Lindsay Falls Short of Pauls Valley Leopards Tackle Washington Friday

Pauls Valley's breakaway speed fueled a big-play offense to spoil Lindsay's Homecoming Friday night at Burford Field, 37-26.

Head Coach Tommy Ferguson's Leopards took a 2-0 record into the contest, and took the early lead after holding the Panthers on their first possession. John Branch carried most of the load on the first drive for the Leopards, finishing the 81 yard drive with a 12 yard burst up the middle. The extra point attempt was no good, and the Leopards led, 6-0, with 6:04 remaining in the first quarter.

Edgar Colmenares converted a 39 yard field goal on Pauls Valley's next possession to pull the Panthers within three with 4:22 remaining in the quarter.

Lindsay's offense continued to roll on their second possession,

with Jordan Lukens, Kris Milligan, and Branch alternating carries, taking the pigskin all the way down to the 10 before being pushed back to the 35 by penalties. It was here that Tim Hamilton connected with Lukens cutting across the middle of the field for the Leopards' second touchdown. The two point conversion attempt was no good, and with 15 seconds remaining in the quarter, the Leopards led, 12-3.

It didn't take Tyler Harding long to strike back for the Panthers, as the speedy scatback sped 73 yards on the first play of the second quarter. Colmenares' extra point closed the gap to 12-10.

The Leopards picked up a couple of first downs on their next series, and when the drive stalled, Dakota Elledge pinned the Panthers deep on their own

13. After a Harding first down to the 24, quarterback Caleb Livingston found wide receiver Casey Gardner, who had slipped behind the Leopard defenders. Gardner turned on the jets and raced 76 yards to paydirt. With Colmenares' extra point, the Leopards found themselves trailing, 17-12 with 7:48 remaining in the half.

Branch continued to gobble up yardage on the next drive for the Leopards, as he moved the ball all the way from the Lindsay 22 to the Panther 41 on four carries. A Leopard fumble killed the drive, and Pauls Valley had a chance to widen the lead.

John Pinnick and John Holiman combined to stuff Harding on his own 46 for no gain, and on a fourth down



Matchbook Memories

YANKEE STADIUM FAREWELL

"Turn out the lights. The party's over." Gisele McKenzie's voice echoed through my mind as I watched the ceremonies for the last game ever to be played in Yankee Stadium, that historic "House That Ruth Built." For several hours, television celebrated the history of that classic stadium. The former Yankee greats took the field at the positions where they once starred in that storied ballpark. The television screen showed replays of great moments in the history of the Yankees. Viewers saw the columns and plaques in Monument Park behind the center field fence, which memorialize Yankee greats from the past. The scoreboard flashed the lineup for the 1923 Yankees, who started the first game on that field 85 years ago. As the celebration went on, viewers were given an illustrated history of that historic stadium and the players who played there.

A number of the former Yankee players took their places on the field as they were introduced by Bob Sheppard, the public address announcer for the past 58 years. Yogi Berra was the star attraction for the on-field introductions. For old time baseball fans, Yogi represented the storied Yankee teams of the 1950s whose epic World Series battles with the Brooklyn Dodgers have become a part of baseball lore. Yogi took a deep bow as the crowd roared. Other Yankees from that era stirred my memories. Whitey Ford stood on the mound facing Yogi as he had so many times long ago. Beside him stood Don Larsen on the same mound where he had pitched the only perfect game in World Series history. As I looked at Larsen and Yogi standing on that historic field, I could still see the Dodger pinch hitter, Dale Mitchell, take the called third strike to end the game and Yogi run out to the mound and jump on Larsen in wild celebration. Another Yankee from that era, Tommy Henrich, stood at first base, a living reminder of the misery he dealt my Brooklyn Dodgers.

For the ones of us who lived through those years of the 1940s and 1950s, we knew who would have been standing in those positions if death had not taken them. In our minds, we could see Allie Reynolds, Vic Raschi, Eddie Lopat, Snuffy Stirnweiss, Phil Rizzuto, Billy Martin, Charlie Keller, Hank Bauer, and Joe DiMaggio, the greatest player ever to wear the Yankee pin stripes.

