

Lindsay played the third ranked Purcell Lady Dragons in a 2 team district Thursday. The Leopardettes needed to win two games to advance to regionals.

In the first game Lindsay got on the board first with a 5 run inning in the third. Natalie Foster drove in 2 runs on a single and Christina Waite drove in 3 runs on a triple. The Leopardettes scored 2 more runs in the fourth inning on a Purcell error and a Valerie Scruggs hit. Purcell came back and scored 7 runs in the bottom of the fourth to tie up the game. The score remained 7 to 7 when rain delayed the game at the top of the seventh with Christina Waite on first and 1 out. The game continued where it left off on Thursday. Neither team could score until the tenth inning when Lindsay scored 5 runs. Lindsay scored on a combination of Purcell errors and base hits by Kelsey Clary, Donna Jones with a RBI, Valerie Scruggs, Natalie Foster, and double by Courtney Robinson to score 2 runs. Purcell went 3 up and 3 down in the bottom of the tenth for the Leopardette Victory. Winning pitcher for the Leopardettes was Karri Kennedy. Leading hitters for the game were Donna Jones 3 hits, Deven Robbins 1 double, Valerie Scruggs 2 hits, Natalie Foster 3 hits, Courtney Robinson 2 hits and a double, Christina Waite a hit and a triple, and Kelsey Clary 2 hits and a double. Kylie Blough, Karri Kennedy and Tess Robbins each had 1 hit.

In the second game it was a defensive battle with Purcell coming out on top 2 to 1. Lindsay's run was scored by Karri Kennedy on a Donna Jones hit. Purcell had a total of 7 hits and Lindsay had a total of 8 hits but could not score more than 1 in the loss. Pitcher in the Leopardette loss was Karri Kennedy. Leading hitter was Karri Kennedy with 2 hits and Donna Jones, Deven Robbins, Valerie Scruggs, Christina Waite, Tess Robbins, and Kelsey Clary all with 1 hit each.

In the final game for the championship the Leopardettes scored 5 runs in the first inning to put the pressure on the Lady Dragons. Lindsay scored on 7 straight hits and an error by Purcell in the top of the first. The Leopardettes again scored in the fourth inning on a base hit by Courtney Robinson and 2 errors by Purcell. Lindsay was leading 6

to 0 when Purcell scored a run off of a leadoff double and a single. Purcell held Lindsay scoreless in the fifth inning. The Lady Dragons then scored on a 1 out homerun by freshman Chelsea Akers. The Lady Dragons then scored 2 mores runs to tighten Lindsay's lead. The score was 6 to 3 when Donna Jones got on second base on an error. Valerie Scruggs hit a single to bring Jones around when the catcher dropped the ball on the play at home. With the score 7 to 3 in the bottom of the seventh Chelsea Akers again hit a out of the park homerun on a 3-2 count. The homerun however proved the last for Purcell as Lindsay held Purcell to just 1 hit in the seventh and Donna Jones catching a flyball for the final out of the game. Matchbook Memories

READING MOLLY GRIFFIS PART II

Molly Griffis has written a series of three books for young readers. These books are entitled The Rachel Resistance, The Feester Filibuster, and Simon Says. All three of these books are set during World War II in Apache, Oklahoma. The young characters are in the fifth grade, and they are surrounded by news of the war, as we all were in those years. The young people compete in school work, play schoolyard games, and follow the news of the war in newspapers and radio reports. Rachel is the girl who plagues the lives of the boys in her class. There was always one in every class.

These three books are wonderful pictures of life in a small town in those years. The details of everyday life in those times are wonderfully presented. To help modern young readers follow the story and understand the details, Molly Griffis includes a glossary at the end of each book. The glossary is a list of words that modern young people might not understand. Words and definitions include such terms as swastika, Pearl Harbor, rationing, Jack Benny, and war bonds. Since these books are set in those World War II years, young readers need this glossary in order to experience the stories fully.

Molly Griffis describes the schools of those times very clearly. She catches the mood of the times, the simplicity of small grade schools, the innocence of the children, and the patriotism that permeated life in those years. She strikes a wonderful balance between relating the stories of childhood friendships, rivalries, and pleasures to deeper concerns of the war years in America. I was fascinated with how accurately these books presented those years as I remembered them. The descriptions of the school rooms, the small town stores, the summer pleasures and games, and even the teachers struck a responsive chord in my mind and heart. These books evoked memories long submerged in my mind. That long ago word shined anew in my memory.

The Rachel Resistance and The Feester Filibuster are funny stories about the conflicts between Rachel, the know-it-all girl in the fifth grade, and John Finley Feester, the son of the school superintendent. The events of the stories and the language of the books reflect those years wonderfully.

Simon Says is a more serious book. Even though Simon is a grade school Jewish boy, he comes to realize the plight of his people in Nazi Germany. He is initiated into a knowledge of what evil is doing to people of his race. It is a darker book, but still an interesting book for young readers in elementary school and junior high school. All three of these books have been finalists for the Oklahoma Book Award.

