby, as the newspaper reporters named it, began in March and ended on June 14, 1928, as Andy Payne ran into the arena at Madison Square Garden in New York City, the first place winner of that remarkable race. The second place finisher was fifteen and a half hours behind Andy Payne. The thin half-Cherokee boy from Foyil, Oklahoma received the check for \$25,000 and became forever a part of Oklahoma history. He immediately wrote his trainer, Tom Young, a check for \$2,500 and allowed as how it was the best money he ever spent.

Andy Payne returned to Oklahoma, paid off his family's farm, and married his sweetheart. In future years, he would serve in World War II, graduate from law school, and serve as Supreme Court Clerk for thirty-eight years. In 1977, his "runner's heart," which had given him the courage to win the race, played out, but his spirit lives on in the many marathon races that are run each year around the country.

In The Great American Bunion Derby, Molly Griffis captures the excitement of the first

transcontinental race.

In words and pictures, she recreates that time and that unusual event. And, most of all, she pays tribute to a legendary Oklahoma hero who attributes his success to what he called his "runner's heart." To Andy Payne, a "runner's heart" had two meanings: a strong heart which gave strength and stamina and a brave heart which gave him the courage to persevere through the hardships of a 3,423 mile race through deserts, across prairies, over mountains, and through towns and cities from coast to coast. Molly Griffis has written a wonderful story about courage, determination, and the fulfillment of an American dream.







Many years ago, Al Capone virtually owned Chicago. He wasn't famous for anything heroic, but he was notorious as a boot legger, dealing in prostitution, and even murder.

Al Capone had a lawyer, a very good one, by the name of "Easy Eddie". He kept Al Capone out of jail for a long time. In appreciation, Capone provided him with a fenced, security controlled home that filled a city block and the fund to live very well. For his part, Eddie accepted it as his due.

He did have a soft spot thought, a son whom he dearly loved. Nothing was too much; price no object. And despite his involvement with organized crime, Eddie even tried to teach him right from wrong; he wanted his son to be a better man than he was. With all his wealth and influence, there were two things he couldn't give his son; he couldn't pass on a good name or a good example.

It was then that he made a decision to rectify the wrongs he had done. He would testify against Capone and the mob and he did. Within the year, Eddie was dead. Shot down on a lonely Chicago street. In his eyes, he had given

Story two started that World War II produced many heroes. One was pilot Lt. Com. Butch O'Hare. One day his squadron was sent out on a mission. It wasn't til he was ariborne that he discovered that his fuel tanks were low, and he had to return to the ship. On the way back he ran into a Japanese squadron headed toward the American fleet.

Forgetting self, he flew into them and fired til he was our of ammunition and then ran into the planes themselves. The Japanese gave up and, deeply relieved, Butch limped back to his carrier.

The film on his ship told the story, he destroyed five planes, and for that on February 20, 1941, he became the first Ace and won the Congressional Medal of Honor. A year later, he was shot down at the age of 29. His hometown honored him by naming their airport for him, O'Hare International Airport. His statue is t here and his Medal of Honor.

The connection? Butch O'Hare was "Easy Eddie's" son.



Mid-America is located one-half mile west of I-35. Take Exit 86 off of I-35 turn west onto Highway 59; we are located on the south side of Highway 59.








to see some stuff this last week. We did a lot, actually. We went to a mall, to the market, to Black Castle, and we got some new neighbors. Compared to the last three weeks, this one has been pretty busy!

I was so excited when some

We actually got out and got of our friends here on base asked us to go to the mall with them. I am a major shopaholic and it had been four months since I had been to a mall. The mall that we went to was called the M-1 mall. I'm not sure what M-1 stands for, if anything at all. M-1 mall is located about 20 miles from

here between old Adana and new Adana on the E-5 highway. The mall was pretty big and had tons of stores in it. The stores were all similar to those you would find in a mall in the U.S. One of the stores in the mall was a lot like a Wal-Mart Supercenter, which is odd to find in a mall. That stored had everything from electronics to groceries; it's called the Real (pronounced Ree-al).

Just like American malls, this one had a huge food court and toys for children to play on. We tried a famous Turkish food from a fast food restaurant. Just like in the U.S. the fast food isn't as good as a sit down restaurant, but the fast food we ate was actually really good. The friends we were with told us that it was nothing compared to the real thing. Something about this mall that you won't find in an American mall is cigarette smoke. Now, we go every time the market is held, which is every Sunday and Thursday. We buy all of our fresh fruits and vegetables there for under \$10. All the produce is very nice and very fresh. 
