

The Miss Lindsay Scholarship Pageant and Miss Lindsay's Outstanding Teen Pageant will be held November 15, 2008 at 6 p.m. at the Lindsay High School Auditorium. The event is sponsored by the Lindsay Chamber of Commerce and Miss Lindsay Scholarship Pageant Committee.

Miss Lindsay serves as a goodwill ambassador for the Lindsay community, she represents the town of Lindsay at community functions and will represent the community in the Miss Oklahoma Pageant. She also serves as a mentor to her Oklahoma Star.

Miss Lindsay will receive a scholarship. The first and second runner-up will also win a scholarship and all the entrants will receive gifts and prizes.

Lindsay Leopards Defeat Blanchard Lions Homecoming Friday Against Pauls Valley

Lindsay used a balanced offensive attack and a punishing defense to thwart the Class 3A Blanchard Lions Friday night at Blanchard, 21-14.

Dakota Elledge started things off on the right foot for the Leopards as he intercepted a pass on Blanchard's first possession. The pick came on a third and 21 play as Kolby Webb exerted pressure on the Lion quarterback.

After exchanging possessions, the Leopards got rolling, with a 30 yard pass play from Tim Hamilton to Jordan Lukens to the Blanchard 34. That combination hooked up again as Lukens gathered in a 10 yard pass in the end zone for the first score of the game. The extra point was wide left, and with 5:41 remaining in the first quarter, the Leopards led. 6-0.

Mason Blake and Dakota Elledge came up with solid tackles on Blanchard's next series, forcing the Lions into a third and 11 from their own 31. Elledge came up with his second interception of the night, hauling in the pass on his own 28.

Hamilton and John Branch alternated carries, taking the ball to the Blanchard 40 before running out of downs. Elledge came up with a tremendous kick, punting the ball dead on the Blanchard seven yard line.

The next Blanchard drive stalled, and Lindsay took over on its own 46 as the first quarter ended. Branch carried the mail on the next series to the Blanchard 44 in two plays, then Hamilton found Jacob Harris streaking down the right side for a 31 yard pass completion to the Lion 14.

After moving the ball all the way to the one yard line, the Lions' defense stiffened, and the drive died on the Blanchard two

yard line on a bobbled snap on a Kris Milligan, Hamilton found field goal attempt.


Unable to move the football, Blanchard kicked the ball back to the Leopards, where Lukens fielded the ball in enemy territory on the 47. Blanchard picked off a Leopard pass on their own 30, only to see Elledge intercept his third pass of the night on the first play from scrimmage. The speedy defender raced into the end zone, only to see the touchdown called back because of a holding penalty.

Setting up on the Blanchard 25, the Leopards struck quickly, when on a third and 10, Lukens gathered in a pass with an acrobatic catch in the middle of the field, then somehow kept his balance, bear-crawling and bouncing to the six yard line. After a plunge into the middle by

Lukens in the left side of the end zone for the touchdown. After a 10 yard holding penalty on the two point conversion attempt, Hamilton found Carson Tate in the end zone and the sophomore gathered in the pass. With 4:24 remaining in the first half, the Leopards led, 14-0.

Despite great tackles by Milligan and Jo Dale Graham on the next series, Blanchard put together an impressive 67 yard drive, with quarterback Blake Stringer plunging the final two yards with 43 seconds remaining in the half. The kick was good, and the halftime score stood at Lindsay 14, Blanchard 7.

Janetta Maples and her husband Lonnie have recently relocated to Lindsay. They have a home in Commerce, OK, but now call Lindsay home. They are living with their daughter Amanda and her husband, Joe Nevilles.

Amanda opened her home to her parents so her mom could be close to her hospital in Dallas. Janetta had to be within three hours of the hospital. She is on a waiting list for a double lung

transplant. She was diagnosed in August 2000 with mycobacterium avium intracellular with lung abscesses.

The disease started with an infection in one lung, and then it moved into the second lung. Both her lungs are ruined. The doctors told her the disease is caused by birds or soil. They are unsure how

she contracted the disease. She was diagnosed in Enid and sent information to St. Louis, MO to get on a waiting list there. They were informed in April, 2008 that the St. Louis hospital didn't accept her insurance. She then went to Baylor Hospital in May, 2008 and underwent six days of tests and procedures.

She was officially placed on the transplant list August 7, 2008, on Amanda's birthday.