For me, one of the most touching scenes was acted out in center field. As the three great Yankee center fielders were recognized, the son of Mickey Mantle represented his father. The wife, son, and daughter of Bobby Murcer took the field representing him. Sadly, no one was present to represent Joe DiMaggio, perhaps the greatest center fielder of all time.

The large scoreboard screen and television screens all across America showed some of the classic scenes in Yankee history. Lou Gehrig's farewell address still brings tears to the eyes of all true baseball fans. Babe Ruth's home run swings were classics, but, for me, the most touching Babe Ruth scene was his farewell address at Yankee Stadium only a few days before his death in 1948, his voice barely audible from the throat cancer that was killing him. The screen showed the

generally impassive Joe DiMaggio kicking the dirt at second base after Al Gionfriddo, a diminutive substitute left fielder for the Brooklyn Dodgers, robbed him of a home run with a spectacular running catch in front of the bullpen fence in the 1947 World Series. Of course, there would be the film of Jackie Robinson stealing home in the 1949 World Series and Yogi Berra screaming at the umpire that he was out. In the announcer's booth Sunday night, Yogi still insisted that Jackie was out nearly sixty years after that thrilling play.

Even though the Yankees will not make the playoffs this year, Sunday night's last game at Yankee Stadium was thrilling. The Yankees won in Yankee fashion with two home runs. As I watched that last game, my mind traveled back sixty-one years to the World Series of 1947 when I first began to listen to baseball on the radio. I listened to those games in the living room of the Jack Branch home as Jack, E.J., Bill, Bryan, and I cheered our teams on, with me cheering for the Dodgers while the others yelled for the Yankees. Over the past 61 years, baseball has been a part of my life. But when the lights of Yankee Stadium went out on Sunday night, a part of my life went dark. I could imagine a long line of ghostly figures—Ruth, Gehrig, DiMaggio, Mantle, and a long line of other Yankees—standing with their heads bowed and their caps held over their hearts as the lights faded to black in Yankee Stadium.

News from the State Capitol

An Update from State Rep. Lisa Billy

The Oklahoma taxpayers are big winners.

And that's not just because there is less of a tax burden for the citizens of this great state now than just a few years ago, but also because Oklahoma now has an impeccable AA+ bond rating.

To put that in normal terms, your state has a very high credit score now. This just means your tax dollar will be able to go further than ever before.

This increase – from the Standard and Poor's Rating Services – is the first time that Oklahoma's bond rating has increased in nearly 50 years. This new rating puts our state ahead of many states in our region, including Arkansas, Colorado, Louisiana and Texas. According to S&P, this positive rating is due in larger part to strengthened financial policies and positive action by the legislature to address the large unfunded liability in state pension systems.

There were also some other reasons why our bond rating was increased:

- Government efficiency: In the past few years, taxes have been decreased and infrastructure needs have been better addressed.
- Efforts to repair the Unfunded Actuarial Liability situation, which was created by years of unfunded and politically-motivated retirement benefit increases.

■ Keeping the "Rainy Day" fund intact. For the past four years, this special emergency savings account has been at the state-mandated maximum of \$596.6 million. Keeping it packed has been a big help for us.

■ Low unemployment. Oklahoma has been fortunate to have a pro-business mindset and an environment that fosters economic growth. Keeping and creating jobs for our citizens has been a major positive for our economy.

All of this means borrowing for capital projects will be cheaper. Less of your tax dollars will fund a certain project, whether it is road reconstruction or renovating a building. That is great news for Oklahoma because it means fiscal responsibility will remain a high priority while still being able to take care of this state's needs.

But ultimately and most importantly, this rating increase is a sign that Oklahoma's economic health is doing great and that the future financial picture is bright. And a bright financial picture will be good for businesses big and small and good for your pocketbook as well.

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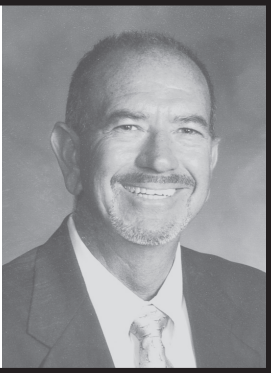

(Continued from page 1) fake punt attempt, Kolby Webb hauled down Livingston at mid-field to hand the ball back to the Leopards.