Paradise on the Prairie is another book set in Oklahoma in which a young orphan boy witnesses the founding of a state and finds a new family to love him. This is a story of an orphan boy who is put aboard an orphan train

in New York City and sent to the frontier in hopes that someone will adopt him and the other orphans on the train. The story of the orphan trains is true, and Molly Griffis researched the subject well in preparing to write this book.

Although the book is historical fiction, it presents an historically accurate picture of Oklahoma as statehood approached. Johnny Pickett, one of the orphans, arrives in Oklahoma City, hoping to be adopted. At the first two train stops, Johnny is not picked by a family for adoption. The third stop is Oklahoma City. As Johnny stands on the platform, holding his little dog, a boy his age tries to pet the dog, who becomes frightened and runs away. The boy's father vows to help Johnny find his dog. The boy's father is Thompson Ferguson, the Republican governor of Oklahoma Territory.

Eventually Johnny Pickett becomes a part of the Ferguson family and is a witness to the wonderful story of Oklahoma becoming a state. The facts in the book are historically accurate both in the story of statehood as well as in the history of Territorial Governor Ferguson's family.

In addition to being a very good story of adventure and historical events, this is an uplifting story of hope. In this story, we see an orphan boy come to a new land, find a new home, and build a new life in a new state. Again, Molly Grriffis has written a story to charm young readers as well as adults. I have autographed copies of seven of her books. They are valuable additions to my library. This wonderful writer is truly one of Oklahoma's treasures.

News from the State Capitol An Update from State Rep. Lisa Billy

In the world of legislative government, there are certain checks and balances in place in order to make sure the people's business is conducted in a fair manner.

If a bill is popular, it will survive the committee process, pass out of the House and Senate and go to the governor's desk for final approval. If the governor signs the bill, it becomes law. If the bill isn't popular, it will not make it out of committee or, if it does, get voted down in the House or Senate.

And sometimes, a bill will pass all the way to the governor's desk, only to get vetoed. That usually means that bill has hit a dead end, but not always. One of the checks and balances in our state's legislative process is the right for the House and Senate to attempt a veto override if those bodies feel the governor's decision wasn't best for the state. In that situation, if a large majority of both chambers disagree with the governor's veto, it can be overridden.

That's exactly what happened in Oklahoma last week for the first time since 1993, as a large pro-life package was vetoed only to be overturned by the House and Senate hours later. Because of that override, a package I think is very important to our state now will become law on Nov. 1.

In short, this is what the bill that was vetoed, and then overridden, was about: It was a pro-life omnibus bill that had large bi-partisan support. The highlights of the bill include requiring a woman to have an

ultrasound before an abortion is conducted and protecting a doctor's freedom of conscience to not perform abortions if they are morally opposed to the procedure. I'm proud that Democrats and Republicans were able to come together to support such an important package. The first time around, the bill passed 80-12 in the House and 38-10 in the Senate.

But even with such strong bipartisan support, the governor chose to go against the wishes of those representatives and senators, and in turn the will of the people of this state. But both chambers recalled the veto and secured super majorities of 81-15 in the House and 37-11 in the Senate to override this bill.

I'm very happy this was overridden, as it was a bill that encompassed many smaller prolife measures, including House Bill 3144, which I authored, that focused on requiring ultrasounds before abortions. Also included in my measure was a provision stating that viewing the ultrasound was still the ultimate choice of the woman.

I believe the enactment of this bill will only help in our state becoming a place that stands up for the rights of the unborn, an issue very close to my heart. I firmly believe the override was a good thing for the state as it kept a good measure alive and now will, very soon, become law.

Wichitas Mountains Wildlife Refuge To Offer Walks

The Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge will be conducting interpretive "Wildflower Walks" in May. These tours will be offered on the following Saturday mornings: May 10, 17, and 24, 2008. Reservations are required and are taken on a first-come, first-served basis by telephoning the Visitor Center beginning Monday, April 28th, between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.

The tours will be conducted at 10 a.m. The tour participants will board a bus and ride to several sites within the Refuge, where short walks will be conducted to identify various types of wildflowers.

Tour participants will meet at the Refuge Visitor Center located at the intersection of Highways 49 and 115. Visitors may obtain a Refuge leaflet and map from one of the dispensers located at each of the five entrances.

Each tour will last approximately three hours. Due to the length of the program, children must be at least eight years of age to participate. A \$5.00 per person reservation fee will be collected at the time of check-in. Reservations will be retained until ten minutes prior to departure on each date. After that time, standbys will be accepted. If the bus seating capacity is filled

after accepting stand-bys, late arrivals with reservations will not be able to participate.

Interested persons are advised that the Refuge's public interpretive program is intended for individuals and family units. Only one family's reservation will be accepted per telephone call. We regret we cannot offer group tours but invite all interested individuals to call for reservations which are taken on a first-come, first-serve basis. Reservations must be made by telephoning the Refuge Visitor Center on the following line only: (580) 429-2151, beginning Monday, April 28th, between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.


