Garvin County To Receive \$190,000 Grant For Courthouse ADA Improvements

State Sen. Johnnie Crutchfield (D-Ardmore) announced this month that Garvin County received a state grant for ADA improvements to the county courthouse.

The Oklahoma Department of Commerce/ Office of Community Development (ODOC/DC) awarded Garvin County the \$190,754 grant as part of the 2009 Community Development Block

Grant Community Revitalization Awards. This program helps eligible cities, town and counties with improvements needed to encourage and increase the quality of life in the community.

“Despite ADA legislation passed over a decade ago, courthouses pose unique challenges in terms of accessibility,” said Sen. Crutchfield, (D-Ardmore). “Projects like this will help make

the county courthouse more accessible to everyone.”

Each year the Oklahoma Department of Commerce makes CDBG funds available to eligible incorporated communities. Funding is provided by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development. ODOC/DC funding addresses many important infrastructure needs across the state.

Stars Over The Wichitas To Be Held At Wichita Mountain Wildlife Refuge

The Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge is inviting the general public to join us for an evening with the stars. The refuge will be conducting “Stars over the Wichitas” interpretive programs July 24 and 25, 2009. Visitors will study major constellations and other heavenly bodies. Bring your own optics, or view the night skies through a 13” Dobsonian telescope.

Reservations are accepted on a first-come, first-served basis by telephoning the Visitor Center beginning Monday, July 13, 2009 between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m.

Star-gazing is enhanced at the Refuge because of its lack of major light pollution. An interpreter for the Friends of the Wichitas will

discuss the history of astronomy, its practical uses and goals, and will help visitors identify images found in the night sky.

Programs are limited to 15 participants each to assure every visitor has the opportunity to observe several objects through the telescope. There will be a \$5.00 per person reservation fee collected at the time of check-in. Due to the length of the program all participants must be at least eight years of age.

The two-hour program begins 30 minutes after sunset. Participants will meet at the Boulder/Lost Lake picnic area entrance gate. The gate may be located by traveling approximately one and one-half miles west of

Camp Doris, then turning left onto the road leading to the Boulder/Lost Lake picnic areas. Visitors may obtain a Refuge leaflet/map from dispensers located at each of the five entrances. Binoculars and a lawn chair are recommended. The program will be canceled if it is raining or if the sky is overcast.

The Refuge’s public interpretive program is intended for individuals and family units of six persons or less. Only one family’s reservation will be accepted per telephone call. We regret we cannot offer group tours. Reservations must be made by telephoning the Refuge Visitor Center on the following line only: (580) 429-2151, beginning Monday, July 13, 2009.

Matchbook Memories

THE KOREAN WAR AFTERMATH

When you turn on the nightly news, there will almost surely be a story about North Korea threatening war against America. North Korean Prime Minister Kim Il Jong is stirring up trouble just as his father Kim Il Sung did nearly sixty years ago. There is news of North Korean missile tests in the direction of Japan. This week, a missile may be test fired toward Hawaii. An underground nuclear test is scheduled soon. American and South Korean forces are on high alert all along the Demilitarized Zone between South Korea and North Korea. Tensions are still high as they have been for the past fifty-nine years.

The Korean War began fifty-nine years ago this week on June 25, 1950, when the North Korean Army came crashing across the 38th Parallel that separated the two Koreas. In an attack that began at 4:00 a.m., the North

Korean Army caught the South Korean Army totally by surprise. The attack down the Uijongbu Corridor reached Seoul, the capitol, in less than two days. In an emergency session, the United Nations condemned the attack and authorized the use of United Nations forces to repel the invaders. As usual, American troops were the first to respond. A small force of American troops from the 24th Infantry Division was sent to Korea to stop the attackers. The American troops, named Task Force Smith for their commander, Lt. Colonel Brad Smith, first met the enemy of July 5th just south of Osan. When Task Force Smith saw the Russian-built T-34 tanks coming through the rain at Osan, they realized that this was really a war. Poorly armed, poorly trained, and totally outnumbered, Task Force Smith was overrun by the North Koreans.