After a couple of dropped passes by the usually sure-handed Leopard receivers, Pauls Valley took over again. A sure touchdown on a 74 yard pass play to Gardner was nullified by a late illegal block, but the Panthers still had great field position on the Lindsay 11.

Lukens threw Harding for a loss back to the 14 on the first play, then Milligan, Ben Garner, and Pinnick combined to sack Livingston all the way back to the 24. Lukens and Harris broke up a third down pass attempt, but the strong leg of Colmenares booted a 40 yard field goal with 58 seconds remaining in the half to give the Panthers a 20-12 lead.

Lindsay received to start the second half, and a Hamilton-to-Milligan 29 yard pass took the Leopards inside Panther territory to the 46 before the drive stalled. Elledge got off another good kick, pinning the Panthers on their own 10 yard line.

Lightning struck for the Panthers in the form of Harding, as the speedster found an opening around the right side and dashed 90 yards to stretch the lead to 27-12 with 8:55 remaining in the third period.

The Leopard passing game got going on the next drive, as, on a third and 10, Hamilton connected with Jacob Harris on a 41 yard pass play all the way to the Panther 32. The same duo teamed up again as Harris gathered in the 32 yard touchdown pass, falling into the right front corner of the end zone. Hamilton pitched to Branch, who took it in for the two point conversion, and the Leopards had fought back to 27-20 with 6:09 left in the third.

Pauls Valley rode the legs of Harding to another touchdown, as he exploded through the left side for a 30 yard score to stretch the lead to 34-20 with 3:51 remaining in the third period.

Hamilton's accurate passing paid dividends on the next series, with the well-covered Elledge making a great catch for a 40 yard completion to the Panther 25, but the Leopards ran out of downs.

On a fourth and six in their own territory, the Panthers attempted another fake punt, and once again the Leopards made them pay as Lukens raced in at full speed, intercepted, and took

it all the way back to the Pauls Valley 30.

The Leopards continued to grind out yardage on the ground, as Branch took it to the 17, to the eight, then to the one, where good blocking by the offensive line enabled him to burst into the end zone. The kick was wide left, but with 10:14 remaining in the contest, the Leopards had crept within a touchdown, 34-26.

After the Panthers had driven to the Lindsay 23 yard line, Joe Dale Graham tackled Harding for a four yard loss, and, after an incomplete pass on fourth down, the Leopards had held.

The Leopards moved to midfield, and it looked as if they had picked up a big first down on a pass to Milligan. However, the officials ruled that Hamilton had crossed the line of scrimmage, and the locals had to punt.

Garner sacked Livingston a third and long, and the Panthers punted back to the Leopards as the clock was winding down inside of three minutes. With 2:07 remaining, the Leopards had a chance for some familiar last-minute heroics.

It was not meant to be on this Friday night, however, as Hank Graham stepped in the passing lane and picked off Hamilton's first throw of the drive. Graham took it all the way to the Leopard one yard line before going out of bounds.

Pauls Valley encountered a stubborn Leopard defense and was unable to find the goal line from here, being pushed back to the three on three successive running plays. With five seconds remaining on the clock, Colmenares booted another field goal to put the game out of reach with a 37-26 final score.

Head Coach Tommy Ferguson was complimentary of the Pauls Valley Coaching Staff. "They did a good job of changing their game plan for us. They were physical and did a good job of getting the ball in their playmakers' hands," he explained.

As for the Leopards, Ferguson stated that "We have to get more physical and more disciplined if we're going to compete in this district race."

Ferguson is concerned about this week's opponent, the Washington Warriors, as the Leopards go on the road to open district play. "They're a typical Washington team," he stated.

"They have a big running back who will run over you and they're as physical as anybody we've played," he concluded.

