

important thing. Together we can make a difference not only for a safer city today, but also a safer city for tomorrow. There's an old saying that there is safety in numbers. The Lindsay Police Department invites everyone in the community to take part in a way of life in a safer city. Just imagine the power of one (you) multiplied by a couple of thousand (everyone else).

According to Chief Eric Dodson, the department will soon begin its Community Bridges Program with visits to every home in town. The visitation initiative will strengthen the rapport between the Department and the community. It will share the faces and the voices behind the badges with homes in the community. Please remember that the officers are citizens first. They are real people, too, -- real people with real responsibilities for your well-being.

"We aim to build confidence and relationships with the community," Dodson said. "Community bonds are a group effort."

Dodson's open-door policy with the community will not only be on the streets, it will move to the front porches of your neighborhood.

How many members of the community have had to rearrange their daily lives to get where they are going using alternate routes? How much more traffic has gone down Seventh Street to avoid the new bridge construction? How much extra time is now in your travels? How many emergency vehicles and school buses had to plan ahead for the alternate routes?

Now imagine the properly completed bridge. Citizens will be able to safely travel on Fourth Street without the detours - a straight shot to the Fourth Street traffic light and all the services, schools and businesses in town.

A community's communication bridge should work that way, too. Imagine a strong, safe structure that gets you from point to point. Most of the time, you don't think about all of its parts when you use it. You simply go across it to get to the other side. This network is important to the citizens as well as the police. The Department looks forward to working with the community in a safe and wholesome communication process.

Mrs. Inman's Class Shares Pumpkin Pie Recipes For Thanksgiving

Mix in 3 cups of flour, 1 teaspoon of cinnamon, 2 cups of milk with pumpkin. Put a pie crust on top and cook for 30 minutes at 20 degrees.

Kaleb Brown

You cut a pumpkin into a lot of halves for the whole family. Get a bowl and put in 1 cup of milk. Then you crack three eggs and get the yellow thing to come out. You get one glass of water pour it in the bowl with 3 shakes of sugar. Then you get some pie crusts and put it in the oven for 4 minutes. The oven has to be all the way on. Turn off the oven, take it out, put it on the table, and cut it to how much people are in your family so they can eat it. That's pumpkin pie.

Matchbook **Memories**

OKLAHOMA SPIRIT

One hundred years ago this week, Oklahoma became a state. On November 16, 1907, President Theodore Roosevelt signed the proclamation making Oklahoma the fortysixth state of the union. As we celebrate this anniversary, we celebrate the people who built our state. The Centennial Celebration is a celebration of the spirit of Oklahoma people, the people who tilled the land, built the cities, did the work, and raised the families that make up our state.

Our history is a reflection of the spirit of Oklahoma people. From the beginning of our history, the inhabitants of Oklahoma have felt a spiritual bond to the land. This unity with the land was first illustrated by the Native American warriors, the Cheyennes, Arapahos, Kiowas, and Comanches, who swept across the prairies in pursuit of the buffalo which

grazed the plains. Even before Oklahoma became a state, hardy pioneers charged across the prairies in the 1890s in the great land runs that settled much of what would become Oklahoma. These adventurous pioneers established cities overnight, set up businesses, and staked claims on the prairies and began developing what our wonderful Oklahoma writer Harold Keith called The Obstinate Land. Our state was built on the Oklahoma spirit. The Oklahoma spirit has inspired us in good times and sustained us in bad times. In the good times, the spirit of adventure developed our state. The oil booms of the 1920s and the 1970s and 1980s showed the Oklahoma spirit. The great oil barons and their companies showed the spirit of adventure - Frank Phillips, E.W. Marland, Halliburton, Champlin, and Kerr-McGee. The ranching empires of the Barnards, Chapmans, and Mullendores illustrate the adventure that marked our state. Strong individuals with the Oklahoma spirit built businesses such as Cudd Pressure Control, Ditch Witch, and Owl Photo.

