

Area residents are invited to visit the Gene Autry Oklahoma Museum during its "Summer Jamboree" fundraiser, held Saturday, June 20 from 10 a.m. until 9 p.m. The Summer Jamboree features several different activities. Youngsters who enjoy performing traditional music are invited to participate in the Young Entertainers' Showcase at 10 a.m. as the Museum searches for young talent for its Film and Music Festival held in September. An Afternoon of Music featuring performers of country and cowboy music as well as cowboy poetry

begins at 1 p.m. and continues throughout the afternoon. Little did I know that the first article would become a weekly column that would continue for years and that would become so important to my life. Since that first column was published on October 21, 1999, I have written columns that covered a wide range of subjects. I have made many friends among the readers of The Lindsay News. And I have recalled many events, people, and places from my younger years that have enriched my mind and touched my soul.

My "Matchbook Memories" column began with what I thought would be a single article. For several years, I had thought about writing an article about a collection of matchbook covers that I had saved during my boyhood years

at Bradley. From 1946 to 1952, I collected matchbook covers, many of which I picked up from the dirt Main Street of Bradley, which was also Highway 19. Travelers would throw out the empty matchbooks as they stopped at Bomhak's Cafe, McCann's Store, or Sonny Mitchusson's Service Station. In my collection were over 246 matchbook covers, which presented an interesting picture of life in those years. The matchbook covers advertised businesses, cafes, bars, products, political candidates, and even a Class D baseball team, the Hot Springs Bathers of the Cotton States League.

After I retired from Southwestern in May 1999, I began to think about writing for publication. The first article I wrote was entitled "Matchbook Memories," a nostalgic look back at my boyhood years as they were reflected in that collection of matchbook covers. I decided to see if <u>The Lindsay News</u> would be interested in publishing the article. On Tuesday, October 19, 1999, I went to the Cable Printing office

and asked to speak to the editor. When Meredon Cable came out of his office, I introduced myself and told him I had an article for the newspaper if he was interested. It was 11:00 a.m., and the deadline for that week's paper was noon that day. After a pleasant visit with Meredon, I left the office, assuming that the article would not be published until the next week, if at all. On Friday, October 22, I called Monica Penner, the managing editor at that time, and asked her if Meredon had read my article. She told me it had already been printed in the October 21 edition of The Lindsay News, which I had not received yet in the mail. Then she asked me if I would be interested in writing a weekly column for The Lindsay News. I was totally surprised. I told her to let me think about it.

When I told my wife about the conversation, she urged me to accept the offer. I was reluctant at first, wondering if I had enough to write about for a weekly column.

# Matchbook Memories by Dr. Jerry G. Nye

When I called Monica back, I told her that I would begin a weekly column and, when I ran out of material, I would quit. That was 499 columns ago. Since the first article was entitled "Matchbook Memories," the name of the column became "Matchbook Memories," which it continues to be called.

I received an excellent response to that first column. Mrs. Hess, an Alex teacher at the Bradley School location, took her class on a walking tour of Bradley Main Street. They talked about my article as they walked along the deserted Main Street, trying to imagine what it was like from the description in my article. Each student wrote me a letter, commenting on their responses to my article. Then Mrs. Hess invited me to come to the Bradley School to present a program about my matchbook covers to her fifth and sixth grade students. It was a wonderful day. I displayed all 246 of my matchbook covers on tables in the Bradley gym. I told the grade school students stories about some of the matchbook covers, about my memories of Bradley Main Street, and about my memories of going to school in that building more than fifty years ago. Then the students walked around the tables and looked at the matchbook covers, asked questions about some of them, and, especially, asked me about my story about Sheriff DeArthur Wilson shooting a man on the porch of the building that was later McCann's Store. One little boy said, in almost a whisper, "I am never walking across that porch again."

Since that first column, I have written about a myriad of subjects. I have written many articles about Bradley School, the teachers I had there, the sports teams I recall, and the many friends who shared those years in that place. I have written about the work we did there in the broomcorn patches and the hay fields. I have written a number of articles about country music and the role it played in our lives then and now. Many of my articles have related to the Bradley Cemetery and the friends and relatives buried there. Some articles were tributes to friends and family members. Some were tributes to veterans and descriptions of Memorial Day ceremonies presented by the

Lindsay American Legion Post. In my "Matchbook Memories" column, I have tried to capture what it was like to grow up in that time and place. I have tried to describe the hardships of the Great Depression, the trauma of the World War II years, and the uncertainty of the Korean War era. I have tried to capture the wonder of being a young boy with a wonderful dog on a remote farm during the World War II years. I have attempted to acknowledge the debt I owe to my wonderful parents, to my teachers, and to my wonderful wife and sons, who have all added so much to my life. And now as I reach this milestone of 500 articles, I thank The Lindsay <u>News</u> for providing the venue through which my articles can be shared with so many people who can relate to the memories we all share. I particularly appreciate Gina and Darrell Cable making this 500th "Matchbook Memories" a special occasion.

"Matchbook Memories" article on October 21, 1999, I had no idea of what would follow. And I have no idea of what lies ahead. But the surprises of life make it all interesting. I look forward to what the future holds for "Matchbook Memories."





#### Superintendent, Lindsay Schools

Last week, Brenda and I took a whirlwind trip to Iowa City, Iowa, to look at some houses with our son, Blaine, his wife, Mandi, and the twins, Whitman and Beckett.

You see, he has taken a teaching position at the University of Iowa, and they'll be moving there at the end of the summer.

It was a good opportunity to do a little bonding with the twins. You know, when your son has four kids between the ages of four years (oldest) and nine months, (twins) the younger ones tend to not get as much attention as they would if the older siblings weren't cornering the market.

These little guys were quite a treat, as they competed with each other for their dad's attention. It was particularly noticeable when we would go out to eat. There they would be, sitting in their high chairs, trying to get his attention by making silly faces, laughing, moving their heads from side to side, etc.

It was all fun and games until one of them would get a little too excited and head butt the table accidentally, or dive chin first into the table. That's when the crying began. Fortunately, there were no serious injuries, and the competition usually ended in a draw.

Iowa City is around 700 miles from Lindsay, so it can be driven in one day. That is, if you're young and crazy, or just young, or maybe just crazy. We decided to stop half-way on the trip up there, but since time was of the essence, decided to drive all the way through on the way home. Thank goodness there were four of us to switch off behind the wheel.

Actually, our roots are in Iowa, as most of my family migrated to Oklahoma from western Iowa back in the late 1800's and early 1900's. It is a beautiful state, with neat old farmhouses that look like something from a century ago dotting the countryside.

Real estate in Iowa City is a little pricey, as I suppose it is in most college towns. It's amazing to think what some of the homes are listed at, but I guess it's the old law of supply and demand.

One of the most interesting differences in housing there is that almost every house has a basement. I don't think it has as much to do with the threat of tornadoes as it does with the cold winter temperatures, with the low frost line. We saw basements of every size and shape, from rough and musty to dry and finished.