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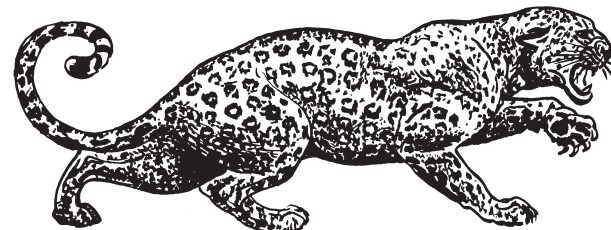
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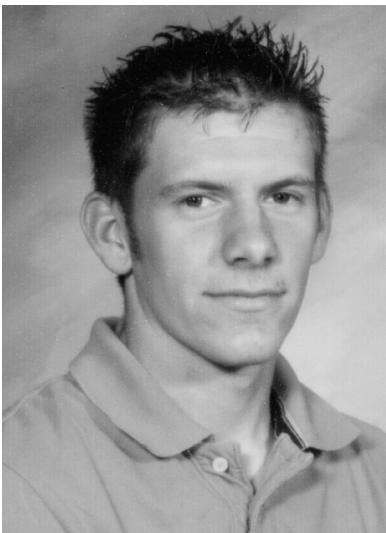

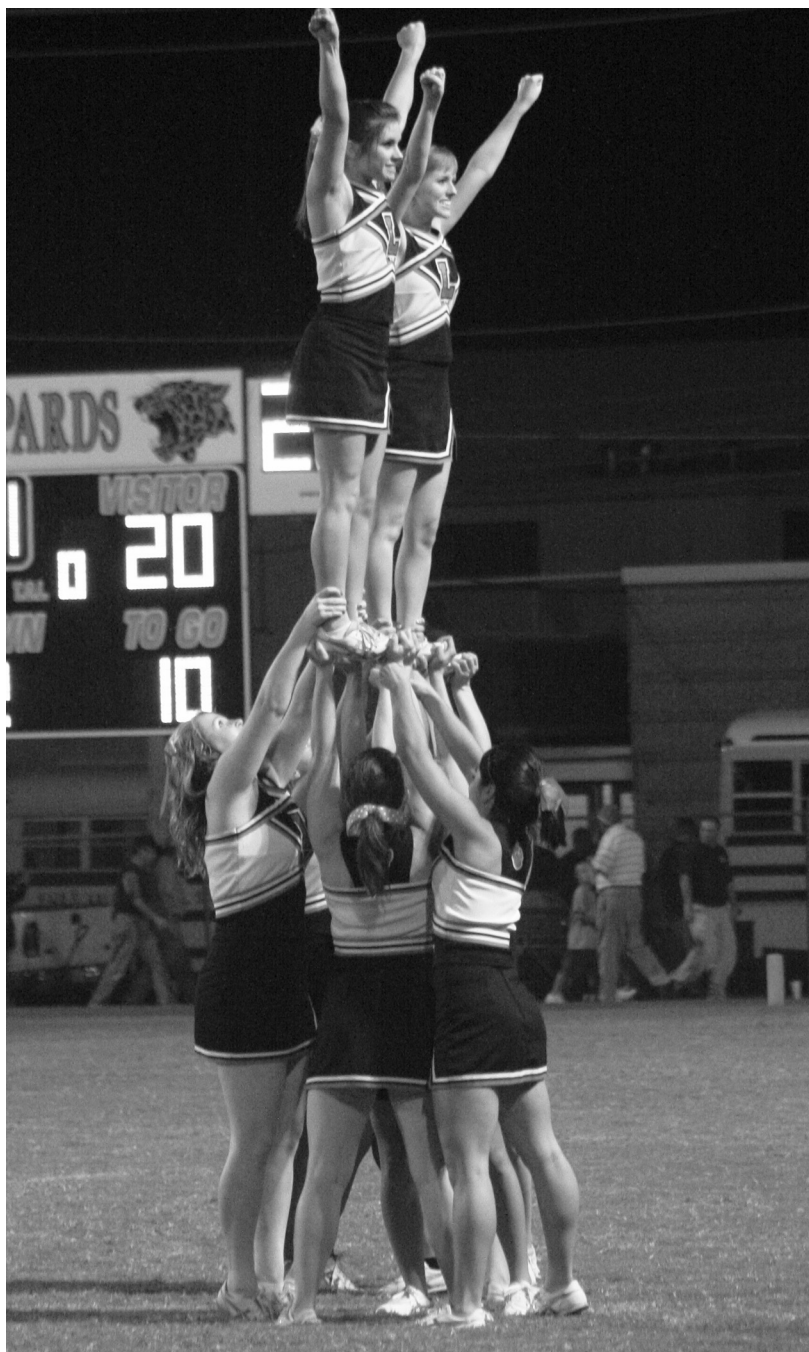