The Oklahoma spirit shined brightest in the bad times. In all of our wars, Oklahoma warriors have led the way. In World War I, Oklahomans fought in the terrible trenches of France. In World War II, the 45th Infantry Division led the way in battle. In Korea, Vietnam, Iraq, and Afghanistan, Oklahomans have written a marvelous chapter in the history of America. Through drought, floods, tornadoes, and the Murrah Building bombing, the Oklahoma spirit has sustained us.

Perhaps the greatest test of Oklahoma spirit was the Great Depression and the Dust Bowl years. When the economy collapsed, the drought came, and erosion destroyed the land, the spirit of Oklahoma people prevailed. Those Okies who fled to California showed one kind of spirit, the willingness to try to build a new life in a strange land. Those Oklahomans who stayed with the land, endured the hardships, and survived a decade of depression, dust, and poverty showed the tenacity that has marked Oklahomans throughout our history as a state. In all of the good times and bad times, the Oklahoma spirit has been sustained by a strong faith in God.

If the Oklahoma spirit was exhibited by responses

to hardship, it was because of the Oklahoma people themselves. The magnificence of the Oklahoma spirit is the magnificence of the Oklahoma people. Oklahoma leads the nation with seven astronauts. Wiley Post, a oneeyed, sixth grade dropout, and was a pioneer aviator, the inventor of the first space suit, and a record setting pilot. His statue stands in Maysville, his home town. Bobby Joe Cudd, an Alex Longhorn fullback and catcher, established an internationally-known oil well fire fighting company. John Mann, my friend and the best man at my wedding, became a top corporate executive with Kentucky Fried Chicken. The Oklahoma spirit of energy and determination raised them to the top of their professions.

In many fields of endeavor, the Oklahoma spirit has led Oklahomans to the top of their fields. In sports, we have Jim Thorpe, Mickey Mantle, Johnny Bench, Jim Shoulders, Freckles Brown, and Henry Iba. Oklahoma has produced four Heisman trophy winners. We have six Miss Americas. We can boast of famous musicians such as Woody Guthrie, Gene Autry, Kay Starr, Roger Miller and Toby Keith. Oklahoma journalists have covered the world - Will Rogers, Bill Moyers, and Paul Harvey. Oklahoma authors have brought fame and honor to our state- Angie Debo, Harold Keith, Louis L'Amour, Ralph Ellison, Wilson Rawls, and Scott Momaday.

The Oklahoma spirit is manifested in all facets of our history. The Oklahoma spirit of hardiness, humor, courage, creativity, and friendliness surrounds us in our daily lives in this magnificent state. As we celebrate our Centennial Anniversary, we can repeat the last two words of our state song "OKLAHOMA'S OK!"

Horse Adoption To Be Held In Pauls Valley

The U.S. Bureau of Land balance among the many public Management (BLM) will hold a wild horse and burro adoption in Pauls Valley, Friday-Saturday, Nov. 16-17, 2007. Attendance is free and open to the public.

This two-day weekend event kicks off a new quarterly adoption schedule at the BLM's regional facility in Pauls Valley. Previously, adoptions were held the second Tuesday of each month; now adoptions are held every three to four months on announced dates. Dates for the coming year are:

> Nov. 16-17, 2007 March 14-15, 2008 May 16-17, 2008 Aug. 15-16, 2008 (Times: Fridays 8:00 a.m.-

4:00 p.m.; Saturdays 8:00 a.m.

weekend adoption will be more convenient for those who might have work or family conflicts during the week," said Bob Mitchell, adoption program manager in Oklahoma.

A mixed group of 70-80 animals will be offered at each adoption, often including burros and young horses. These are BLM periodically removes excess animals from the range in order to ensure herd health and to maintain

uses of the land. The adoption program is essential for preserving these "living legends."

Call the facility directly at 405-238-7138 to learn specifics about the selection of animals expected to be available at an upcoming adoption. The facility cannot accept special requests for specific animals to be made available.

