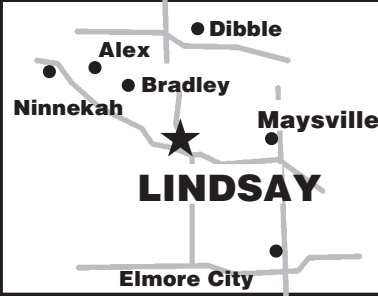

Charges Filed Against Kidnapping Suspects

March 24, 2009, Kelly Bohannon was kidnapped by three men from his home at 712 Raleigh in Lindsay. The three beat the 38 year old inside the car. They stopped the car near Elmore City, pulled Bohannon from the car and beat him several more times before placing him back inside. While the car was moving, Bohannon jumped out in Carter County. The suspects drove on.

Bohannon was kidnapped and beaten due to his recent break up with his girlfriend, Pamela Jackson.

Jackson helped the suspects by loaning them her vehicle and helping arrange the kidnapping. All four people were charged today with kidnapping and assault with battery with great bodily injury.

OSBI agents, Lindsay Police Officers and Garvin County Sheriff's Deputies arrested John Wayne McKinley, Jeremy Burk, Pamela Jackson, and Charlie Foster.

All four have been charged with kidnapping and aggravated assault.

Travel With Care Over Memorial Day Weekend

While remembering and honoring deceased loved ones this Memorial Day holiday, the Oklahoma Highway Patrol is encouraging motorists to be especially careful on Oklahoma roadways.

"There were three fatalities on our roads last year during Memorial Day weekend," said Trooper Betsy Randolph. The cause of those fatal crashes was unsafe speed. Alcohol was a contributing factor in one crash, and one person who died was not wearing a seat belt. One motorcyclist was killed. He was not wearing a helmet.

"There are some simple things people can do to ensure their safety and the safety of their passengers, especially children, riding in vehicles this weekend. Wear your seat belt, buckle up those little people, obey the speed limit and don't ever drink and drive," Randolph said.

OHP will be participating

in two national safety programs targeting restraint violations. The "Click it or Ticket" campaign and "Operation C.A.R.E (Combined Accident Reduction Effort) All American Buckle Up Week" are enforcement programs that run before, during and after Memorial Day.

"The Oklahoma Highway Patrol has a 'no-tolerance' policy for seat belt and child restraint violations. Troopers will focus on alcohol-related offenses, speeding, seat belt and child restraint usage. You are likely to see more troopers out and they will be enforcing all state laws in an effort to keep everyone safe this holiday weekend," Randolph said.

Memorial Day weekend also means increased traffic on Oklahoma's lakes and rivers. The patrol reminds boaters that the Kyle Williams Boating Safety Education Act is in effect and all operators between the ages

of 12 and 16 must complete an approved boating safety education course before operating most recreational vessels and be under the supervision of an adult 18 years of age or older.

"The Lake Patrol Section of the Oklahoma Highway Patrol would like to remind boaters that every vessel is required to carry one U.S. Coast Guard-approved wearable life jacket for each person on board. Every person under the age of 13 is required to wear a life jacket. We would also like to remind people who might be drinking of the tendency for sun, wind and waves to magnify the effects of alcohol," said Captain George Green. "Also, we ask all parents to keep a close watch on their children when they are playing near the water."

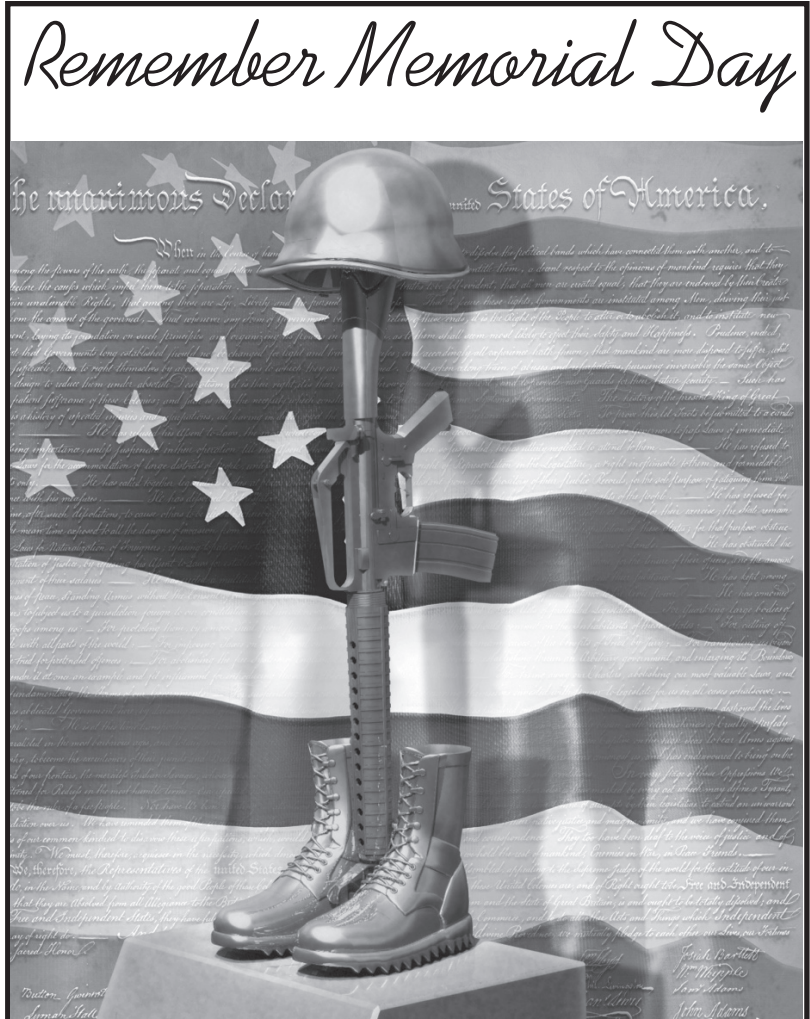
"Let's make this a record-breaking Memorial Day weekend with fewer or no fatality crashes," Randolph said.

