

Les Gilliam is the official "Oklahoma Balladeer", so designated by the Oklahoma State Legislature in 1998. He is a native of Gene Autry, OK and is a singer, songwriter, and recording artist. He was recently included in a new book "Distinguished Oklahomans".

In 2005, Les received the most prestigious award in Western Music by receiving the coveted "Wrangler Award" from the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City. In 2006, he was nominated for the Oklahoma Music Hall of Fame. Also in 2006 Les received the Governor's Arts Award from the Governor of the State of Oklahoma for his many years of entertaining Oklahomans and keeping western music alive. He is currently based in Ponca City, Oklahoma and entertains as a solo act with his guitar or with his band, The Silver Lake Band. This great band includes former Bob Wills Texas Playboy Smiley Weaver on Steel Guitar, Ponca City native and long time Kay Country favorite Don Long on drums, country fiddler and vocalist Jerald Ritter on fiddle, and the Pride of Winfield, Kenny Glasgow on bass. shows per year.

Les' concerts of cowboy, western swing, country and/or gospel music include fascinating stories about the songs and the artists who performed them. His country dances feature great western swing music and fun activities for the audience. He always includes original songs and humorous material, adding a touch of nostalgia and good ole fashion patriotism. Les grew up in southern Oklahoma where Gene Autry owned a ranch next to their place and Gene would often come to visit them. Meeting Mr. Autry and enjoying his movies and radio show certainly created in Les a love for western music. He was a contributor to the recent book on cowboy music "Singing in the Saddle", written by his friend Ranger Doug of Riders in the Sky. He was also a contributor

to the newly published official biography of Gene Autry, titled "Public Cowboy # 1".

Les has recorded twelve albums as well as two videos. He is a member of the Oklahoma Arts Council Touring Program as well as the Mid-America Arts Alliance based in Kansas City. Some of his recent noteworthy performances include the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C.; Silver Dollar City in Branson, Missouri; The International Country Music Festival in Vienna, Austria; The Gene Autry Film and Music Festival in Gene Autry, OK; Rex Allen Days in Wilcox, AZ; Prairieville Farm Days in Michigan; The Bakersfield Opry in California; Western Music Festival in Tucson, AZ; The Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City; The Oklahoma Music Hall of Fame in Muskogee, OK; and many others.

MEMORIAL DAY 2008

Members of the Lindsay American Legion Ball-Smith Post 23 conducted Memorial Day ceremonies at six cemeteries. The American Legion honor guard paid tribute to veterans buried in the Ninnekah Cemetery, the Alex Cemetery, the Bradley Cemetery, the Green Hill Cemetery in Lindsay, the Erin Springs Cemetery, and the Purdy Cemetery. Each ceremony included patriotic songs, remarks by a speaker, a 21 gun salute by the firing party, and the sounding of taps. These Legionnaires are to be commended for their service in this noble endeavor.

In order to illustrate the ceremonies conducted at the cemeteries, I will describe the ceremony at the Bradley Cemetery. Legionnaire Bill Baxter welcomed a very good crowd of Bradley residents. My nieces, Jeannie Rodgers Griswold, Linda Rodgers Cope, and Nancy Rodgers Goleman, sang beautiful renditions of "The National Anthem" and "God Bless America."

I spoke these words to the ones gathered to honor those veterans buried in the Bradley Cemetery.

This is a holy place. This is hallowed ground.

This place has been consecrated by those whose names are engraved on this monument. Their deeds and dedication to the service of their country are commemorated by this noble monument which stands here forever as a testimonial to their service.

The names engraved on this monument represent a roll call from all of our wars from the Civil War to the present war in Iraq.

In my mind, I see these names as a kind of muster of the troops, an assembly of warriors, some wearing the Yankee Blue and the Confederate Gray, others wearing the leggings and wool uniforms of World War I, others wearing the olive drab fatigues and helmets of World War II and Korea, some wearing the jungle green of the Vietnam War, and others wearing the new battle uniforms and body armor of modern warfare.

Although the warriors in this long file differ in appearance, they share one common bond, the brotherhood of warriors.

Nearly four hundred years ago, Shakespeare penned these immortal words that best express this brotherhood of warriors. In the play <u>The Life of King Henry</u> <u>the Fifth</u>, the King is addressing the English troops before they engage in battle with the French army in the Battle of Agincourt. The English army is outnumbered by 5 to 1. King Henry's speech inspired his army to defeat the French and change the course of history.

King Henry's words are as applicable today as they were nearly four centuries ago. King Henry's words were "We few, we happy few, we band of brothers. For he today that sheds his blood with me shall be my brother." This passage provided the title for the recent television series about World War II entitled "Band of Brothers."

The men and women whose names are inscribed on this Bradley monument are forever bound together in brotherhood by their service to their country. On Saturday, I stood before this monument and read every name on it. I recall from my childhood knowing many of the World War I veterans such as Charlie Dye, Buck Powell, and Snake Bradley. I recall the World War II veterans, who were boyhood heroes of mine. I have two brothers and a brother-in-law whose names are engraved on this monument. The Rodgers girls ,who sang today, have a father and three uncles included on this monument. And these Legionnaires and the others of us who served our country are included in that brotherhood of warriors until our own names will be engraved on this monument and others like it.

Let us pray. "Our Heavenly Father, we ask your blessings on those who lie in his holy place. We ask your guidance for those of us who remain. And we ask your special blessings on this country and our leaders and the ones who fight on foreign fields for America this very day. Amen."

Let us join together in solemn reverence as the Ball-Smith American Legion honor guard pays tribute to these warriors.

Legionnaire John Howell then called the firing party to attention and gave the command to fire the volley. The ceremony concluded with John Geffre playing "Taps," the saddest of all sounds.







Each political party can nominate one candidate per office for the November General Election. If two or more candidates from the same party file for one office, the party nominee is selected at either the Primary or Runoff Primary Election.

Only voters registered in a political party can vote to select that party's nominees. Voters not registered in a party (Independents) cannot vote for party candidates in primary elections. Oklahoma has two (2) recognized political parties in 2008: Republican and **Democrat**

All registered voters, regardless of political affiliation, can vote for any candidate at the November General Election and for state or local questions at any election.

Applications to register to vote or to change political affiliation are available at the Garvin County Election Board office, Garvin County Court House, room eight (8); post offices; public libraries; state offices providing public assistance; and at most political party and candidate campaign offices.




