

Garvin County Courthouse Receives Grant For Upgrades

Sen. Johnnie Crutchfield and Rep. Wes Hilliard announced that Garvin County recently received a state grant to make necessary upgrades to the county's courthouse.

Bradley Receives Grant For New City Park

Sen. Anthony Sykes and Rep. Lisa J. Billy announced that the town of Bradley recently received a state grant for the construction of a community park and the purchase of park equipment.

The Oklahoma Department of Commerce/Office of Community Development awarded a \$60,000 Community Development Block Grant -Rural Economic Action Plan (CDBG-REAP) to construct a community park on a .45 acre lot that will include a steel pavilion, basketball court, two playground sets, volleyball court, drinking fountain, one set of bleachers and fencing.

"The citizens and families of Bradley will greatly benefit from this project," said Sykes. "It's important that all communities have a park where citizens can exercise, relax and spend time with their friends and family."

The CDBG-REAP set-aside is a newly developed program that partners with the Substate Planning Districts (SSPDs) to make a greater impact on each district by matching CDBG funds and REAP funds, dollar for dollar. The CDBG-REAP set-aside can fund a broad array of projects. Some of the eligible activities include water/wastewater, fire protection, streets, housing demolition and

senior citizen centers.

"As a mother, I know this park will be a wonderful place for families to gather and play together and that is good for Oklahoma," said Rep. Lisa J. Billy.

New Polling Place ocator Now Available

State Election Board Secretary Michael Clingman recently announced the launch of a new polling place locator feature on the State election Board's website. "The polling place locator may help thousand of Oklahomans verify the location of their precinct polling places for the election upcoming on July 29," Clingman said

The polling place locator is available at HYPERLINK "http:// www.elections.state.ok.us" www. elections.state.ok.us in the "Frequently Asked Questions" section and also in the "Voters Registration" section.

Registered voters enter their last name, date of birth, and Zip Code and the locator produces a list of possible matches. The voter selects his or her name from the list and receives the name and address of the assigned polling place as well as a list of his or her Congressional, State Senate, State House, and County Commissioner Districts.

In the event that the locator is unable to match the voter's information, the voter should call his or her local County Election Board office directly. The locator also provides the appropriate contact information.

"The polling Place locator is a great tool for Oklahoma voters who just need to verify their correct place to vote on election day, "Clingman said. "Voters can access the polling place locator from any computer connected to the internet at any time, including on Election Day when it may be difficult to reach their local County Election Board office by telephone.

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Matchbook Memories

D-DAY REMEMBERED

Sixty-four years ago this week, Allied Forces stormed ashore at Normandy in Operation Overlord. American troops landed on Omaha Beach and Utah Beach. In the face of withering German gunfire, American troops waded ashore and crossed the barren beach to establish a foothold on Fortress Europe. Thousands died that first day. Many more thousands would die in France, Belgium, the Netherlands, and Germany before Germany surrendered unconditionally on May 2, 1945. Although World War II raged on for nearly a year after D-Day, that historic landing was the beginning of the end for the Nazi regime.

The D-Day invasion of Normandy was the largest invasion in history. It will never be surpassed. On D-Day, the Allies landed around 156,000 troops in Normandy. The American forces landed numbered 73,000: 23,250 on Utah Beach, 34,250 on Omaha Beach, and 15,500 airborne troops. In the British and Canadian sector, 83,115 troops were landed on Gold Beach, Juno Beach, and Sword Beach, and 7,900 airborne troops. It seems almost impossible that so many men and so much equipment and arms could be landed in such a relatively small area. The planning, the coordination, the logistics, and the execution of such a complex operation is almost inconceivable. But what is even more inconceivable is the courage of those men who faced death to carry out their

mission. Omaha Beach took the heaviest toll on American forces. The US 1st and 29th Divisions suffered around

2,000 casualties, including both dead and wounded, in that first day on Omaha Beach. After the successful landing on Normandy Beach, the battle for the Normandy peninsula would continue until August 14th when the Allies drove the Germans back into the interior of France. In the entire Normandy Campaign, approximately 30,000 Americans were killed. The D-Day landing has become synonymous with courage and valor. When we think of the Greatest Generation. we often think first of those Americans who waded ashore at Normandy.

