Lindsay Advances To Playoffs Travel To Davis For First Round

Closing out their regular season in style, the Lindsay Leopards defeated Riverside, 61-0 Friday night at Riverside.

Riverside came out looking for the upset on senior night, and for the first quarter of the ball game held their own against the playoff-bound Leopards. Once Lindsay's offensive machine finally got going, however, the outcome was never in doubt.

The first few possessions were interrupted by turnovers by both teams, as John Branch intercepted for the Leopards and returned the ball to the Riverside 39 behind a good block by Dakota Elledge.

Riverside's Derek Little turned the tables on the Leopards by intercepting the first Lindsay pass of the game on his own 15 yard line.

After a couple of exchanges, Riverside drove down to the Lindsay 25 yard line, where Zac Bustillos tackled James Altone to stop the drive.

Lindsay put together a 75 yard scoring drive, with Branch doing much of the damage as he ripped off 44 yards to the Riverside 31. After a penalty set the Leopards back to the Riverside 43, Tim Hamilton connected with Jacob

Harris to the 25. On a third and four, Branch broke through the right side of the line, then cut back to his left to score the first touchdown of the evening. The extra point was wide right, and the Leopards led, 6-0, with 1:54 left in the first quarter.

John Pinnick came up big on the next series for the Leopards, as he sacked the quarterback on a third and six. Riverside was able to pick up the first down to the Leopard 26, but Pinnick struck again on the next play, causing a fumble. Kolby Webb scooped up the loose football and rumbled 60 yards to paydirt. Lukens' extra point gave Lindsay a 13-0 lead

with 6:30 remaining in the half.

The rest of the first half saw Riverside intercepting and returning a pass to the Lindsay 35, and Lukens returning the favor, picking off a pass and returning to his own 27. Branch took off on a 28 yard scamper to the Riverside 45. Hamilton found Harris with a 25 yard pass to the 20. Branch then scored twice, the first one being called back on a hold, the second one revealing no flags, as he sprinted the same 20 yards to the end zone. Lukens' extra point was true, and the Leopards led, 20-0, at the half.

Matchbook Memories

THE OLD WARRIORS

They arrive quietly in the early morning hours. Sometimes alone, sometimes in pairs, the old warriors gather around tables, sit in booths, or line the counters in cafes, convenience stores, fast food places, or bank lobbies. Every morning, the old, gray-haired veterans gather for morning coffee, re-affirming that they have survived another day. As they slowly sip their coffee, they slip into the easy conversations that come only to those who have known each other for years and who share the brotherhood that exists only among comrades in arms.

The old warriors bear the marks of the years like campaign ribbons, worn with pride for what they represent. Their worn faces are mostly passive, calm in their declining years. Their eyes, too, are solemn and direct, having seen the worst of war and strife. Often mistaken for world-weariness, their placid demeanor reflects a kind of calm resignation that comes with having seen the worst of mankind in violent places around the world. They lean over their coffee cups, happy to have another day with old comrades.

Sometimes the old warriors laugh, sharing bad jokes about politics, modern life, and old age. Occasionally their language is bawdy, recalling days in barracks and bars long ago. Often war stories recall younger years in the far-flung battle fronts of the world. If you listen closely, you may hear names that trace the history of World War II and Korea. In the past month, I have heard old friends pronounce Guadalcanal, Anzio, the

Battle of the Bulge, Dachau, Ploesti, and Normandy, among many others. I have heard Heartbreak Ridge, Pork Chop Hill, the Naktong Bulge, and the Chosin Reservoir. And I have heard the nomenclature of war, the terms that the old warriors use to move a story along: M-1, Bazooka, T-34, Bouncing Betty, WP, MLR, P-38, B-24, B-17, and DMZ. The old warriors speak in a kind of verbal shorthand that only the initiated understand. Sometimes coffee shops sound like code centers.

