The Lindsay Municipal Swimming Pool hours are Tuesday through Saturday, 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. and Sunday, 1:30p.m. to 5:30 p.m. It will be closed on Monday. If interested contact the pool. The first session of swim lessons will start June 9 through June 20, June 23-July 3, and July 7-July 18. The Oklahoma Blood Institute (OBI) will also be in town that day for a blood drive.

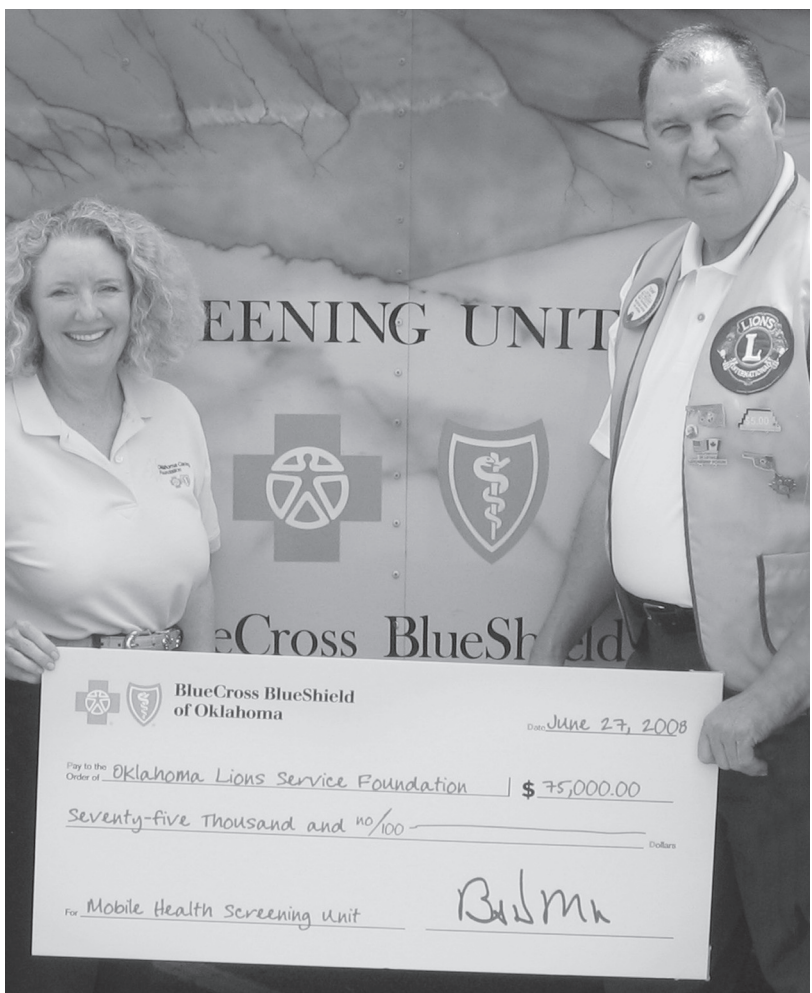
Towns selected for KOCO

Blue Cross And Blue Shield To Sponsor Lions Club Mobile Health Screening Units

Since 1998, nearly 60,000 free preventive health screenings have been provided to Oklahomans through a partnership between Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Oklahoma and the 209 Oklahoma Lions Clubs, and that partnership will continue with another contribution from Blue Cross and Blue Shield.

The insurer recently agreed to sponsor the successful Mobile Health Screening Unit (MHSU) program for the tenth straight year. The MHSU travels to visit Oklahoma communities nearly 100 days out of each year, bringing valuable health screenings and information to all parts of Oklahoma.

The MHSU provides a variety of free screenings — including vision, hearing, glaucoma, blood sugar, blood pressure

and bone density screenings — to communities throughout the state. Nearly one-fourth of tests reveal potential health concerns, and in those situations, patients are referred to their personal physicians for evaluation and appropriate follow-up care.

"The Lions are only one organization. We can't do everything, but with the Mobile Health Screening Unit we can impact people's lives and make a difference one life at a time, everywhere we can," said John Been, executive director, the Oklahoma Lions Service Foundation.

"It's our privilege to be involved with this impactful program," said Bert Marshall, president, Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Oklahoma. "Traveling the state, the Mobile Health Screening

Unit can reach rural areas and underserved populations who otherwise might not have access to these screenings. Through preventive efforts like these, we can make a real difference in the health of Oklahomans."

