As part of a national transformation in Girl Scouting Sooner Council has created new activities and has launched a new community outreach group to help local girls build strong leadership skills. Confronted by a national lack of data on girls and leadership, the Girl Scout Research Institute (GSRI) has launched a body of work to identify what girls need to succeed as leaders. This work is designed to support and accelerate a national transformation launched in 2006 to modernize Girl Scouting as the premier leadership experience for girls in the 21st century.

The Girl Scout Research institute has released a new review of research on girls and leadership, "Exploring Girls' Leadership," that identifies a lack of gender-specific data on youth leadership. To address the need for further research, the GSRI has begun an original national study scheduled for release in Spring 2008. In addition, the GSRI is developing tools to measure the new Girl Scout leadership programming to be introduced in Fall 2008.

"While many programs exist to help youth build leadership skills, very little data exists on how girls experience leadership and what they need to succeed in this arena," says Judy Schoenberg, Director of Research & Outreach for the Girl Scout Research Institute. "As the voice of girls, the Girl Scout Research Institute is taking on the task of identifying what girls need to develop their full leadership potential."

New Research Review: "Exploring Girls' Leadership"

The GSRI's new research review, "Exploring Girls" Leadership," analyzes the literature from the youth development and youth leadership fields and contrasts



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## **OKLAHOMA BOOKS** THE GRAPES OF WRATH **PARTI**

The Grapes of Wrath is undoubtedly the most famous, or infamous, book about Oklahoma and Oklahoma people. John Steinbeck's award winning novel traced the journey of the Joad family from Eastern Oklahoma to California in the Dust Bowl days of the 1930s. The novel is partly a sociological treatise on the terrible poverty of America in the 1930s. It is also a picture of the conflict between the "haves" and the "have nots."

On a figurative level, the novel shows a symbolic journey of the Children of Israel as they seek the Promised Land. The book faithfully portrays the Okies in their attempt to find a new home in the promised land of California. In the charaterization, Steinbeck creates memorable characters who illustrate that era in American history.

As the novel opens, the Joad family is leaving their home in Eastern Oklahoma where they have been "tractored" off their land. After years of drought, the bank has taken over their land. As they prepare to drive away from their farm, a tractor is plowing the land. The operator wears a dust mask, like an alien in a strange land. Without swerving, the tractor plows up the yard and pushes the house off its foundation. Tom Joad thinks he would like to shoot the driver, but then he says it is not really the driver's fault. He is an employee of the bank. And Tom thinks, you can't shoot a bank.

When Steinbeck created the Joad family and gave them the name"Okies," he created a symbol of poor migrant workers that has lived through the years. In a dilapidated truck with all of their possession piled on top and tied to the sides, the whole family heads down Route 66, "The Mother Road," to California. They encounter many more families making the same sad trek. They are all Dust Bowl displaced persons seeking an escape from poverty and a new beginning in California.

Like all of the other "Okies," the Joads are seeking a new life. They dream of California as a Garden of Eden where fruit hangs heavy on the trees, free for the taking. They imagine jobs with good pay and a pleasant climate. They believe that they are leaving poverty behind them forever.

Some critics saw Steinbeck's criticism of the capitalistic system and his picture of the plight of the workers as a kind of socialist doctrine. His sympathy for the oppressed workers and his criticism of the greedy farm owners struck others as a realistic picture of the social conditions of the time. Whichever side a reader might take, most people agreed that the book was a memorable account of a disturbing time in America.

Aside from its political message, The Grapes of Wrath created a major controversy because of the actions and language of some of its characters. Tom Joad,

the main character, has been in prison for killing a man in a fight. Pa Joad, the patriarch of the family, is a profane, lecherous old man. Jim Casey, the self-ordained preacher of the group, falls short of his calling by his sexual nature and his lack of a spiritual life. The novel generated a fire storm of criticism among traditional Christians.