On Tuesday, we paid tribute to these old warriors. We honored them for their service to our country. Young grade school students wrote letters to veterans they had never met, thanking them for their contributions to freedom. Two Lindsay Matchbook Memories readers, whom I have never met, sent me a "Thank You" card for my military service. A middle school in Weatherford hosted a breakfast and presented a patriotic program for veterans, which brought tears to the eyes of the old warriors gathered there.

All across America, there seems to be a wave of patriotism sweeping the land. As the years pass by, the ranks of the old warriors become thinner each day. Each day, flag-draped coffins appear in cemeteries across our land. The sounds of rifle volleys echo through cemeteries across America. Names of fallen warriors are engraved on Veterans Memorials in thousands of cemeteries. Comrades, friends, and relatives join the ranks of the fallen warriors, and Veterans Day brings this awareness

home to each of us.

On Veterans Day this year, I was more aware than ever of the legacy of the old warriors. Names kept running through my mind on Veterans Day. Some of the names were those of fallen comrades – Ernie Cooper and Greg Rother, my Army buddies, and George McCann and H.K. Covell, old Bradley friends. Some were the names of those still living–Byrd Austin, Roy Powell, Sonny Mitchusson, and my

brother, Jim, all veterans of World War II.

Early on Veterans Day morning, the old warriors gathered in the Mark Restaurant in Weatherford as they did in thousands of other coffee shops across America. One wore a cap with 11th Airborne paratrooper wings embroidered on the front; another wore a 45th Infantry Division cap; another entered on a walker, and another carried his portable oxygen tank, but all spoke with

pride of their service years.

As I sat among my friends, wearing my 76th Engineer cap, I realized once again the brotherhood I feel for them. I felt a sense of pride in being a part of this group of veterans. Many of the old warriors have left this earth, but what they accomplished will live forever in the freedom of America.

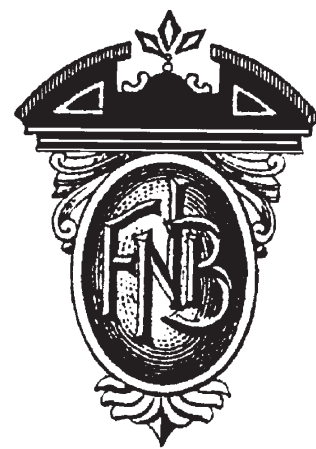

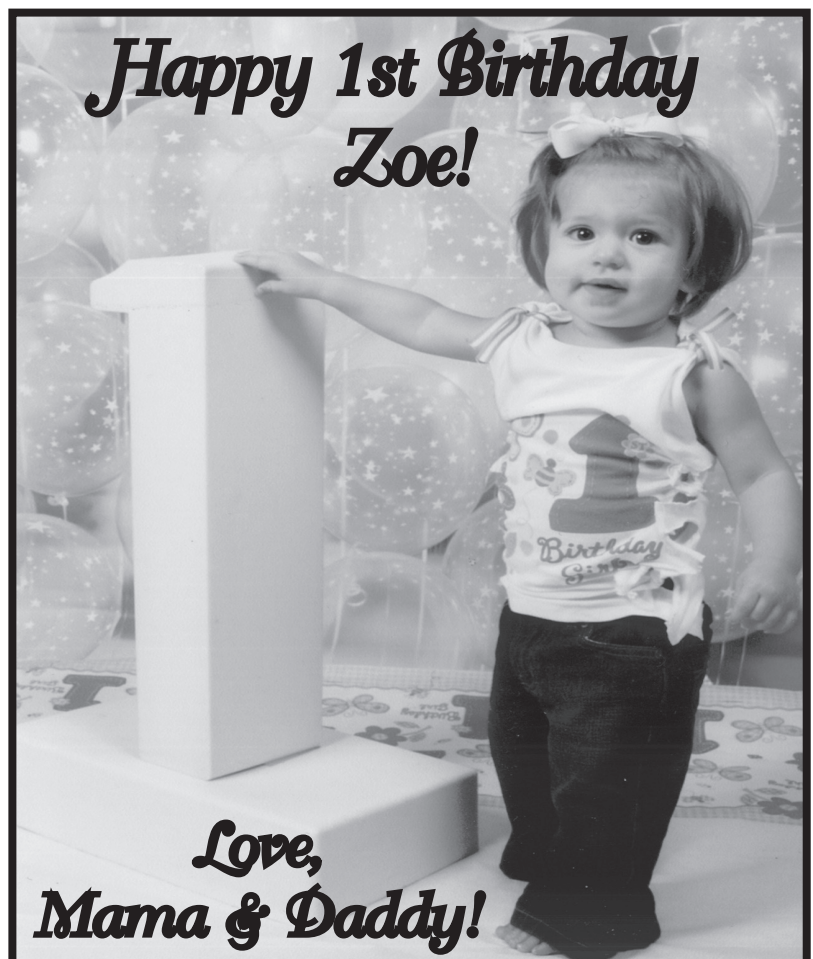
the church have also been working on several crafts to be sold. Please come early for the best selections.

