The Lindsay Municipal Swimming Pool opened May 31 for business. Pool hours are Tuesday through Saturday, 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. and Sunday, 1:30p.m. to 5:30 p.m. It will be closed on Monday. Prices are \$2 for 16 and over and \$1.50 for 15 and under. Season passes will be available. Rates for passes will \$35 for one child, \$50 for two children, and \$75 for family pass (immediate family only). The pool will also be available for rent after hours. A two hour party will be \$65. Water aerobics will again be offered on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7 p.m. to 8 p.m. Each session will cost \$2. A new offering this summer will be scuba lessons taught by Dr. Stephen Hale. Matchbook Memories

BRADLEY MUSIC: A RETURN TO THE PAST

On May 23, I attended the Bradley Friday Night Music Show. A good crowd enjoyed music, singing, and good food. An unusually large group of musicians entertained the crowd and themselves with country music songs from the past. Most of the songs I knew, but some were new to me. There was a spontaneity about the whole evening with the musicians performing in no set order. They seemed to sense whose turn it was to perform. The music itself was enjoyment for me, but also the entire evening was a return to the past for me.

As my wife, my grandson, Walker, and I drove up to the Bradley Community Center, I immediately began to think of my first memories of that building. In the late 1940s, I watched the members of the Bradley Holiness Church construct that building block by block. When the building was finished, church services began, led by Brother George and Sister Jewel. The services were frequent, long, and animated. The singing was extended and enthusiastic. I can recall walking past there on the warm summer nights and listening to the singing, shouting, and loud testimonies, sometimes in tongues.

As we entered the building for the "Friday Night Singing," the room was filled with tables and chairs. Several people were already there. As we sat down near the end of a table, I realized that I was sitting in the exact

place where I had sat nearly sixty years ago when an unusual event occurred. In about 1948, a group of Bradley Boys that included George "Killer" McCann, Sid Smith, and I were walking past the Bradley Holiness Church. The singing was in full swing, accompanied by shouts of acclamation. Killer said we should go inside to "see what they are doing in there." We walked in and sat on the back row. The song leader was leading old time gospel hymns, and the audience was singing with gusto. In a gesture of recognition for their new guests, the song leader asked if the young men on the back row had a request for a song. In a loud voice, Killer McCann said, "I would like to hear "The Panhandle Rag." A long silence ensued. As the next song began, the Bradley Boys beat a hasty retreat. As I recalled that incident, I looked up at Killer's picture on the wall in the Bradley Class of 1949 senior picture hanging on the wall.

In that same picture, I looked at the senior picture of E.J. Branch, who was leading the group that night. E.J. gave a big smile and waved as I entered the room. As I watched E.J. and listened to him play and sing, I thought back to our Bradley days. In high school, E.J. was a member of the Bradley High School quartet, led by Mrs. Beeler Foley. In the Bradley yearbook, there is a picture of that

quartet composed of E.J., Lee Roy Farmer, Bobby Joe Stewart, and Mutt Stewart.

As I thought about that quartet, I looked up at Bobby Joe Stewart's picture in the Bradley Class of 1947 picture. Bobby Joe made a career of country music. The last time I saw Bobby Joe was in 1952 at the Saddle Club in Chickasha just before I entered the Army. Bobby Joe was a band

told me he would get together the best musicians he could find. He kept his promise. I had heard

some of them before, but several were new to me. Some of the performers had Bradley ties from long ago. E.J. pointed out to me one of the guitar players who had been married to Miss Erma Johnson, our high school English teacher. Miss Johnson was a new teacher just out of college. She

My wife wrote a note to request a song and had our grandson, Walker, carry it up to E.J. It was a request for him to perform his version of "Two Little Boys." That touching song always reminds me of the close bond between E.J. and his brother, Bill, who served together aboard an LST during the Korean War. The entire crowd enjoyed E.J.'s trademark song.