Adopters who live within 100 miles of Pauls Valley can arrange for free delivery of their animal(s) by BLM staff. Delivery is scheduled based on staff availability. Alternatively, adopters who bring their own covered stock-type trailers may haul their animals home right

Directions to the Pauls Valley facility: On Interstate 35, approximately 45 miles south of Oklahoma City, Exit 74, Kimberlin Road, 1/4 mile west to facility entrance. Look for signs.



Financial **Focus**

What's the most prominent thing you notice about mutual fund advertisements? In most cases, it's the fund's return. Quite often, these returns are truly eye-popping. But if you look closer at the ads, you'll see that many of the highest returns are for short periods of time such as one year or three years. And a mutual fund's short-term return is not, by itself, reason enough to buy that fund — so don't rush to your checkbook

Actually, a mutual fund's short-term performance may tell you less about the fund than about what's been happening in the financial markets. If most stocks rise significantly for a few years, the chances are pretty good that a stock-based mutual fund is going to do well, too. But more importantly, you shouldn't evaluate a fund on its short-term return because

a mutual fund is a long-term investment. To assess a fund's long-term performance, you'll need to look at its annualized return — its return over a period of time other than one year For example, a two-year return of 10 percent could be stated as an annualized rate of return of five percent. And by comparing annualized returns, you can learn a lot about a fund's historical performance. If a fund's annualized return for the last three years is 12 percent, but over 10 years it was just five percent, you could conclude that the results of the past three years are not representative of the fund's long-term track record

Apart from its annualized return, what else should you look for when considering a mutual fund? Here are a few suggestions:

Performance against similar funds — How has the fund you're considering performed in comparison to other funds with the same investment objective over 10- and 15-year time periods? That is, if you're evaluating a growth-and-income fund, contrast its performance against the universe of other growth-and-income funds

Fund manager's longevity — Ask your financial advisor how long a fund manager — or a management team — has been responsible for making the investment decisions. Assuming the fund has a superior 10- and 15-year track record to begin with, the longer a manager has been in place, the better

Expense level — Different mutual funds have different costs associated with them. All factors being equal, look for those funds with the lower expense levels. The more you pay each year in expenses and fees, the lower your overall return. However, some funds have justifiably higher expenses, and you may want to consider these funds to help diversify your mutual fund holdings Even if a fund has shown consistently good returns and has

a talented, experienced manager, it still might not be right for you, particularly if it overlaps with similar funds in your portfolio. You might be better off by purchasing a different kind of mutual fund and thereby broadening your holdings. Your financial advisor can help you create a diversified mutual fund portfolio that fits your risk tolerance and investment objectives.

Finally, ask your financial advisor for a copy of the fund's prospectus, which contains complete information about the fund, including risks, charges and expenses as well as other important information that should be carefully considered

By doing some research and learning all you can about a mutual fund, you'll be prepared

Asked to make some remarks, I was honored to talk about these veterans. We need to recognize their sacrifices and their heroism. Following are some excerpts from the contents of the speech, not necessarily word-for-word, but to the best of my memory, it went something like this:

I grew up on a farm in western Oklahoma. In the summer of 1966, when I was around 17 years old, I was helping my Uncle Frankie cut wheat. Frankie had spent 38 months in the Phillippines in World War Two.

It was a typical warm, humid June day. We were greasing the combine, getting ready to start cutting, when suddenly a loud clap of thunder came out of the sky. Instinctively, Frankie literally dove under the pickup.

As he got up, brushing himself off, he sort of smiled and said, "It was a flashback. I thought I was back in the war."

Think about that for just a moment! 21 years after the war had ended, it still had that kind of impact on him. Frankie was of the same generation as many of the men you see sitting behind this podium.

Now, let's talk about some words. How about "courage?" According to Webster's Dictionary, courage is "moral

We have a number of Vietnam Veterans here today as well. They made that sacrifice because our country's leaders had a commitment to the SEATO treaty. America is about living up to our commitments. We





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