IBC Bank together with Operation Interdependence are teaming up to show support for our troops overseas. The groups will send care packages to troops in time for the holidays.

The Operation Care Drop is currently going on and donations will be received from now until November 30. Donations will be accepted at the IBC Bank in Lindsay located at 420 S. Main Street.

Suggested donation items include beef jerky (pork is not permitted by Iraqi law), camper style foods, candy (not twist-wrapped), coffee packets, condiments from fast food restaurants, crackers, cookies chips (lunch size), dried fruit, granola bars, gum (not twist-wrapped), packets of instant oatmeal, packets of sugar, artificial sweetener, salt and pepper, powdered drink mix (non-alcoholic), tea bags, trail mix, nuts/seeds, tuna snack kits, and vienna sausages.

All toiletry items must be travel size and manufacturer sealed. Items that are determined unacceptable will be disposed of and not returned. Those items

needed are Advil/Tylenor (other OTC medications), anti-fungal medications, band-aid adhesive bandages, chapstick, contact lens solution, eye drops, dental floss, foot powder, hand sanitizer, kleenex, lotion, moist wipes, Neosporin, odor eaters (for boots), razors, shampoo, conditioner, hair gel, soap, sunblock, toilet paper, toothbrushes, and toothpaste.

Other suggested items needed include AA or AAA batteries, cameras (disposable), cd's (blank or music), crew socks, crossword puzzles, dvd's, electrical tape (small, thin rolls), flashlights, holiday greeting cards, magazine/newspaper article clippings, nerf toys (small footballs, etc.), pencils/pens, personal messages (cards, letters, etc.), phone cards, playing cards, sheets of stationery, small bungee cords, sunglasses, travel games, travel mugs.

Donations can be taken to any IBC Bank. A letter of support is encouraged to accompany any donations. Care package donations must fit in a quart-size Ziploc bag size 7" x 8".

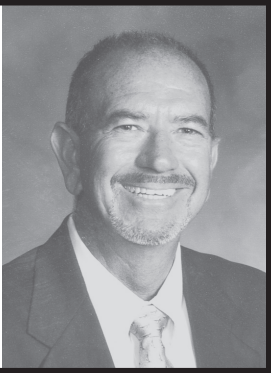
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Tall Tales

You may have heard about the book by Tom Brokaw called The Greatest Generation.

Brokaw coined this term to describe the World War II generation.

Brokaw believed "this is the greatest generation any society has produced." Since my parents and aunts and uncles all came from that generation, it is easy for me to agree with Mr. Brokaw.

Yes, I have personally seen the unselfishness of this generation. It's not just that they fought in World War II because they felt it was the right thing to do. It's the simplistic way in which so many of them lived their lives.

A classic example of this generation walked into my office a few weeks ago and handed me a check. When I looked at the size of the check, I looked back at him and said, "What would you like for us to do with this?" He told me to do whatever we wanted to do. We decided to use it to fill a pressing need, refurbishing of our high school computer lab equipment.