As the program ended, E.J. and I talked about the Bradley class pictures on the walls of the Bradley Community Center, our memories of that place long ago, and our friends who have left this earth. Each time I go to the "Bradley Friday Night Music," I am reminded once more of the hold that place has on my entire life.

up the winter performances with their very first summer performances."

Not only will this be the first time MCT has held a musical in Pauls Valley during the summer, McGee said MTC directors will be introducing a few other "firsts" during the upcoming week of production.

"Another thing that's different are the public performance times. We usually have two Friday performances and one Saturday show, but for the summer

J.C. Graham performed several songs including Hank Williams' "I'll Never Get Out of This World Alive," "On the Wings of a Dove," and "One Day at a Time." We talked and reminisced about his father, Ollie Graham, who lived near us when my family lived on the Victria Farm during World War II.

I particularly enjoyed the songs of two ladies whom I had not heard before. Jane Reyes, a Maysville lady, did "Drifting Too Far From the Shore" and "Go Rest High on That Mountain" The other lady, whose name I missed, had a good country voice. In addition to playing guitar, she sang "Just Any Day Now" and did a duet of "Till Each Tear Becomes A Rose."

Gary Woolwine did his usual stellar performance. He performed excellent versions of "I'll Stroll Over Heaven With

member for Rusty McDonald and the Southernaires, a good regional band based in Lawton. Rusty McDonald's main claim to fame was as the vocalist on the original recording of Bob Wills' classic "Faded Love." That night at the Saddle Club, Bobby Joe came out during the break and joined the Old Bradley Boys for a few minutes. Now E.J. is the only one left of that Bradley quartet, the others having joined the lengthening list of the Old Bradley Boys who have left this earth.

The "Friday Night Singing" was very good. I had talked to E.J. earlier in the week, and he

musical we'll have two Friday performances only — one at 1 p.m. and the other at 7 p.m."

Along with the other changes, McGee noted yet another thing that will be new about the upcoming Missoula Children's Theatre production.

Whereas advance tickets could be purchased for previous productions, all tickets for the summer shows must be purchased at the door of the Pauls Valley High School auditorium prior to each performance.

And while no advance tickets will be available, certain discounts will apply. Adult tickets will cost \$6 for each performance or \$10 for both, while student admission is priced at \$3 for each show or \$5 for two.

In addition, tickets for senior citizens and members of the Pauls Valley Arts Council may be purchased at a reduced cost of \$5 each.

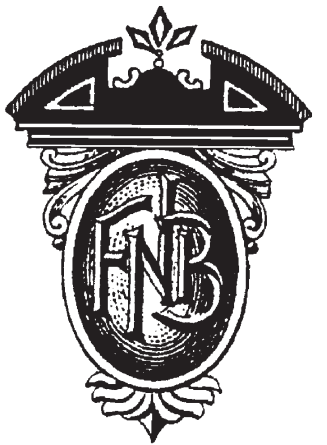

Landmark 2008 Legislation For Natural Resource Work

Conservation leaders in Oklahoma are hailing the just completed legislative session as "landmark" for natural resource work statewide.

"The 2008 legislative session was definitely one for the record books when it comes to natural resource conservation," said Scotty Herriman, President of the Oklahoma Association of Conservation Districts (OACD). "The legislature passed significant conservation legislation and allocated an all time record level of funding for natural resource conservation work this spring. You can't ask for much more than that."

Herriman sighted several legislative accomplishments including the passage Senate Bill 1766 by Rep. Dale DeWitt and Senator Charles Wyrick, a measure that modernizes the Oklahoma Conservation District act by updating the statute to reflect changes in Federal law. This legislation also allows Conservation District Directors the ability to purchase state insurance in the same manner that School Board members can and the measure limits liability on water quality in flood control structures, a change that according to Herriman was desperately needed.