The novel became the subject of fiery sermons from pulpits all across Oklahoma. Politicians complained that it gave Oklahoma a bad name across the nation. Censors sought to have the book banned in libraries and schools. Citizens in several towns held public book burnings where they collected copies of The Grapes of Wrath, piled them in the street, and set them on fire. Senators and Representatives attacked the novel on the floor of the State Capitol. Many parents forbade their children to read the novel. Even today, after nearly seven decades, The Grapes of Wrath still stirs some controversy.

But in this centennial year, there has been a renewed interest in this novel about the Dust Bowl, the Great Depression, and the plight of migrant workers. Some readers are rereading the novel from a different point of view. Some readers are approaching the novel from historical, social, and political points of view. Some believe that this work of fiction may present a clearer picture of that period in our history than all of the histories, government documents, and statistical studies. These readers believe that the story of the Joad family presents the best picture of that troubled time in Oklahoma and America.

(Continued from page 1) continued misperceptions with youths' realities and community approaches to leadership in the field. It also suggests areas for further study, such as the aspirational gap faced by girls who see themselves as leaders today but don't necessarily aspire to leadership roles as adults. In addition, the review gives voice to girls by including findings from a small online survey and focus groups of girls around the country.

"Our initial research shows that for girls leadership is about the qualities one has, rather than about a specific role or function, and is often viewed as a clear means toward an end – to make a difference in the world," says Schoenberg. GSRI's focus group research, conducted with hundreds of girls from 2004-2006, suggests that girls have a unique definition of leadership that emphasizes developing personal strength and interpersonal skills. The quantitative survey supports those findings and shows that girls ages 8 to18 believe that the qualities that good leaders need most are positive attitude, listening skills and confidence.

To address the need for further research, the GSRI is conducting an original national study with girls in and outside Girl Scouting, with mothers, and with boys. This research project explores girls' and boys' definitions of leadership, their perceptions and attitudes about leadership and leadership behaviors, and what they need to see themselves as leaders today and in the future. Results of this study will help GSUSA develop program and policy, and contribute to the dialogue about what it takes to grow and sustain girls' and boys' leadership aspirations through adulthood.

In fall 2008, Girl Scouts of the USA will launch the New Girl Scout Leadership Experience designed to provide girls ages 6 to 17 with expanded leadership opportunities. In

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


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# Country Music Singer Association Awards



Do You Have the Right Beneficiaries for Your IRA?

Do you invest in either a traditional or Roth IRA? If so, you're making a smart move, because an IRA offers you a tax-advantaged way to save money for retirement. And of course, you want to save as much as you can, because you could spend two or even three decades as a retiree. But if you don't use all your IRA funds, what will happen to them? It's up to you - but your decision can have a big impact on your family, so you'll want to plan carefully.

The dispersal of your IRA depends on the beneficiary or beneficiaries you've named. And when it comes to designating beneficiaries, you have several choices. Here are some of the most common ones:

You can designate your spouse. If you select your spouse as beneficiary, you are providing him or her with considerable flexibility in what to do with the money. That's because your surviving spouse can roll over the IRA assets into his or her own IRA. This allows your spouse to name new beneficiaries and postpone taking required minimum distributions until he or she reaches age 70-1/2

You can designate a child, grandchild or non-spouse beneficiary. If you name a child or grandchild as your IRA beneficiary, that person can take distributions based on his or her own life expectancy. If the beneficiary is a young person, the distributions can then be "stretched out" over a long period, which can help enhance the potential tax-deferred growth of your IRA assets.

You can name a trust as a beneficiary. You don't have to name a human being as your IRA beneficiary - you can name a trust, which is a legal arrangement giving you great control over how, and when, the IRA assets will be distributed. By designating a trust as beneficiary, you can accomplish any of several goals. For example, if you have remarried, a trust can provide a lifetime income stream to your current spouse, with the remaining assets ultimately passing to your children from an earlier marriage. A trust can also let you decide when your children or grandchildren can receive the assets in your IRA, and how much they can get at any one time. In addition, a trust can enable you to make charitable gifts while gaining tax benefits. (To create a trust, which can be a complex instrument, you'll need to consult with your legal advisor.)

