

District Crown Brought Home To Lindsay

Lindsay's Leopardette Softball Team provided the home-town fans with some real excitement last Friday, as they snatched victory from the jaws of defeat in a thrilling district championship game.

After losing the first game in the best-of-three tournament Thursday, 3-0, the Leopardettes came back to defeat Plainview 4-0 to live another day. The rubber match on Friday was set to determine who would move on to Regional Play.

It appeared the two teams were about as evenly matched as they could be, with Plainview coming into the tournament with a 17-11 record and Lindsay standing at 15-11. After the first day of competition, that seemed to be the case.

As the championship game unfolded, the two teams traded blows, with neither being able to take command, going into the top of the seventh inning tied, 2-2.

That's when the Leopardette defense came up big. With runners

on first and third and one out, the Plainview hitter bounced a grounder to shortstop Deven Robbins who scooped up the ball and fired to Kylie Blough at first. Blough wheeled around and smoked the ball to home plate, where Christina Waite snatched the throw. The runner and the ball arrived at the same time, with Waite standing between the plate and the runner. When the smoke cleared, the umpire had to walk all the way around home plate to determine if Waite had held onto the ball. When she raised the glove, ball held tightly intact, the umpire called the runner out, and the crowd went wild! The double play ended the inning and the Leopardettes were coming to bat in the bottom of the seventh with a chance to win it!

Deven Robbins worked the pitcher to a 3 and 2 count, then drew a walk to get things started in the bottom of the seventh. Kelsey Clary sacrificed Robbins to second. Pitcher Courtney Larischi reached

first on an error, and Kari Kennedy replaced her as a courtesy runner. Kennedy stole second on the first pitch to second baseman Sydney Pracht. With the game on the line, the freshman poked the ball to shortstop, and Robbins came charging home. The throw was hard, but a little off the mark, and Robbins slid home with the winning run! With a 3-2 victory, the Leopardettes advanced to the regional tournament.

Purcell will host the four-team tournament, with only one team advancing. Purcell will take on Marietta at 1:30 p.m. today (Thursday) followed by Lindsay and Comanche at 3 p.m. If the Leopardettes win the first game, they will play again at 6 p.m. If they lose the first game, they will play again at 4:30 p.m. in this double elimination format.

The tournament will conclude on Friday. Teams still standing will play at 2 p.m. and 3:30 p.m. if a second game is necessary.

Leopards Lose District Opener Face Hobart Friday

Lindsay fought back from a 17-3 halftime deficit to tie the score, only to see Washington score two late fourth quarter touchdowns to defeat the Leopards, 31-17 in the district opener for both teams Friday night at Washington.

Plagued by turnovers all night long, the Leopards made a valiant second half comeback, led by a strong defense in the third quarter, only to see that effort fall short as Washington rode the strong running of Josh Zimmer to claim the victory.

Washington took the opening kickoff all the way to paydirt as Justin Noel received the ball on his own 15 yard line and took off around the left side of the field, finding daylight and outracing the Leopard defenders to the end zone. Eric Smith's extra point gave the Warriors the 7-0 lead with 11:44 remaining in the first quarter.

Lindsay was unable to move the ball on its first possession, and Washington took over on its own 29. The Leopards capitalized on a big hit by John Pinnick on quarterback Madden as Kolby Webb recovered the fumble on the Washington 20.

Unable to find the end zone, the Leopards opted for a 21 yard field goal attempt by Tim

Lindsay drove to Washington's 30 yard line on its next series before Chance Pistole picked off a Hamilton pass, which he returned to his own 42.

Big Tim Bohannon, making his first start for the Leopards this year, sacked Madden for an eight yard loss on second down to put the Warriors in a passing situation. After failing to convert, the Warriors turned the ball over to the Leopards on the Lindsay 10.

Matchbook Memories

LOOKING BACKWARD AND FORWARD

Historians look backward. They try to record the events of the past. They attempt to explain what happened in the past and to assess the importance of historical events. Politicians look forward. They try to predict what the future holds and to prepare their constituents for what lies ahead. The ones of us who remember history and anticipate what lies ahead attempt to do both. We try to remember the past as it relates to the present. And we look toward the future through the prism of our own experiences. Whether or not our attempts are successful, the experience is fascinating.

For the past few days, I have watched the financial crisis develop with a sense of objective detachment. I realize the seriousness of the situation, but I also believe that this crisis will pass without the collapse of the American financial system. I have tried to juxtapose this crisis with the Wall Street crash of 1929. Although I was not born until three years after that catastrophic event, I have studied those years with a kind of fascination. And I can remember the years of recovery during the Great Depression in America. I can see few similarities in the two great Wall Street crashes.