"This change in liability law takes a real burden off of our local District Boards," Herriman said. "We can't control what someone does in or above a watershed lake. This change in the law simply says that since we can't control what goes in the water, we shouldn't be held liable for what someone else does."

Herriman also praised the legislature and the Governor for

the approval of a record funding level for Conservation including the passage of \$25 million in bond funds to repair damaged caused by the floods of 2007 and 2008.

"Whether its flood control dams, waterways, terraces or other land improvements, the entire conservation infrastructure suffered incredible damage this past year," Herriman said. "The State answered this spring with a record \$36 million for Conservation. When this is matched with Federal and local sources, this money will become roughly \$126 million to fix the damage caused to dams and other parts of the Conservation infrastructure. With this help we can make sure that the protection we have enjoyed for the last 60 plus years in maintained for the future."

Clay Pope, Executive Director of the Oklahoma Association of Conservation Districts agreed with Herriman that the 2008 Legislature was indeed historic.

"Even during the days of the dust bowl, Oklahoma has never put as many resources into Conservation efforts as they did this spring," Pope said. "Governor Henry and the members of the Senate and the House are to be commended for passing the \$25 million bond package to deal with the damage our state suffered this past year as well as their appropriation of over \$11 million from general revenue and gross production taxes for ongoing conservation needs. When this record appropriation is combined with the passage of landmark legislation like Senate Bill 1766 it becomes clear that the 2008 legislative session was a great success for natural resource protection and conservation."

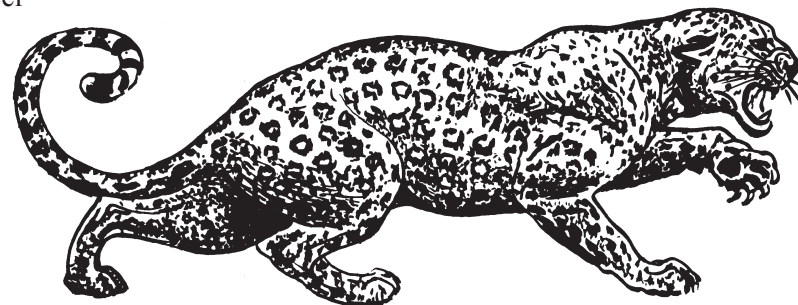

Time To Apply For Absentee Ballots

Voters in Garvin County who want to have absentee ballots mailed to them for the July 29 Primary election should apply now, County Election Board Secretary Brinley, said today. Although the County Election Board can accept applications for absentee ballots until 5 p.m. on Wednesday, July 23, Brinley urged voters who want to vote by absentee ballot to apply early.

Absentee ballot application forms are available at the County Election Board office located at the Garvin County Courthouse, First Floor, Room 8. The absentee ballot application forms also can be downloaded and printed from the Internet at www.elections.state.ok.us.

"At least two mail transactions must be made," Brinley said. "The County Election Board must mail the ballots to the voter and the voter must return the voted ballots by mail." Ballots must be in the hands of the County Election Board by 7 p.m. on Election Day in order to be counted.

Brinley said that any registered voter may vote by absentee ballot in any election in which he or she is eligible to vote. It is not necessary to give a reason---or excuse---for voting absentee. "While anyone can vote absentee without giving a reason, the law still provides several excuses, and it is to the advantage of some voters to use one of them," Brinley said. By stating one of the following reasons on their applications,

