

The Lindsay School Board met Monday to discuss the location of a proposed prison in Lindsay and holding an election for the citizens of Lindsay to vote for the prison to be built. The location is in question because it is less than a mile from the Lindsay School Fair Barn.

Several concerned citizens and members of the Industrial Foundation were present at the meeting.

In the special meeting Monday Mike Somers, representing the Lindsay Industrial Foundation, asked the School Board to consider the possibility of an agreement for the Foundation to rebuild the fairbarn at another location. The question was tabled because it was not on the agenda.

The School Board will meet at a later time to make a decision on the proposal.

Lisa Billy Helps Improve Lives Of Oklahoma Children

State Rep. Lisa J. Billy consistently supported legislation that would improve the lives of Oklahoma's children, according to a new report issued by the nonpartisan Oklahoma Institute for Child Advocacy.

"While many of the bills we face at the Legislature receive more press attention, those affecting the lives of children are truly some of the most important," said Billy, R-Purcell. "I appreciate the Oklahoma Institute for Child Advocacy's work on behalf of Oklahoma children and am honored to be recognized by the group."

Among the measures Billy supported that the OICA touted in its"2008 Legislative Report on Children and Youth" were a measure requiring additional physical exercise time for schoolchildren, a bill establishing a program to train therapists to work with autistic children, legislation requiring day care facilities to carry liability insurance, a measure creating scholarships for nursing students, and a bill requiring regular lockdown drills at schools to deal with worst-case scenarios.

Matchbook **Memories**

BACK TO SCHOOL PART II

As school begins, students are busy buying school supplies and school clothes. At Wal-Mart and other stores, parents can pick up a list of the supplies their children will need. The lists are long and specific, calling for certain kinds of pencils, pens, markers, paper, and folders. Backpacks are a necessity to carry all of the supplies and books required for each school day. School clothes are important to students, parents, and school officials. School clothes are often regulated to encourage better behavior at school. Some public schools have even begun to require students to wear school uniforms. As a teacher and a grandparent, I observe these school guidelines with mixed reactions. I am particularly interested in the changes that have come about since I was a young student.

When I was a student at Bradley, our school supplies were few and simple. In grade school, we might get a pencil box with 3 or 4 pencils, a ruler, scissors, a bottle of paste, and a Big Chief tablet. I loved to look at my school supplies before any of them had been used. I loved to write with newly-sharpened pencils. Even on the cheap, brittle Big Chief tablet paper, my words looked like magic to me. The ruler always reminded me of math, the bane of my life. Some of my friends ate their paste. I always wanted new textbooks that were clean and unmarked. I tried my best to keep my books clean and neat.

My grandchildren have so many school supplies. They have magic markers, felt tip pens, numerous notebooks, folders, calculators, and math aids such as compasses, protractors, and rulers. With all of these supplies, it is necessary that they have a backpack to carry it all. On the side of their backpacks, they have a small pocket for their cell phones. Their cell phones are supposed to be for emergency use only. I hope that is all they use them for. The backpacks are prestige items. They want a certain color and style. My granddaughter, LaurieBeth, must have a pink one. Last week, my grandson, Walker, who will be a fifth grader, picked out a camouflage backpack. It looks as if it would fit in on a dove hunting

trip. He loved it. In my youth, school clothes were very simple. We wore the same clothes to school that we wore at home, except we wore the newer ones to school. In grade school, almost everyone wore overalls and cotton shirts. A few boys wore what we called waist pants, either jeans or khakis. Shoes were made of leather, either work shoes, boots, or slippers. A few people wore their basketball shoes to school, what we called tennis shoes. They were almost always white Chuck Taylor models. However, Bill Mitchell had a cool pair of black basketball shoes called Skips.

The girls wore print dresses, skirts, blouses or sweaters, and jeans. Some wore head scarves to hold their hair in place. Designer jeans had never been seen. The clothes were modestly cut. I never remember a girl being reprimanded for wearing clothes that were too revealing.

Now all has changed. Schools have strict rules about clothing for both boys and girls. Rules forbid boys to wear jeans that are too low on the hips. Shirts that reveal too much skin or that are unbuttoned are forbidden. Gang colors such as black are forbidden in some schools. Clothes with large holes are also often banned.

Girls have more restrictions egarding the length of skirts, the cut of blouses, and holes that are too revealing. This month, my granddaughter bought school clothes with an eye to whether they would pass inspection at Oklahoma Bible Academy where she attends high school.

Some schools have passed a regulation that students must wear a kind of uniform, although the school officials prefer to call the rules a "revised student dress code." Elk City Public Schools have implemented a dress code that requires all boys to wear collared polo shirts, which must be tucked in at all times. The shirts must be brown, white, khaki or navy. Brown and white are the school colors. The boys

must wear khaki or navy slacks. Pants must be fitted at the waist and be worn with a belt if the pants have belt loops. Superintendent Galeard Roper said, "We won't be seeing any more holes in pants or boxer shorts peeking out of someone's pants." These rules will eliminate jeans and sweats as school attire.

The girls may wear khaki or navy slacks or khaki or navy colored skirts. For both boys and girls, all shoes must be closed-toe oxford or tennis shoes, which must have the same colored laces as the shoes or the laces that came with the shoes. Although some parents are against this new regulation, the Superintendent and the Board of Education believe it will improve education in the Elk City Public School

When I was a student at Bradley, we had little need for dress code regulations. We wore what we could afford. Since there were few wealthy people at Bradley, economic necessity created a kind of dress code of its own. If we were deprived children, we were gloriously unaware of our plight. In high school, I went to school with a light heart, proud of my clean, starched and ironed jeans and my starched and ironed khaki shirt.