You can name multiple beneficiaries. If you'd like to split your IRA among several children, you can name them all as beneficiaries. Once you die, the life expectancy of the oldest beneficiary generally will be used to determine the payout period for all the beneficiaries. However, each beneficiary can choose to create his or her own IRA, called an "inherited IRA," as long as all these separate accounts are established by December 31 of the year following your death. The inherited IRA owners can then take distributions based on their individual life expectancies.

Your financial and legal advisors can assist you in choosing appropriate IRA beneficiary designations. Take the time to choose wisely. After all, you've worked hard for many years to build your IRA, so you'll want to make sure it ends up in the right hands at the right times.

## Lindsay Loses To Hobart

It was senior night last Friday night as the Lindsay Leopards took on the Hobart Bearcats in a game where a win for the Leopards would have all but guaranteed them a spot in the playoffs. But the Hobart Bearcats stole the night and took advantage of five Leopard turnovers handing the Leopards a 25-7 loss.

The night started off on the wrong foot for the Leopards as Hobart would be on offense first. On the first play from scrimmage, Hobart quarterback found Taylan Goss hit T.J. Norman on a 70 touchdown reception. The extra point attempt was blocked but with only 18 seconds gone in the game Hobart had the 6-0 lead.

The Leopards first offensive possession started at their own 28 yard line. Three plays later the Leopards were facing 4th and 17 from the 21 yard line, but caught a break when the Bearcats were called for roughing the punter giving Lindsay a 1<sup>st</sup> down at their own 36 yard line. But the Leopards fumbled the ball on the very next play and Hobart recovered at the Lindsay 39 yard line. Four plays later the Bearcats were knocking on the door with a 1<sup>st</sup> down at the Lindsay 11 yard line. A holding call against Hobart moved the ball back to the 20 yard line, and running back Travis Bish was dropped for a four yard loss leaving Hobart facing 3rd and 23 from the 24 yard line. That's when Dakota Elledge picked off Goss's pass in the end zone and gave the Leopards the ball at their own 20 yard line.

But the Leopard offense still could not get untracked and the teams traded possessions. The Lindsay offense had great field position for it's third possession of the night starting at the Hobart 49 yard line. But on 3<sup>rd</sup> and two from the 21 yard line, Jordan Lukens pass was picked off by Hobart's Travis Ferguson and the Bearcats had the ball back on their own 32 yard line. And this time the Hobart defense made the Leopards pay as they went on a 7 play scoring drive with Goss hitting T.C. Bish on a 19 yard touchdown pass to cap off

their own 18 yard line and the Bearcats had their running game working. The drive took 11 plays with Blaine Richards finding the end zone from 5 yards out, and Travis Bish added the extra point. So with 8:15 to go in the game the Bearcats had the 25-7 lead and that is how the game would end.

Offensively the Leopards were led by Stephon Bradley with 15 carries for 72 yards. Dakota Nelson had 10 carries for 52 yards. Jesi Millsap had 3 carries for 15 yards and Jordan Lukens had 9 carries for 11 yards and a touchdown. Dakota Elledge had 2 carries for 6 yards and Barry Cramton had 2 carries for 4 yards to round out the Lindsay rushing game. Lukens was 2 for 10 passing for 54 yards and two interceptions. Elledge had one reception for 30 yards and Bob Garner had one reception for 24 vards.

The Leopard defense was led by Jesi Millsap with 17 tackles, followed by TJ Doan and Jordan Lukens with 8 tackles apiece. TJ Doan and Kolby Webb had 7 tackles each, while Ben Garner, Jordan McCullough and Bob Garner each had 6 tackles. Dakota Elledge also had two interceptions on the night.

The Leopards travel to Bridge Creek to take on the Bobcats for the final game of the regular season. Playoff chances for the Leopards are slim, but a win over Bridge Creek is a necessity if the Leopards are to have any chance at all. So everyone get out and cheer the Leopards on this Friday night. 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