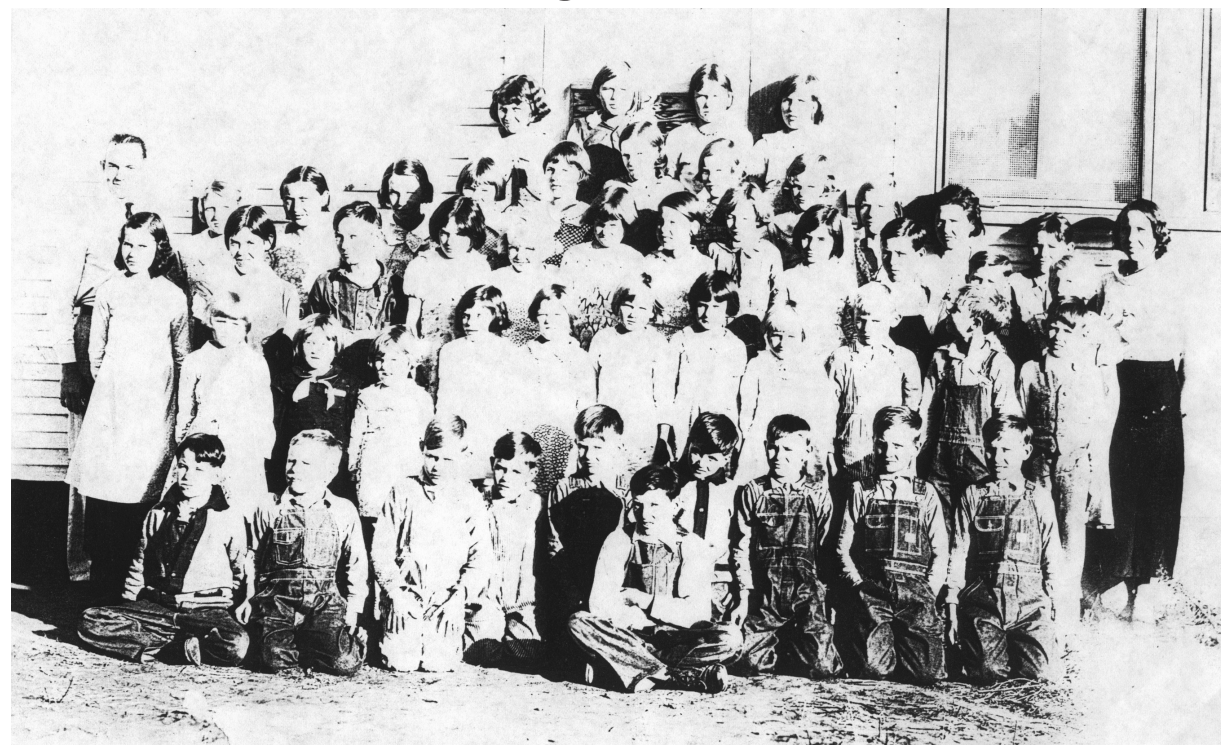
these voters can activate some special conditions that make it easier for them to use absentee ballots. The reasons are:

-- Voters who are physically incapacitated and voters who care for physically incapacitated persons who cannot be left unattended may vote absentee. They may apply only by mail, by fax, or by telegraph.

-- Voters who are confined to nursing homes in the county may vote absentee. An Absentee Voting Board actually goes to the nursing home a few days before the election, sets up a small polling place and allows these persons to vote under circumstances similar to those at a regular precinct polling place. They may apply only by mail or by fax.

-- Military personnel and residents of the county living overseas and the spouses and dependents of each group are eligible to vote absentee without being registered. These voters may apply only by mail or by fax. Military personnel should contact the Voting Service Officers in their units for application forms and additional information. Residents of Oklahoma living overseas can obtain the same materials from any United States military installation and from United States Embassies and Consulates. Military personnel and overseas citizens also can download and print the appropriate application form from the Internet at www.fvap.gov.

If you will remember several months back, we informed everyone of a grant that was available for the construction of a new police facility through the Oklahoma Department of Commerce. The grant is a Community Development Block Grant in the amount of \$150,000. During the application process and as part of the requirements, the city had architectural plans drawn up for a 4800 square foot facility putting the total cost of the project at \$393,500. That leaves the city an additional \$93,500 to scrape, find, and raise in order to complete this massive project. We received pledges a few months ago to make up some of this difference. We will now be seeking further pledges and donations to make this once "dream" and necessity a reality.
