Speakers will included instructors and graduates of the OU legal assistant program and representatives of professional paralegal organizations.

The OU Department of Legal Assistant Education is now enrolling students for classes that begin in August, 2008. The courses

The University of Oklahoma are designed to train individuals as paralegals for careers in private, corporate, and government lawrelated activities.

> "Legal assistants, or paralegals, work with attorneys to provide legal services to clients," said David A. Poarch, director of the department and assistant dean of the OU College of Law. "Economic surveys indicate that the demand for paralegals will continue to increase. Many of our students already work in the legal field and want more training. Others are seeking to begin new careers in law."

Classes are offered on Saturdays at the OU Law Center in order to allow students to continue working while studying for their certificate. The classes are taught by lawyers, law professors, and legal assistants who specialize in various areas of law. Completion of the OU legal assistant education program, which has been approved by the American Bar Association since 1986, will provide the skills necessary to perform a variety of law-related tasks, including legal research, and drafting legal documents.

TIM RUSSERT A MAN FOR ALL SEASONS

When Tim Russert died on Friday, June 13, he was at the top of his profession. As the moderator of "Meet the Press," he set the standard for political interviews. As the NBC political analyst, he earned the trust of millions of viewers. As the election night anchor, he was the final voice that viewers awaited to determine who were the winners at the polls. As the NBC Washington Bureau Chief, he assembled a staff that overshadowed the other networks. When he died suddenly at work, he left a vacancy that no one person can ever fill.

But Tim Russert was much more than an outstanding journalist. Even more importantly than his professional accomplishments, he was a devoted son, a dedicated father, and a loving husband. In spite of his hectic schedule, which sometimes began at 7 a.m. and ended at midnight, he found time to nurture all of those around him, from his elderly father, to his teenage son, to his wife, who also is an accomplished writer, and on to his many colleagues, who admired and loved him. He also found time to write two best-selling books, one of which beautifully illustrated his love for his father and his loyalty to his hometown of Buffalo, New York, and his pride in his small town, blue collar roots. His first book, Big

<u>Russ</u> and <u>Me</u>, is a moving tribute to his father, who worked two jobs all of his career to provide for his family. Russert celebrates his father's selfless dedication to his children and his strong values that shaped his children's characters as they grew up. While the book is certainly an impressive portrait of his father, it is also a profile of Tim Russert himself. It shows his strong work ethic, his love for his father and his own family, his firm personal values, and his loyalty to his roots. We see a picture of Tim Russert which perfectly illustrates why so many people, the famous and the common, respected and loved him. In the many tributes to Tim Russert which were broadcast and published in the days following his death, there emerged a picture of a man who was truly a man for all seasons.

As a book reviewer, I have been impressed by both of Russert's books. I have reviewed Big Russ and Me several times. Audiences love this tribute to his father. I recently purchased Wisdom of Our Fathers for both of my sons. Both of these books were on the New York Times best seller list.

As a devout Roman Catholic, Tim Russert attended Jesuit schools where the teachers demanded discipline and scholarship. The rigorous Jesuit

education prepared him well for his college work at another Catholic school, John Carroll University in Cleveland. His years in college fostered his interest in journalism and politics. After graduating from John Carroll University, he earned a law degree from Cleveland-Marshall College of Law. All of this prepared him for his work as a staff member for Senator Daniel Moynihan of New York. There he formed his career in journalism and politics. This background led him to his career at NBC News, where he rapidly climbed to the top of his profession.

Even though Tim Russert was a famous television personality, he never forgot what mattered most in life. He adored his father, whom he called Big Russ. He always paid tribute to his father's years when he worked for the Buffalo sanitation department by day and delivered bundles of newspapers by night to raise his family. He was an avid Buffalo Bills fan. He drank Rolling Rock beer, ate buffalo wings, and listened to Bruce Springsteen music. Above all things, he loved his son, Luke, who had graduated from Boston College only a few days before his father's death. Luke's eulogy for his father was the most moving tribute among the hundreds of tributes paid to Tim Russert. At Tim Russert's funeral, following moving tributes by Tom Brokaw, Mario Cuomo, Maria Shriver, and Doris Kearns Goodwin, Luke Russert, only twenty-two, eulogized his father as a father, friend, husband, son, and journalist. After his loving tribute to his father, Luke Russert ended his eulogy by saying that if his father were there, he would say the words that he always said at the end of a conversation: "Go get 'em!" The audience stood and applauded.