Okie Noodling Festival To Be Held In Pauls Valley

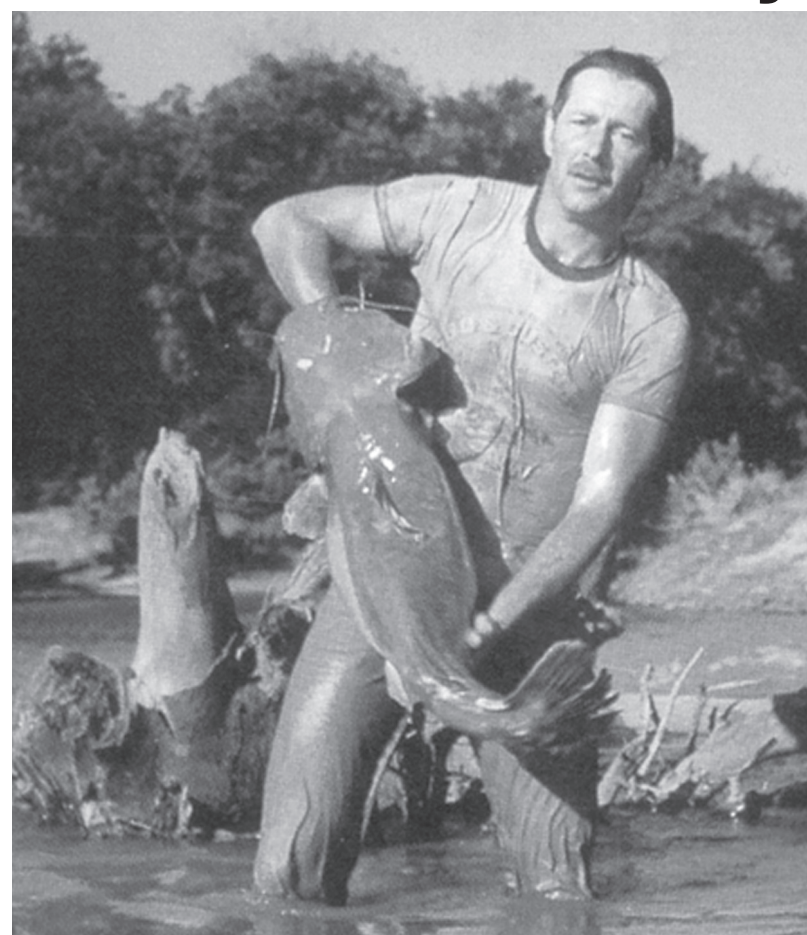
Extremely Okie

Matchbook Memories

WHERE HAVE ALL THE HEROES GONE?

In my boyhood years at Bradley, we had real heroes. Most of our heroes were war heroes or sports heroes. Since there was no television in 1945-1948, we followed the exploits of our heroes by reading about them in the newspaper or hearing about them on the radio. My family did not subscribe to a newspaper. I got my news from the *Chickasha Daily Express*, which I read each day at McCann's Store where Bess and Mac would leave the paper on the bench inside the front window. We had a small, white Philco radio with only limited range. Except for WKY in Oklahoma City and KWCO in Chickasha, the other stations were often weak and blurred with static. But I listened anyway. I listened to baseball on the Liberty Network with the Old Scotchman Gordon McLendon bringing us games from the magic cities of the east. And I listened to baseball and basketball broadcasts of the Oklahoma A&M Aggies and the Oklahoma University Sooners. I felt as if I knew Henry Iba, then called "Hank," the basketball coach of the Aggies, and Bruce Drake, the basketball coach of the Sooners. They were idols of mine, and their players were my heroes. Through the static, I would listen to the Sooner and Aggies games and try to imagine what the players looked like and what was happening on the basketball floor or on the baseball diamond.

For two weeks, I have spent long periods remembering those days. In the past few days, two of my heroes from those years have left this earth. On June 25, A.L. Bennett died in Tulsa. He was a two-time All-American guard for the Aggies in 1946 and 1947. On June 28, Babe Eubanks died in Midwest City. He was the shortstop for the Sooners in 1945-1947. I cut these obituaries out of *The Oklahoman* to send them to my friend, L.B. Hoyle, who is on an extended vacation in Ruidoso, New Mexico. In those far away years,

L.B. and I followed the Aggies and the Sooners with a kind of obsession. We knew their lineups, admired their coaches, and knew their records.