In 1929, America was thriving as never before. Like now, the Wall Street bankers were out of control. They were taking huge risks without concern for the welfare of the nation. Like Oklahoma bankers during the oil boom of the 1980s, those financial barons could not imagine that disaster could strike in a flash. As it was in the 1980s in Oklahoma and in 1929 on Wall Street, greed brought disaster. The church writers of the Middle Ages were right: greed is one of the worst of the Seven Deadly Sins.

When Wall Street crashed on October 29, 1929, the American economy crashed with it. People who had been millionaires in the morning were penniless as the closing bell rang on Wall Street

that afternoon. Successful men jumped from tall buildings. Men shot themselves. Banks locked their doors. Businesses closed. Before the year ended, successful businessmen were selling apples on street corners and standing in soup lines to survive. There was no FDIC to insure that bank deposits were safe. When the banks closed, businesses had no funds to operate. Without loans and capital, many businesses simply disappeared. When the American financial structure collapsed in 1929, so did the financial structure of many other nations around the world.

The first presidential race after the Wall Street crash had many similarities to our present presidential race. Just as President Bush is being blamed for many of our present financial woes, so was President Hoover blamed for the financial crash of 1929. The poverty-ridden camps where Oklahoma migrant workers gathered in California were called Hoovervilles. Pants pockets turned inside out to show their emptiness

were called Hoover flags. When Franklin D. Roosevelt began his presidential campaign in 1932, his main campaign promise was to bring America back to economic prosperity. In the present presidential campaign, the emphasis has quickly changed from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan to the economic issues that have exploded on Wall Street in the last few days.

But the times are different now. Although the financial crisis is very real, most of our national economy is strong. Farm prices are strong. The oil industry is thriving. Businesses are prospering. Although stock prices have fallen, personal bank accounts are safe.

When times get hard enough and the economy gets bad enough, Congress and the President will act to restore order instead of hunker down to protect their own offices. The next few weeks will show us what we are made of. As in the Great Depression, as in World War II, as in the oil bust, Americans will rise to the challenge. Whichever candidate is elected President, that person will call upon the American people to restore order to our economy. I believe that the greedy money changers will be driven from the temples of Wall Street and that America will prosper once again.



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

It didn't take Pistole long to repeat the damage, as he intercepted Hamilton again on the Leopard 20. The Lindsay defense stiffened and held the Warriors to no gain on three plays, but the sure-footed Smith booted a 38 yard field goal to give Washington a 17-3 lead with 6:39 remaining in the first half.

The turnover bug continued to bite the Leopards on the ensuing kickoff, as a fumble returned the ball to the Warriors on the Lindsay 28. Bohannon and Millsap teamed up on two consecutive plays to hold the Warriors on third and fourth downs. Big Ben Garner also contributed on the fourth down play.

This defensive stand propelled the Leopards, as on their next series, Hamilton pitched to Jordan Lukens, who completed a 52 yard pass to Jacob Harris. Harris took the ball inside Warrior territory to the 30 before being tackled. The Leopards moved all the way to the four yard line, where a fumble killed the drive.

John Holliman sacked Madden for a seven yard loss on Washington's next possession, creating a third and 17 situation. The Leopards held, and received the ball on their own 12 yard line as the half was drawing to a close. Lindsay moved to the 27 before Stroard Lanliam intercepted. The first half ended with the Leopards trailing, 17-3.

Lindsay received to begin the second half and drove 60 yards to score, as Hamilton hooked up with Harris and Carson Tate to gobble up yardage through the air, with Barry Cramton and Kris Milligan handling the running duties. Hamilton found the end zone on a two yard keeper around the right side. The extra point attempt was blocked by Cody Grace, but the Leopards had crept to within a touchdown at 17-9 with 9:08 remaining in the third.

Washington did not pick up a first down in the third quarter, as a rejuvenated Leopard defense, led by Bohannon, continued to force punting situations. A 37 yard pass play from Hamilton to Tate moved the Leopards into Warrior territory late in the quarter, but penalties moved them back to their own 45. Lanlian intercepted Hamilton on a fourth down pass, but Tate fought through blockers to down him on his own 20.

After exchanging possessions, Lindsay penetrated to the Washington 36 on a great leaping catch by Harris, but once again, the relentless Warrior secondary picked off another pass to stall the Leopards on the Washington five yard line. That's the way the quarter would end, with the Warriors still on top, 17-9.