Matchbook Memories

GRADUATION RAIN PART II

After I began teaching at Southwestern, graduation rains continued to follow me. In my early years at Southwestern, I gave numerous high school commencement addresses in Oklahoma, Kansas, and Texas. In May 1972, I delivered ten commencement addresses. Since May is traditionally a storm month, many commencements were held on stormy nights. Once, I gave the commencement address at Canton High School. Just as the ceremony ended, a severe thunderstorm struck. I drove the entire forty miles home in a blinding rain storm. When my wife and I got home, our baby sitter and our two small sons were in our basement along with several of our neighbors as the storm sirens wailed.

I recall a commencement at Balko High School when I encountered the worst storm I have ever driven in. It is a long way from Weatherford to Balko. As I left Weatherford in the middle of the afternoon, I could sense a storm coming. It was hot and humid with a feeling that a storm was brewing. I had just bought a new Toyota Celica GT that was very fast. I planned to try to get out of the commencement and drive home as fast as I could on the lonely roads through the Oklahoma Panhandle and Northwestern Oklahoma.

As I spoke, I could hear the thunder coming closer. The commencement ended, I ran to my car as rain began to fall and the storm sirens began to wail. I tried to get a weather report on my car radio, but there was very little radio reception in the Oklahoma Panhandle. I heard a faint report that a tornado was on the ground at Bryan's Corner. The rain swept down in sheets. I drove as fast as I could, feeling the small sports car swerve and drift as the wind and rain buffeted it in the pitch black darkness, lit up by streaks of lightning.

As I left Balko, I was terribly thirsty. I thought I would stop soon

at a service station or convenience store. But there was nowhere to stop. After many miles, I came to the small town of May, where I saw lights. As I pulled into the parking lot, I saw it was a rough-looking bar. I thought I would go in and get a bottled soft drink to go. As I opened the car door in the rain, I looked at my clothes. I was wearing a suit and a tie. I still had a red carnation pinned to my lapel. I thought about what kind of reception might await me inside. I closed the door and drove on to Woodward, where I finally got a Coke. That was the worst graduation rain I ever experienced.

Even my children have been plagued by graduation rain. When my daughter-in-law, Lena, graduated as valedictorian of her high school class at Corn Bible Academy, a terrific thunderstorm struck just as the ceremony ended. As we arrived in Weatherford, the storm arrived with us. Our small basement was crowded with our family and Lena's family as the storm passed overhead.

For many years, I was the back-up speaker for Southwestern commencements in case of rain. If rain came and we had to move the graduation ceremony inside, I would speak to one of the three groups. Down through the years, I spoke several times. Only once did I hope for rain. When my son, Vance, graduated from Southwestern, I knew that if it rained, I would speak to his group, the School of Arts and Sciences. That Friday in May 1989 began on a somber note. A cold rain was falling as we drove to Minco to attend the funeral of Chris "Hammer" Norman, a star linebacker for the Southwestern Bulldogs, who had died in his dorm room during finals. That night at the commencement ceremony, all of the senior football players wore yellow ribbons pinned to their robes in honor of Chris. I spoke to the graduation in the Rankin Williams Field House. As the

diplomas were being awarded, Dean Dan Dill stepped back and allowed me to present Vance his diploma. On a shelf in my library, I have a picture of Vance hugging me with his new diploma in his hand.