Tim Russert will be missed in many ways. We will miss his hearty laugh, his probing questions, his astute commentary, and his sheer love of covering politics. We will miss his election night coverage in November. We will miss his "Meet the Press" interviews.

NBC News will go on. Tom Brokaw will anchor "Meet The Press" for the remainder of this year. David Gregory, Keith Olderman, Ann Curry, and others will carry on with the reporting. Eventually, a replacement will be named to be Washington Bureau Chief. But no one person can replace this large Irishman with the round face, the loud laugh, and the sheer love for life that were trademarks of Tim Russert.

Western and country Hargrave. entertainers, Western film stars, authors and cowboy poets highlight this year's Gene Autry Oklahoma Film & Music Festival, held September 24-28 at the Gene Autry Oklahoma Museum.

Advance tickets are now on sale for this event that put the tiny town of Gene Autry, Oklahoma, on the map. It's located about 12 miles northeast of Ardmore, just east of Interstate 35. The town took its name from film star Gene Autry, who owned a ranch there in the 1930s and '40s.

Country superstar Gene Watson, whose hits include "Paper Rosie" and "Farewell Party," heads a strong list of headline performers that includes Les Gilliam, the Oklahoma Balladeer; Johnny Western, who played for both Gene Autry and Johnny Cash; and Eli Barsi, known as "Canada's Cowgirl." Others to be featured include Judy Coder & Pride of the Prairie. a Kansas-based Western ensemble; singer/songwriter Terry Smith ("Far-side Banks of Jordan"); the hilarious O'Roark Brothers: and Western swing/ rockabilly singer Liz Talley from Houston.

Film star guests at the Film & Music Festival include Robert Fuller (Laramie), Barry Corbin (Lonesome Dove), Lisa Montell (Gunsmoke, Maverick), Roberta Shore (The Virginian) and Don Reynolds, Jr. (Little Beaver). (Mr. Corbin will be attending if he is not involved in a film project at that time.)



Our Annual Quality Water Report is being posted in our local newspapers and will not be mailed to each individual customer. We want to keep you informed about the excellent water and services we have delivered to you over the past year. Our goal is and always has been, to provide to you a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. Our water source is ground water drawn from 3 water wells. The water wells are approximately 80 feet deep and are produced from the Purcell sandstone aquifer.

We have a source water protection plan available from our office that shows the vulnerability low. I'm pleased to report that our drinking water is safe and meets Federal and Sate requirements.

If you have any questions about this report or concerning your water utility, please contact Derek Taylor at 405-756-2440. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water utility. If you want to learn more, please attend any of our regularly scheduled meetings. They are held on the second Wednesday of each month at 6 p.m. unless otherwise posted. The meetings are held at 401 South Main, Lindsay, OK 73052.

Garvin County Rural Water District #2 routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. This table shows the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2007. (Some of our data may be more than one year old because the state allows us to monitor for some contaminants less often than once per year.) All drinking water, including bottled drinking water, may be reasonably expected to contain at least small amounts of some constituents. It's important to remember that the presence of these constituents does not necessarily pose a health risk.

Water Quality Data Table

The table below lists all of the drinking water contaminants we detected for the calendar year of this report. The presence of contaminants in the water does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. Unless otherwise note, the data presented in this table is from testing done in the calendar year of the report.

In this table, you will find many terms and abbreviations you might not be familiar with. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Non-Detects (ND)-laboratory analysis indicates that the constituent is not present.

Treatment Technique (TT)-(mandatory language) A treatment technique is a required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Inadequately treated water may contain disease-causing organisms. These organisms include bacteria, viruses, and parasites, which can cause symptoms such as nausea, cramps, diarrhea, and associated headaches.

As you can see by the table, our system had no violations. We are proud that your drinking water meets or exceeds all Federal and State requirements. We have learned through our monitoring and testing that some constituents have been detected. The EPA has determined that your water IS SAFE at these levels.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 800-426-4791.

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water before we teat it include:

*Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.

*Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturallyocurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.

*Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture and residential uses.

*Radioactive contaminants, which are naturally occurring.

*Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.

MCLs are set at very stringent levels. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated constituents, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having the described health effect.

In our continuing efforts to maintain a safe and dependable water supply it m ay be necessary to make improvements in your water system. The costs of these improvements may be reflected in the rate structure. Rate adjustments may be necessary in order to address these improvements.