For nearly three months, the American forces were pounded by the North Korean Army. At places like Taegu, Taejon, and the Naktong River, the Americans were mauled and nearly pushed into the sea at Pusan. Not until General MacArthur staged the surprise amphibious landing behind the enemy lines at Inchon on October 15 did the Americans go on the offensive. Then they swept northward toward the Yalu River, the border of Manchuria. General MacArthur predicted that the troops would be home for Christmas. But a surprise awaited him in the frozen mountains that encircled the Chosin Reservoir.

The last week in November, the Chinese came into the war. The massive Chinese armies nearly wiped out the American forces until heroic stands by the Marines at Yudam-ni, Hagaru-ri, and Koto-ri allowed the American forces to escape from the Chosin Reservoir. In the next few months, the war moved back and forth until a line was established along the 38th Parallel, where the war had begun. For more than two more years, the United Nations forces and the Communist forces fought a stalemate war in the

rugged mountains of Korea.

On July 27, 1953, the Korean War ended in an armistice, which is still in effect today. Technically, the two sides are still at war nearly fifty-six years later. For more than five decades, North Korea has refused to negotiate a peace treaty. And now, they threaten to resume the war once again. As I listen to the daily reports of North Korean activities, I wonder if war will come again.

So much has changed since that day in June 1950. Although North Korea is poverty-stricken, South Korea has flourished. Once nearly totally destroyed by war, Seoul is now a prosperous modern city. A large American air base now stands near Osan, where the members of Task Force Smith saw the T-34 tanks coming through the rain. The Olympic Stadium stands where a terrible slum once stood in Seoul. But American forces still stand guard along the Demilitarized Zone established in July 1953.

The men who fought that war are old now. Many have departed

this earth. The ones who died there are buried in cemeteries in Korea, Hawaii, and all across America. Filmore Jones lies in the Bradley Cemetery. On Memorial Day, I placed a flag at the grave of Billy Casker in Greenhill Cemetery. Billy was the first Lindsay boy to die in the Korean War on August 16, 1950. Those of us still walking this earth have vivid memories of what we did in that war so long ago. Wherever we gather, at cafes, senior citizen centers, and reunions, we recall those years as if they were yesterday. Young men now protect that country that we saved long ago. Each day, I watch the news and read the newspapers to learn the latest news from Korea. And, like many of my comrades, I still have a deep distrust for those North Koreans who cost so many lives and caused so much pain and sorrow more than a half century ago.

Wildlife Refuge To Host Under Cover Of Darkness

The Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge will be conducting Under Cover of Darkness Tours for the general public on July 18,

25 and August 1. Reservations are required and are taken on a first-come, first-served basis beginning Monday, June 29, 2009.

Participants will have an opportunity to learn about nighttime activities of wildlife. The tours are led by members of the Association of the Friends of the Wichitas. Interpreters will assist visitors in understanding the management practices of the Refuge for all species of animals and their habitats, especially those associated with the night. Flashlights are recommended for safety in moving to and from the bus. Due to the length of the tours, children must be at least eight years of age to participate.

Four participants should meet at the Visitor Center, located at the intersection of Highways 49 and 115. Visitors may obtain a Refuge leaflet and map from one of the dispensers located at each of the five entrances. The bus will depart from the Visitor Center parking-lot promptly at 8 p.m. on Saturdays, July 18, 25, and August 1. A \$5.00 per person reservation fee will be collected at the time of check-in. 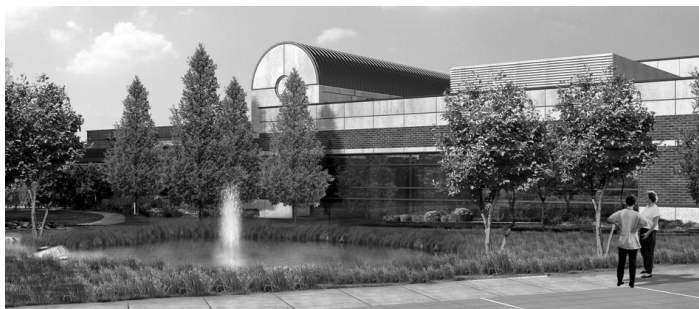
