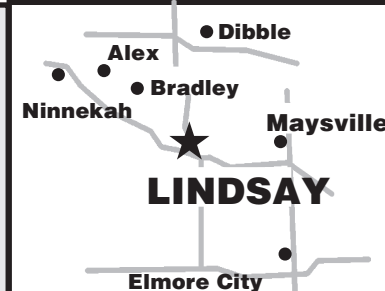

Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra And The Pied Pipers To Perform Holiday Concert

Get ready to get in the holiday mood as the Pauls Valley Arts Council will present its annual Christmas Concert on Thursday, December 10, at 7:30 p.m. at the Pauls Valley High School Auditorium.

This year's concert will feature The Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra and the Pied Pipers.

"This will truly be a holiday concert with a big band flare," said Kevin Stark, President of the Pauls Valley Arts Council.

Tickets for the concert go on sale Tuesday, November 10, at the Pauls Valley Chamber of Commerce office in Pauls Valley, the Garvin County News Star offices in Maysville and Stratford and at the Elmore City Branch of the Pauls Valley National Bank,

located inside Luster's Market.

The Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra is one of the most popular big band orchestras currently touring the country, delighting large crowds nationwide.

Dorsey's musical training began when he was a young boy

in Pennsylvania. Along with his brother Tommy, the talented young musicians joined Paul Whiteman's Orchestra and at the same time they were recording many records under the billing "The Dorsey Brothers Orchestra". Their band continued through the early thirties until a dispute over a tempo of a song separated the brothers for decades.

Jimmy found himself an instant leader of the band that became the birth of the Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra. His records sold well in the late thirties, but as the forties got under way it was apparent that his momentum was increasing.

With hits like "Amapola" and "Green Eyes" featuring Helen O'Connell, the band jumped to the top of the charts making

Candidates for the Board of Education in seven McClain County school districts file Declarations of Candidacy beginning at 8 a.m. Monday, December 7.

Marilyn McReynolds, Secretary of the McClain County Election Board, said the filing period ends at 5 p.m. Wednesday, December 9.

Candidates for the Board of Education in Mid-America Technology Center School District No. 8 also file their Declarations during the same period for Office No. 1 - 5-year term.

The Board of Education positions at stake will be filled at the Annual School Election scheduled February 9, 2010. If no candidate receives more than 50% of the total votes cast in

this election, the two candidates receiving the highest number of votes will meet in an election on Tuesday, April 6, 2010.

Matchbook Memories

WHAT IS THANKSGIVING?

As my seventy-seventh Thanksgiving on this earth approaches, I find myself viewing Thanksgiving in a different way. As the seasons roll inexorably by, I find Thanksgiving to be more a time of contemplation than a time of celebration. As my mind travels back to my earliest memories of Thanksgiving, I realize that my definition of Thanksgiving has changed as the years have passed. More than a yearly celebration now, Thanksgiving has become a state of mind and a feeling of the heart. More than a time of gustatory delights, Thanksgiving has become a time to recall the long parade of Thanksgiving seasons which have given meaning to my life.

Thanksgiving has become many things for me, mainly memories which live in my mind. Certain Thanksgiving Days stand out in my memory. Sometime about 1940, on a bright, frosty, cold Thanksgiving morning, my brother, Jack, and his wife, Forrest, came to our house south of Bradley for Thanksgiving dinner. Jack brought his 12-gauge shotgun, an ancient model with a side hammer and a hinged breech lock which had to be lifted to insert the shell and then held in place by the firing pin, which was part of a large nail. My father and Jack walked through the pasture west of our house to a water tank that was scarcely more than a mud puddle. As they crept slowly toward the tank, they saw several ducks on the water. As the ducks rose from the water, Jack killed one with his ancient shotgun. That Thanksgiving, in addition to the usual chicken and dressing, we had roasted duck. I still remember the delicious smell of the duck roasting in the oven of our wood stove and my first taste of roasted duck.

My two most pleasant Thanksgiving days were spent on

the Victoria farm in 1942 and 1943. I recall watching my mother cook for two days to prepare those Thanksgiving dinners. The large black wood stove would warm the kitchen as she baked pies and mixed the bread dough on Wednesday. On Thanksgiving morning, the kitchen would be filled with the delicious smell of ham and chicken roasting and the spicy smell of dressing baking in the oven. Collie's nose would twitch in anticipation of the feast to come as he lay in the dining room doorway, as close as my mother would let him come while she cooked. My mother prepared huge dinners of roasted chicken, ham, dressing, mashed potatoes, gravy, corn, green beans, pickles, beets, homemade bread, and apple, pumpkin, and mincemeat pies. Collie sat at my side, his head on my knee, waiting for the bites of chicken, ham, and bread that I slipped him under the table.