It's no secret who this man is. In fact, I believe his picture may be in the Lindsay News this week with some of our students. His name is E.L. Shoemake. He and his wife Marva Jean formed a partnership over many years as a loyal husband and wife and raised three fine sons.

When E.L. came up to the school last Friday at our request to take a picture, he was having a little trouble walking. It seems his health isn't the best these days, but he's still doing his best to stay active. As we walked down the hall toward the computer lab, we

visited about his family, and he told me how proud he was of his boys. "They take good care of me," he offered.

As we arrived at the computer lab, Mrs. Parker had arranged for some of her webpage students to greet Mr. Shoemake and take a picture with him as the students presented a plaque to him in memory of his late wife.

As I drove his car around the side of the building, it brought back bittersweet memories of my own parents as they reached their eighties. They didn't need a new car; the old one was "good enough."

E.L. is a stereotype of this generation of Americans. They didn't have to have the latest and newest of everything. They lived within their means so that their children and grandchildren could have better than they had.

Lindsay wasted no time in the third quarter, scoring three times in the first five and one-half minutes to put the game out of reach.

Branch did the honors on the first touchdown, after a 30 yard pass from Hamilton to Lukens and a pass to Carson Tate. The touchdown run covered five yards and gave the Leopards a 26-0 lead.

Jesi Millsap came up with a big sack on the next Riverside series, and the Leopards took over after a good return by Lukens, setting up on the Braves 37. Hamilton found Dakota Elledge behind the secondary, and Elledge walked a tightrope down the right sideline into the end zone. Lukens' kick stretched the lead to 33-0.

After holding Riverside on three plays, Hamilton connected with Lukens, who never broke stride as he raced into the end zone to bring the score to 39-0 with 6:31 left in the third.

Barry Cramton took the ball away from the Riverside ball-carrier on the next series on the Braves' 27. Hamilton was in a zone as he tossed the ball to Elledge for the touchdown that put the Leopards up 45-0 with 5:14 remaining in the third quarter.

Coach Tommy Ferguson turned over the game to his hard-playing reserves at this point, and they put the finishing touches on the Braves, holding them out of the end zone while tacking on two scores of their own.

Cody Owens provided a big hustle play on a bad snap by the Braves, and the Leopards took over on the Riverside 46 as the third quarter ended.

Owens scored on a 14 yard touchdown run with 9:06 remaining in the game, then Kris Milligan scrambled and passed to a wide-open Ethan Griffith for the two point conversion to put the Leopards up 53-0.

After holding the Braves, Josh Crosby ran to the Riverside 28, Milligan threw to Keeton Peery for a 20 yard pass completion to the eight, and Crosby carried the mail on two consecutive runs to put the ball in the end zone for the final score of the evening. Milligan found Joseph Lujan in the end zone for the conversion, and the final score stood at 61-0. Ferguson was pleased with the effort shown by the Leopards. "We started slow, but part of the reason was we were so aggressive we drew some penalties. We missed a few early passes, but exploded in the third quarter. I'm really proud of our offensive line. They did some great blocking out there," the head coach explained.

Ferguson went on to say that he was glad to get to see so many young kids play the past

few weeks. "It's fun to watch them grow up and get better," he continued.

The Leopards finished 8-2 overall in the regular season and 6-1 in the district, in a three-way tie for first. By virtue of the point system, however, they finished third, and will travel to Davis to face the Wolves Friday night in the first round of the playoffs.

When asked about Davis, Ferguson related that the Wolves are "good up front. They like to win the war in the trenches. We can't let them get long, sustained drives on us that eat up the clock and keep our defense on the field," he offered. Ferguson went on to say that Davis has great tradition. "They expect to win. We need to go into this game with that same kind of attitude," he concluded.

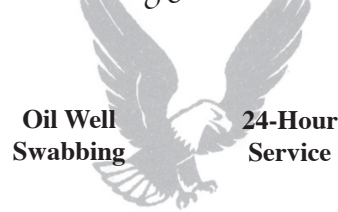