Good defensive pressure by the Leopards, led by Holliman, forced the Warriors into a punting situation early in the fourth. Pressure on the punter helped create a shanked punt, with Lindsay taking over in great field position on the Washington 22.

Lukens demonstrated his athletic ability with a tremendous catch and run, taking it all the way to the three yard line. On a third and goal, Hamilton found Tate in the left corner of the end zone to draw the Leopards within two. Lukens took the pitch, ran right,

then cut back hard to the inside where he raced into the end zone for the two point conversion to tie the score at 17-17 with 8:43 remaining in the contest.

Pinnick made a solid open field tackle to prevent a big runback by the Warriors. Joe Dale Graham and Harris combined to stop the Warriors on a third and two, and on fourth down, a pass fell incomplete, so the Leopards took over on their own 35 with 6:17 remaining.

Although it looked as if the momentum had swung in favor of the Leopards, the Warrior defense came up with a big stop, forcing Lindsay to punt the ball, and taking over on their own 31.

Zimmer took over at this point, as the Warriors simply handed him the ball and let him do his job. The tough running back didn't disappoint, as he cruised the final 41 yards of the drive for a touchdown with 2:27 left in the contest to put the Warriors back on top, 24-17.

With Lindsay fans poised for one more display of late-game heroics by the Leopards, it was not to be, as the ensuing kickoff was fumbled away, and the Warriors recovered on the Lindsay 17.

Although the Leopards put up a valiant defensive stand, a five yard touchdown pass to Pistole sealed the win for the Warriors with 1:16 remaining in the contest. The extra point extended the lead to 31-17.

If there was any question about the final outcome, Pistole intercepted again to squelch any possibility of a miracle finish by the Leopards.

Lindsay committed a total of nine turnovers in the contest, compared to two for Washington. "We have to do a better job of taking care of the ball next week if we're going to have a chance to beat Hobart," Coach Tommy Ferguson offered.

Ferguson went on to say that he was extremely proud of the effort Friday night. "Washington is a good football team, and we never quit. We played so much harder Friday than we did the week before it's not even funny," he continued.

Adding to the Head Coach's woes is the fact that at least five starters are banged up, and most will not be able to play against Hobart. John Branch, stellar running back, came out early in the game due to a shoulder injury. His status is unknown for Friday's game. Dakota Elledge and A.J. DePhillips, mainstays of the receiving core, are both hurt. Elledge has torn his hip flexor from his bone and will be out for approximately four weeks. DePhillips, who also came out in the first quarter, has a nasty leg bruise. Returning starter at defensive end Dakota Nelson tore his ACL on the opening kickoff of the season, and has not seen action since. Scatback Stephon Bradley has missed all four games with turf toe, and Barry Cramton is still having problems with a swollen knee.

This week's opponent, the Hobart Bearcats, defeated Crooked Oak in their district opener. The perennial playoff contender comes to Lindsay with a lot of speed and great tradition. With one loss, the Leopards are still poised to make a run at a first or second place finish in the district. This game will be a critical step in that process.

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

The Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge will be conducting "Stars Over The Wichitas" Interpretive Programs on October 24 and 25, 2008. The public is invited to participate in an evening with the stars, where they will study major constellations and other heavenly bodies. Bring your own telescope, or view the night skies through a 13" Dobsonian telescope. Star-gazing is enhanced at the Refuge because of its lack of major light pollution. An astronomy interpreter for the Association of Friends of the Wichitas will discuss the history of astronomy, its practical uses and goals, and will help visitors identify images found in the night sky. Reservations are required

and are taken on a first-come, first-served basis by calling the Visitor Center at 580-429-2151 between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. beginning Monday, October 6, 2008. There will be a \$5.00 per person reservation fee collected at the time of check-in. Due to the length of the program all participants must be at least eight years of age. The two-hour program begins 30 minutes after sunset. Participants will meet at the Boulder/Lost Lake picnic area entrance gate; located approximately one and one-half miles west of Camp Doris, then turn left onto the road leading to the Boulder/Lost Lake picnic areas. Visitors may obtain a Refuge leaflet/map from dispensers located at each of the five entrances. Binoculars and

a lawn chair are recommended. The program will be canceled if it is raining or if the sky is overcast. The Refuge's public interpretive program is intended for individuals and family units of six persons or less. Only one family's reservation will be accepted per telephone call. We regret we cannot offer group tours. Wheelchair access is available if requested at time of reservation. 




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