But there were a few things about our heroes that we did not know. They were things that were taken for granted in those years following World War II. Many of these players whom we idolized were World War II veterans who were part of "The Greatest Generation." They had left college to fight in the war, had served their country, and had returned to pick up their lives where they left off when they went away to war. Many of them had given up their best years to fight for their country. But they asked for no special favors. They returned and competed for a position on the team. Their coaches, the writers, and the broadcasters gave them no special recognition. In fact, until I read the obituaries of A.L. Bennett and Babe Eubanks, I was not aware that they were decorated combat veterans. But their war records have made them more admirable now in my mind.

A.L. Bennett was a classy guard for the Aggies, a starter on the 1946 Oklahoma A&M team that won the NCAA National Championship. He was a team leader, calm and determined. A receding hairline was the only indication that he was older than some of the other players.

I vividly recall one game when he hit two free throws to win the game as time expired. The game was an All-College tournament game in 1946. For some reason, I cannot recall whom the Aggies beat that night, but I can still almost hear the broadcast. The play-by-play announcer was Curt Gowdy, who went on to become one of the most famous sports broadcasters of all time and a member of the Broadcasters Hall of Fame. A young Curt Gowdy was calling the game for the Aggies.

It was a cold December night with sleet rattling against the north window of our small house in

Bradley. My bed was an army cot in the corner of our small living room. The small radio sat on a shelf near the gas heater, which provided the only light in the warm room. Through the static and the sound of sleet on the window, I listened to Curt Gowdy describe the end of the game. As time ran out, A.L. Bennett was fouled. The Aggies trailed by one point. With no time on the clock, Bennett hit both free throws to give the Aggies the victory. I still recall Curt Gowdy's game wrap-up. He said, "A.L. Bennett, with ice water in his veins, sank two free throws to give Hank Iba's Aggies the All-College victory." In those far away days, an announcer could use that description without sounding corny.

As I read A.L. Bennett's obituary this week, I came to a new understanding of his calmness and courage. Bennett served in General George Patton's Third Army and earned a Purple Heart when he was wounded in the Battle of the Bulge. A.L. Bennett had faced much greater trauma than two free throws to win the basketball game.

One of Bennett's teammates that year was Sam Aubrey, who went on to be an assistant coach for Mr. Iba for many years and to be head coach of the Cowboys for three years. Sam Aubrey won a Silver Star and a Purple Heart when he was wounded in Italy in September, 1944. When Sam Aubrey died on May 5, many people did not realize that he was a war hero. Both of these men were war heroes before they became sports heroes.

Babe Eubanks was another athlete who was a war hero before he became a sports hero. L.B. and I both admired him as the shortstop for the Sooners. But we knew nothing about his background. We had no idea that Babe had graduated from Pauls Valley High School in 1941, where he was a three sport, four year letterman in football, wrestling, and baseball. After attending the University of Maryland on a wrestling scholarship, he volunteered for the Army Air Corps. As a First Lieutenant in the 389th Bomb Group of the 8th Air Force, he flew 25 missions over Europe in B-17 Flying Fortresses. When he returned from the war, he enrolled at OU where he was a star shortstop for Coach Jack

Baer. Surely the threat of vicious line drives and bad hop ground balls paled in comparison to the anti-aircraft shells exploding around his B-17 in the skies over Germany. Man such as this were true heroes, forged in the fires of combat before they became college sports heroes.

For the ones of us who were young boys in those World War II years, modern sports heroes pale in comparison to men like A.L. Bennett and Babe Eubanks. Those men had

faced poverty in their childhood in the Great Depression, had looked death in the face in their young manhood, and had returned to compete against young men in their prime. Modern athletic heroes may be bigger, faster, and stronger, but they do not have the courage nor the determination nor the self-denial that marked these heroes from those long ago years.

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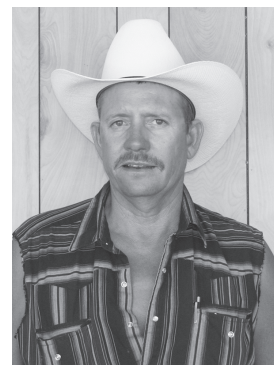