But in spite of those wonderful farm dinners, there was a somber note as we remembered my brother, Jim, serving in the Army Air Corps. Even though he was still in training during those two Thanksgiving days, his place was empty at our table. As we enjoyed those delicious meals, I still recall seeing tears run down my mother's cheeks as she thought of her son far away. After the meal, I would carry the table scraps out to the back porch to feed the farm cats. They would whirl around my feet, meowing loudly and standing on their back feet to catch the scraps. Collie, already stuffed with the meat and bread I had fed him under the table, would sit in the doorway, dignified and aloof, as he watched the wild cavorting of the cats.

Only one unpleasant Thanksgiving comes back to me, even though I try to push it out of my mind. Because of my

father's illness, we had sold our farm equipment and much of our furniture in an auction in the early fall. As we left the Victoria farm, I realized that much of my boyhood happiness was left behind.

On Thanksgiving Day in 1944, we lived in a gloomy, barren house in Peoria, Arizona, where my father and my brothers, Sam and A.W., were working in a box factory. The house sat back under some large tamarack trees, which seemed to cast a gloom over everything. The house had few windows and no electricity. The kerosene lamps scarcely penetrated the gloom.

My mother cooked Thanksgiving dinner on a kerosene cook stove in a barren kitchen with only a small table and an ancient cabinet. I remember my mother weeping as she cooked, sometimes praying aloud for Jim's safe return. Although she tried valiantly to prepare her usual Thanksgiving dinner, the gloomy house, the barren kitchen, the food tasting faintly of kerosene, and the somber thoughts of Jim, flying bombing missions against the Germans, cast a pall over the holiday season. Even Collie seemed to reflect the sadness of that Thanksgiving as he paced restlessly through the house, perhaps remembering better times on the Victoria farm.

I vividly recall the first Thanksgiving dinner I had at the home of my wife's parents. My wife's father, Reverend S.S. Walker, was a Baptist minister, and her mother was a traditional Baptist minister's wife. Mr. Walker had grown up in the mountains of Tennessee in a valley called Walker Holler (Yes, they pronounced it that way.) Mrs. Walker had grown up as a dignified, middle-class girl in a traditional Mississippi River town. She reflected the southern culture of her upbringing.

As we prepared to sit down at the table, I was acutely aware of the difference between that Thanksgiving dinner and the ones I enjoyed in my youth. The table was covered with a lace table cloth with lace napkins. The table was set with china, crystal,

silver, and candles. There were more plates, bowls, and forks than I was accustomed to on the farm or in the Army mess halls where I had recently celebrated Thanksgiving.

Although the menu was largely the same as we had on the farm, there were differences. A large roasted turkey sat in the middle of the table. The other food was in china and crystal bowls. One dish held candied yams, not a regular item on our farm. On a serving table nearby was a large selection of pies—pecan, pumpkin, mincemeat, and chocolate. As we stood behind our chairs, Mr. Walker said an elaborate, memorable Thanksgiving blessing. For thirty years afterward, we would have Thanksgiving dinner in the Walker home. Our sons, Vance and Chad, grew up enjoying the wonderful Thanksgiving dinners their grandmother prepared. They

have many memories of their grandparents, the delicious food, and the many hours spent around the Thanksgiving table. That beautiful Duncan Phyfe table is still set with Thanksgiving dinner in our house each year.

Now nearly all of the people with whom I shared those wonderful Thanksgiving dinners are gone. My wife's parents, my parents, and all of my brothers and sisters except Jim have departed this earth. Collie is gone to dog heaven, where I hope he feasts on baked ham and chicken livers. Those Thanksgivings are gone too, down the endless corridors of time. All that remains are the Thanksgiving memories of sumptuous feasts, departed loved ones, and the warmth that comes with remembering.

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for a short time as his own health was failing rapidly.

The Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra has continued successfully for decades and is still in great demand all over the world.

The past success of the Orchestra was due to the leadership of Lee Castle and more recently from 1990 through the new millennium, Jim Miller.

The leadership has now passed to Bill Tole who continues to bring joy to young and the "young at heart" as they enjoy the sounds of American Music - our history.

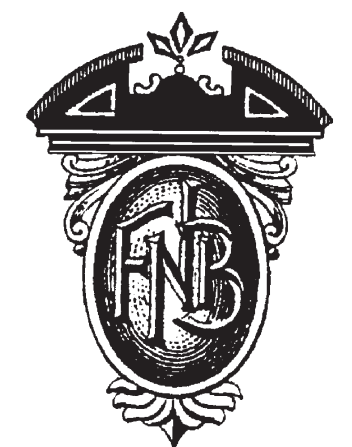

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Pumpkin Pie Recipes From Mrs. Inman's Class



Mrs. Jeanna Inman's First Grade Class

Jeanna Inman's First Grade class would like to share their favorite pumpkin pie recipes with you.

Ashley Adams

Get 1 pumpkin, a tablespoon of sugar, 3 eggs, and 1 cup of water. Bake it for 1 hour at 335 degrees.

Meladee Allison

Get pumpkin seeds, a cup of sugar, 2 cups of pepper and salt, and a cup of flour. Bake it for 10 minutes at 40 degrees. Mom is going to love eating it.