Graduation rain would follow Vance to his next graduation. On May 8, 1993, exactly 42 years to the day after I graduated from Bradley High School, Vance received his Juris Doctorate from the College of Law at the University of Tulsa. Much of Tulsa was flooded.

The night before graduation, we all attended a "graduation dinner" at a Country Club in South Tulsa. As we ate, we could hear the rain pouring down. When the valet brought our cars, we were told to be careful because we would have to drive across a low water bridge. Vance was driving his Camaro as I followed in my S-10 Blazer. As we crossed the small creek, water was flowing across the road. As the water rose to the bottom of the doors on the Camaro, it stalled. I could see it would soon wash off the road. My daughter-in-law, Lena, was in the car, and she was seven months pregnant. Vance put his head out the window and yelled, "PUSH! PUSH!" I put my S-10 in 4-wheel drive and low gear and began to push on his bumper as hard as I could. As I pushed the car forward, I could see it slipping to the side. As we slowly moved forward, I could see the car coming out of the deep water. As I finally pushed him out of the water, the left end of my front bumper was barely touching the right side of his bumper. A few more seconds and we would have washed down the creek. We were glad to see higher ground and thankful we made it through the flooded creek.

This week, we have two more graduations in our family. On Thursday night, Walker, my youngest grandson, has his promotion ceremony from fifth grade to middle school in Norman. On Friday night, my oldest grandson, Christopher, has his high school graduation from Oklahoma Bible Academy in Enid. Gary England promises beautiful weather for both nights. But considering my penchant for graduation rains, I will keep a weather eye on the skies.

News from the State Capitol An Update from State Rep. Lisa Billy

The United States of America is different than other countries.

We are governed by a living, breathing piece of history known as the Constitution. Along with the Bill of Rights – the first 10 amendments to the Constitution – the people of this country enjoy more liberties and freedoms than anywhere else on Earth.

Within the Bill of Rights are some amazing measures that have helped make this country truly great. The first amendment guarantees freedom of speech, religion and press. The fourth protects citizens from unlawful search and seizure. The sixth guarantees us a right to a speedy trial while the tenth asserts state's rights in areas not specifically meant for the federal government.

And while every bit of that document is important to the fabric to this country, one above all others seems to be continually under assault. That is the second amendment.

This is the part of the Constitution that protects our right to bear arms. The full text of the amendment is as follows: "A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed."

Yet, some anti-gun types believe that we need oppressive gun restrictions to keep us safe. That form of government intervention just doesn't sit well with me. That's why I supported House Concurrent Resolution 1032. Both Democrats and Republicans supported the measure, as it passed the state House 86-9 this past week.

What does HCR 1032 do? A non-binding resolution, it notifies our leaders in Washington, D.C., to not infringe on the rights contained in the second amendment with so-called license requirements. Right now in our nation's capital, there is an effort to further restrict our gun rights via U.S. House Resolution 45, also known as the "Blair Holt's

Firearm Licensing and Record Sale Act of 2009." In short, this measure would make it a federal felony to possess a firearm without a license.

The overwhelming support of HCR 1032, which urges our leaders to defeat H.R. 45, pleases me. It makes me feel good to know that my fellow legislators understand and defend the second amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

There's an old saying I believe is absolutely true: When guns are outlawed, only outlaws will have guns. Those who wish to make this country safer by heaping on gun control law after gun control law likely have their heart in the right place, as they just want to decrease violence. But all laws like this do is penalize the good and just members of our society and embolden nefarious types who would then know fewer homes would have a gun inside to detract them from breaking in. That would only make violence statistics go up, as good people would be left defenseless.

The University Of Oklahoma College of Law was founded in 1909. The Class of 2009 is the 100th class to graduate from this institution.

The OU College of Law was then, and remains, the only public law school in Oklahoma. In 1911, the College of Law joined the membership of the Association of American Law Schools. Since 1923, the College of Law has been accredited by the American Bar Association's Section on Legal Education.

Salmon received his undergraduate degree in 2005 from the University of Oklahoma in Political Science. While at OU Law, Salmon was on the Dean's Honor Roll

and was chosen to represent the University at the American Bar Association Negotiation Moot Court Competition. He completed his internship with Oklahoma Country District Attorney's Office in Oklahoma City. He will begin employment with the Tulsa County District Attorney's Office after the Bar Exam in July.

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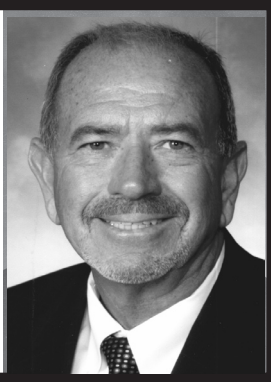