Of Double Lung Transplant The Nevilles opened their home to their parents. They have three children and Joe has family in the Lindsay community. His grandparents are Lester and Helena Carter. Joe recently was discharged from the United States Military and received a job offer here. Knowing that her parents needed to be close to Dallas they

> relocated here. Lonnie Maples is unable to work because he has to be able to be a caregiver for Janetta. She could be removed from the list if their is no one to care for her full time after the transplant. He is doing small jobs in the

> community. The Maples are now looking for the quickest way to get to Dallas when she is notified of a lung transplant. A flight would be ideal, but they know no one with a small plane. Any help would be appreciated.

> All prayers and financial help would also be greatly appreciated. The Maples do have insurance, but it only goes so far. They also have to pay for gas and lodging in Dallas when she is there. After the transplant they are looking at a 6 week to a year stay in Dallas. Their address is 914 W. Chickasaw and their phone number is 756-9764.

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

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

legislation passed recently with the acronym "A.C.E." This stands for "Achieving Classroom Excellence."

This legislation calls for more high stakes testing for students, particularly called "End-of-Instruction" tests.

Beginning with this year's freshman class, students must pass end-of-instruction tests in Algebra I and English II, as well as two more from the following: Biology, U.S. History, Algebra II, English II, and Geometry.

As soon as a student passes one of the tests, a label will be placed on his or her transcript indicating successful completion of this component.

The legislation states, "Beginning with students entering the ninth grade in 2008-2009, every student shall demonstrate mastery of the state academic content standards in the following subject areas in order to graduate from a public high school with a standard diploma."

So what happens if a student continually re-tests and is not able to pass the tests? Can they still graduate? Well, here's what we know at this point: Students who do not attain at least a satisfactory score on any end-of-instruction test shall be provided remediation and the opportunity to retake the test until at least a satisfactory score is attained on the tests of Algebra I, English II, and two

You may have heard of of the other tests required or an approved alternative test.

> The regulations go on to say that, "Students who do not meet the requirements of testing may graduate from a public high school with a standard diploma by demonstrating mastery of state academic content standards by alternative methods as approved by the State Board of Education.

> Although this high stakes testing actually starts with this year's freshmen in regard to diploma status, our upperclassmen have actually been taking these end-of-instruction tests since 2004. Algebra II, Geometry, and English III have recently been added to the original four.

Although we don't make a habit of talking about our student test scores, because we feel that testing is only one indicator of student success, we do feel it is important from time to let our patrons know how our students are comparing to students around the state.

Results of last year's end-ofinstruction tests are as follows: Algebra I: Lindsay 82% passing, state average 76%. English II: Lindsay 79% passing, state average 74%. Biology I: Lindsay 62% passing, state average 54%. U.S. History: Lindsay 85% passing, state average 63%. Algebra II: Lindsay 60% passing, state average 53%. Geometry: Lindsay 91% passing, state average 68%. English III: Lindsay 92% passing,

state average 75%.

There is still much work to do as we work our way through this process. During the next few years, the State Board of Education will be analyzing these scores and working to provide some type of method to determine mastery of these state academic content standards by alternative methods for those students who simply cannot pass the tests.

The A.C.E. legislation is still untested in regard to future challenges concerning the awarding of a regular diploma. It has, however, given hope to those who feel that a high

school diploma should be more meaningful in regard to academic accomplishment.

Even though this high stakes testing is now a part of our law, I still personally feel that a student who can master the social skills needed to complete a high school education, and who does his or her very best, deserves some kind of positive recognition. There's more to determining future success than a score on a piece of paper. Any student who gives his or her best effort and learns how to get along with others has gained some valuable attributes that will carry them far in this life.

four consecutive times, advancing the ball from his own 29 to the 45 before Hamilton found A.J. DePhillips with a first down pass to the Blanchard 44.

The Leopards were able to move the ball all the way to the 10 yard line before the drive stalled.

On Blanchard's first series of the third quarter, Ben Garner, John Pinnick, and Milligan all made big tackles, along with a fierce hit by John Holliman on the quarterback. The Lions moved the ball to the Lindsay 21, however, where they set up with a first and 10.

It was here that the Leopards came up with a stellar defensive stand, with Garner sacking the quarterback for a three yard loss, and Pinnick doing the same on a keeper around the right side for a loss of six. On third and 19, Holliman again put a convincing hit on the quarterback, forcing an incomplete pass. The Leopard defense held on fourth down, forcing another incomplete pass, and took over on their own 28.

After a couple of completions and one penalty, Branch blasted through the right side for a 37 vard gain to the Lion 25. The third quarter ended with Lindsay on the






The continuing saga of a rural mail carrier.