Danya Arvizo

Get 2 pumpkins, 3 cups of sugar, and 4 eggs. Bake it for 60 seconds at 200 degrees. Then my grandma comes and we eat it all up.

Cade Belveal

Get a carved pumpkin; melt it making sure to leave all the seeds in it. Get 1/2 cup of salt, bucket full of bananas, 2 sprinkles of pepper. Bake if for 8 hours at 685 degrees. Then put whip cream on the top and sides, then my whole family will help me eat it all up.

Billy Campbell

Get 5 pumpkins, 16 strawberries, 4 coconuts, 4 bottles of whip cream and one blueberry. Put in the oven at 507 degrees and bake for 60 seconds. Then put a cloth on the table and my whole family will help me eat it all up.

Matthew Dutton

Get some pumpkins seeds put them in a big pan. Bake it for 19 seconds making sure the oven is not that hot. Then I will get it out of the oven and give it to my friend Tristan.

Callie Hacker

Get some melted chocolate, 1 little pumpkin, 2 candy bars, 1 cup of vanilla, and 2 cups of peanut butter. Bake it for 3 minutes at 3 degrees. Then I will give it to my papa, who is going to eat all my pie.

Mariah Harrison

Get 1 pumpkin and a little bit of sugar, water, a teaspoon of sprinkles, and pepper. Bake it for 10 minutes at 1 degree. Then I will give it to my mom and dad.

Jakkob Hines

Get 2 whole pumpkins, 1 pan of crust, 4 teaspoons water, 5 teaspoons of sugar and one handful of shredded cheese. Bake it for 12 minutes at 10 degrees.

Brandon Chambers

Find a pumpkin and put some M & Ms, Oreos, a bunch of chocolate, 4 quarters of syrup, and two quarters of water and 8 quarters of cherries and 9 quarters of ice cream. Bake this for 60 hours in an oven that is as hot as the sun. That will make it goooooo!

Keyli Murray

Put a cup of water and a cup of sugar in a bowl with a cherry. Put one slice of watermelon and pumpkin in the bowl. Stir it together and put it in a pie crust. You will cook it for two hours in an oven that is 10 degrees. My mom and dad will eat this pie.

Austin Platt

I will use 3 eggs, 1/2 cup sugar, and 4 pumpkin seeds. Mix it together and put it in a pan. I will put it in an oven that is 4 degrees for 4 hours. I will put strawberries on the top.

My family will eat it for Thanksgiving.

Jordan Prairechief

I think I'll use 3 eggs, 2 pumpkins, 4 cups of sugar and 3 spoons of butter. I will put it on top of the stove and cook it for 6 hours on high.

Kaiton Robbins

Put 4 pumpkin seeds, 3 scoops of sugar, 1 pour of milk in a pie crust. Bake it in an oven that is a little bit hot for 5 hours. Nana and Papa are coming for Thanksgiving. They will eat the pie with us.

Blake Taylor

Put 2 eggs, cup of milk, 1 gallon of sugar, 2 pumpkins seeds. Bake it in the oven for 2 minutes at 4 degrees. When mom comes home she will eat my pie, just mom.

Foster Taylor

Put 3 spoons of cream, 2 cups of pumpkin, 2 eggs and 1 cup of water, 8 chocolate chips, and 10 scoops of cookie crumbs along with one piece of bread with crust. Bake it in the oven for 20 minutes at 20 degrees. Then I will cut the pie and let my family eat it all up.

Brooklynn Wilson

Take two carved pumpkins, crack open two eggs and place them on a pan. Let the eggs boil for a little bit, then put the pumpkins in a bowl. When the eggs have cooked for 2 hours, add the eggs to the pumpkin in the bowl. Then bake it for 50 minutes at 60 degrees. Then I will eat my special pie with my family.

Gavyn Williams

Put 5 eggs, 1 pumpkin, 1 box of cake batter, 1 box of brown sugar, 1 package of butter. Bake at 4 degrees for 1 hour. Take it out and share it with my family.

Tristan Zinn

Put 3 cups of baking powder, 8 cherries, 2 cups of cinnamon, 1 pumpkin. Fill the middle with whip cream, and then bake it at 1000 degrees for 20 seconds. Take it out, then add crust and whip cream to top of the pie. Then I will share it with my family.

Allen Lewis

Put a little bit of water, 1 watermelon, 2 potatoes, 5 grapes, 10 lemons, and 11 apples. Bake for 6 minutes in a really hot oven. Then I will take it out and share with my family.

Following Tate in tackles were John Pinnick and Joseph Lujan with 5 tackles, Mason Blake, Hunter Eubank and Jonathon Ashley with 4 tackles, Zack Ernst, John Holliman, Chris Lurrari and Matt Avery with 3 tackles, Kris Milligan, Jamie Snow, Josiah Harrison, Ethan Griffith and Noah Chambers with 2 tackles and Zack Bustillos and Trent Cleary with 1 tackle.