Those brave men who landed at Normandy were the vanguard for thousands of other warriors who followed them. The 45th Infantry Division came into South France. Other units came through other French ports and spread across Western Europe, pushing the Germans backward to their own soil. Hundreds of thousands of Americans fought and died before Germany surrendered. From June 6, 1944 to May 2, 1945, Americans fought their way across Europe. Their brothers in arms fought their way across the Pacific, battling the Japanese in island warfare as vicious as the war in Europe. Together, these men left a legacy that we still celebrate today, more than six decades

The ranks of these graying warriors are growing thinner with the passing of each day. Last week, we paid tributes to these warriors in cemeteries across America. As the Lindsay American Legion Ball-Smith Post 23 conducted Memorial Day ceremonies at

six cemeteries, several of the Honor Guard were World War II veterans. They were paying tribute to their brothers in arms, who had shared the same experiences. As the years pass by, the lists of names on the memorials le Angthen.

The pictures that accompany this article were taken by my friends, L.B. and Ina Hoyle. These pictures show the World War II Memorial in Washington, D.C. This monument is a beautiful tribute to the men and women who served in that greatest war to preserve Democracy and the freedom of all people.

As we remember D-Day on June 6, we should all pause to give thanks to the men who fought there and in other battles around the world. The D-Day veterans and their brothers in arms held the world on their shoulders to preserve our freedom. Let us always remember. We are here today because of what they did in those perilous times.

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American Legion Auxiliary Makes Pocket Flags

The American Legion-Ball Auxiliary recently completed POCKET FLAG PROJECT for the troops overseas. The project was conceived in 2001 by a Cub Scout leader in Colorado after meeting Boy Scout leaders who were veterans and served in Vietnam and the Gulf War. Both of them carried small, folded flags in their left breast pockets. She thought the project would be a way for the boys to appreciate patriotism and understand flag etiquette. Following flag etiquette, the flags are folded into tiny triangles, and accompanying the pocket-sized flags is a card thanking them for their service. The project has now expanded all across America with the goal of getting these pocket flags into the pockets of all active military serving on the front lines as signs of patriotism from home.

When approached about participating in the project, the ladies responded with, "Of course, we will do what we can to help." They weren't sure just how they could get it all done (folding 300 flags seemed like a daunting task), but they jumped in with both feet. The flags and zip-lock bags were purchased through the Pocket Flag Project headquarters. The group was able to get additional information and instructions at the project website. 





A total of 61 baccalaureate-educated nurses ready to enter the workforce made up the May 2008 graduating class of Registered Nurses at East Central University.

The class included 49 generic students, those who completed an eight-semester program, including five semesters of clinical courses, to receive a bachelor's degree with a major in nursing, and 12 RN to BSN graduates. RN to BSN students already are licensed registered nurses

with an associate degree or diploma in nursing who want to earn a bachelor's degree in nursing. They can complete the required courses at night in 12 months. "As the shortage of RNs continues to grow," noted Dr.

Joseph T. Catalano, RN, chair of the Department of Nursing, "the nursing faculty and I will continue to work hard to meet the projected shortages in our region of the state."

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing estimates there will be a shortage of 800,000 RNs by 2020. In Oklahoma, the shortage is projected to be 3,100 RNs by 2012.

According to data collected by the Oklahoma State Board of Nursing, ECU has the second largest baccalaureate degree nursing program in the state by the number of enrolled

From the first graduating class of 20 nurses in 1974, ECU's program has continued to grow. In 2002, the program was expanded to the Southeastern Oklahoma State University campus in Durant and this year the first class of students was admitted to the ECU@Ardmore program.

"We are the only baccalaureate nursing program in the whole southeastern quadrant of the state," Catalano said. "Our service area covers over 14,000 square miles, not including the students we draw from north Texas which also doesn't have a baccalaureate program."

A pinning ceremony was held for the nursing graduates at the First Baptist Church in Ada after the cap and gown graduation at ECU on May 10. Catalano said the second ceremony is held because the nursing program is unique among other degrees offered by ECU. It not only is an academic degree, he said, but also an entrance into a profession.

"The pin the nursing graduates receive is akin to the badges that police officers or firemen receive when they graduate from basic training," he said. "It indicates that they belong to a specially educated professional group and is a symbol of their legal status granted by state licensure.

"The graduates of the ECU nursing program are noted for their knowledge and the high quality care they provide to patients in a multitude of clinical settings," he added. "Our graduates are heavily recruited by hospitals and health organizations all over the state and throughout the southern plains region."





The minutes of the previous meetings were read by secretary Mary Robertson. The treasurer's report was given by treasurer Donna Hardin.


