Lindsay Advances To Second Round Of Playoffs With Win Over Sulphur

The Leopards came away with a 20 to 8 victory Friday night against perennial powerhouse Sulphur at Burford Field in first round playoff action. The victory ran Lindsay's record to 7 and 4 on the season and an appointment with Heritage Hall next Friday night at Heritage Hall.

Lindsay scored first on a 66 yard pass from Carson Tate to Jake Bowen that caught the Sulphur defense off guard. The touchdown came on the Leopards' fourth series of the game with 1:21 left in the first quarter. Scott Hacker would connect with Carson Tate to tack on two points to make Lindsay's lead 8 to 0 over Sulphur.

The rest of the half saw Lindsay get deep into Sulphur territory but unable to come away with any points. The Leopard defense held the Bulldogs scoreless until 3:02 remaining in the half when Sulphur's quarterback, Ty

Williams, scored on a 47 yard run. Sulphur would convert on the two point conversion to tie the Leopards 8 to 8. Sulphur would get deep into Lindsay territory just before halftime and miss a 35 yard field goal to end the half all tied up at 8 to 8.

The second half would become a defensive battle with Lindsay getting deep into Sulphur territory only to be turned away with no points. The Leopard defense would hold Sulphur scoreless the entire second half.

The Leopards finally broke it open in the fourth quarter when Zack Bustillos spun into the end zone from the 1 yard line to put Lindsay on top for good. The two point conversion failed and Lindsay led Sulphur 14 to 8. Lindsay would tack on an insurance touchdown when John Pinnick would score on a 5 yard touchdown run. The two point attempt would fail but the Leopards would come away with

a 20 to 8 victory over Sulphur.

Leading the Leopards in passing was Scott Hacker with 198 yards on 16 completions out of 30 attempts and 1 interception. The Leading rusher for Lindsay was Aaron Smith with 40 yards on 5 carries. Leading the receiving for Lindsay was Jake Bowen

With the runner-up finish at regionals, Lindsay still advances to the area tournament to be held at Hobart on January 16.

Matchbook Memories

VETERAN'S DAY THE NEXT GENERATION

Veterans' Day began as Armistice Day. On November 11, 1919, one year after the end of World War I, veterans who survived the war marched in parades and were hometown heroes. Each year after the end of what was called the Great War, veterans were honored on November 11 with parades, speeches, and celebrations. Nearly twenty years later, in 1938, Congress voted Armistice Day a federal holiday. Ironically, in 1939, only twenty years after World War I ended, World War II began. World War I, known as "The War to End All Wars," was followed by an even greater war that was truly world-wide. Around the year 1953, people began to refer to November 11 as Veterans' Day. Many people believed that peace was preserved not only by World War I, but World War II and the Korean War as well. Congress decided to change the day to an occasion to honor those who had served America in all wars. In 1954, President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a bill proclaiming November 11 each year as Veterans' Day. Each year on the eleventh day, of the eleventh month, at 11 a.m., we observe a moment of silence to remember all of those who served in all of America's wars.

In my mind, our children and young boys and girls should be taught the significance of Veterans' Day. Each year, I am thrilled when public schools hold special events to celebrate Veterans' Day. For many years, I have taken part in Veterans' Day ceremonies in numerous schools. I have judged essay contests on Veterans' Day topics. I have spoken at Veterans' Day assemblies. I have been one of the veterans honored at breakfasts for veterans. Two years ago, my grandson, Walker, and I attended an assembly and breakfast for veterans at West Elementary in Weatherford where fifth and sixth graders presented a moving patriotic tribute to veterans.

This week, on November 11,

I will eat lunch with Walker at Whittier Middle School in Norman where the students are honoring their relatives who served in the Armed Forces. Walker called me to invite me to be his guest. He was very proud that his grandfather had served in the military. While we were talking, he asked me to wear my special cap, which commemorates the 50th Anniversary of the end of the Korean War. I was thrilled by his appreciation for Veterans' Day and the ones who served to protect our freedom. As I sit eating lunch with Walker on Veterans' Day, I will recall my own memories of Armistice Day when I was young.

When I was a boy growing up in Bradley, I was awestruck by the veterans of World War I. Those veterans were in their forties and fifties, but they seemed like old warriors to me. I recall some of the stories they told and the stories people told about them. In my memory, I can see them now—Buck Powell, Charlie Dye, Ed McClintock, Ralph Renner, Rube Osborn, Baker Sloan, Snake Bradley, John Sparkman, and many others. They were heroes to us, and then our brothers took their places. Now their names are inscribed on the Bradley Veterans' Memorial—Aurbrey Rodgers, Art Selzer, Paul Schoolfield, Cub Dobyns, Ralph Hall, and numerous others. In our younger years, we stood in awe of these warriors.

Now a younger generation is being taught the legacy that those men left to all of us. I see schools everywhere carrying on the tradition of Veterans' Day. Veterans' Day celebrations allow young children to see these honored veterans as real people, not names in a book or images on television. History comes alive for them. Just this weekend, Walker asked me to tell him some stories about Korea. When he invited me to his school, he said, "Doc, I have another relative from World War II," and he named my brother, Jim, and

told me some things he remembered from my stories about Jim and his service as a nose gunner on a B-24 in World War II. Tradition lives on from generation to generation through our young children.

All of us should take time on Veterans' Day to talk to the children about the legacy those veterans left us and the freedom they preserved for future generations. Our children today are the next generation to whom we will pass the torch of freedom. We should teach them to guard it well. We should teach them that in the history of America every day is Veterans' Day.

News from the State Capitol An Update from State Rep. Lisa Billy

As you know, a recent decision at the Department of Human Services to cut funding for a senior nutritional program has created a hardship for many local elderly citizens.

I have been working with legislative leaders to find funding for the program and several options are out there, including redirecting money from other, less important programs or tapping the state's "Rainy Day" fund.

Throughout the process, DHS officials have claimed the program reduction was simply a consequence of declining state revenue and resulting budget cuts.

However, it has since been revealed that top administrative staff at the Department of Human Services received almost \$200,000 in pay raises in the past year, causing many to question just how honest the agency has been with lawmakers.

Records show 29 of the top 36 administrators at the agency received raises in the past year. The pay raises ranged between \$135 per month to an additional \$1,894 per month. The pay raises totaled \$16,380 per month and \$196,560 per year.

Those pay raises were not approved by the Legislature and it is not known if the individuals receiving the raises assumed any additional job responsibilities.

Furthermore, although the raises were provided before budget cuts were ordered at the agency, they still came at a time when the economic situation was obviously bad and a budget shortfall was considered a clear possibility.

DHS officials say the raises

were necessary to make pay rates comparable to private-sector jobs. I agree that state workers must be paid a competitive salary to reduce turnover, but find that line of argument hard to buy in this instance.

The individual who received the \$1,894 per month pay raise now makes around \$121,000 per year and would have been paid close to \$100,000 previously. How many people are really going to quit a job with a six-figure income during a recession when comparable jobs are few and far between?

Furthermore, the link between pay and performance in government work is (unfortunately) much weaker than in the private sector, and I think many citizens would agree that DHS seems to be the perpetual problem child of state government. If the agency had \$200,000 for padding its administrative expenses, it is very hard to believe DHS now has no choice but to cut nutritional programs for the elderly.

The DHS situation illustrates the need for even greater scrutiny of agency budgets as lawmakers revise appropriations in the coming months due to the downturn. With many state employees facing furloughs or layoffs, I can promise you I will not support a plan that protects administrative bloat at the expense of our citizens or the front-line workers at an agency.

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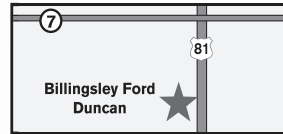
