

Matchbook **Memories**

OKLAHOMA BOOKS OKLAHOMA READS OKLAHOMA **PART I**

The Oklahoma Centennial has passed, but the celebration goes on. Oklahoma's one-hundredth birthday party was fantastic. All around the state, communities celebrated with parades, dinners, pageants, and musical tributes. Most of the celebrations have ended, but the literary celebrations continue.

As a part of the Oklahoma Centennial celebration, the Oklahoma Humanities Council and the Oklahoma Department of Libraries established the Oklahoma Reads Oklahoma program in 2004. The program selected six books each year. The books were written by Oklahoma writers and featured Oklahoma subjects. For the past four years, Oklahoma readers have chosen one of the six books offered each year as the winner of the Oklahoma Reads Oklahoma Award. The four Oklahoma Reads Oklahoma award winners were The Honk and Holler Opening Soon by Billie Letts, Walking the Choctaw Road by Tim Tingle, The Saints and Sinners of Okay County by Dayna Dunbar, and Fire in Beulah by Rilla Askew. In varied styles and with very different subjects, these four entertaining books present life in Oklahoma from the days of Indian Territory to modern times. Ranging from comedy to tragedy, these books entertain the reader with fascinating characters, thrilling scenes, and memorable stories from our Oklahoma.

In 2004, the first Oklahoma Reads Oklahoma Award winner was The Honk and Holler Opening Soon by Billie Letts. In this hilarious as well as touching novel, Caney Paxton, a paralyzed Vietnam veteran, believes that life has passed him by. As the owner of the Honk and Holler Drive-In in Sequoyah, Oklahoma, Caney has not left the cafe for the past twelve years. He is withdrawn and disillusioned until a beautiful Crow Indian woman, Vena Takes Horse, walks in off the highway and announces that she is his new waitress. Soon a displaced Vietnamese refugee, Bui Khanh, hires himself on as a cook, who cannot cook well. As their lives intertwine, a beautiful love story unfolds. After many trials and great sadness, Caney and Vena fall in love, marry, and have a child.

The Honk and Holler provides a wonderful setting for this very entertaining novel. The small diner serves as a meeting place for the people of Sequoyah. Like the small cafes of my boyhood, the small diner becomes a profile of a community. There are the old World War II veterans who drink coffee there. There is Wanda Sue, the town gossip who comes in each morning to pass on her latest news. and there are others: Sam, the most violent man in town; Brenda, the country music wannabe; Hamp, the lonely widower, and Molly O, the warm-hearted waitress, who nurtures them all with good food and a sympathetic heart. Some of the scenes remind me of Bomhak's Cafe in Bradley and Harold's Steak House in Lindsay. Even the weather often strikes a familiar note. In one passage, Caney is sitting in the deserted cafe on a cold morning before daylight. " When the wind started to whine around the door and through the heating vents, Caney decided to crank up the jukebox. If anything could outwhine an Oklahoma windstorm, it was Merle Haggard singing about lowdown women and low-life men."

For me, this novel captures small town life in Oklahoma as I knew it in my younger days. I can identify with many of the characters, the setting of the cafe, the humor, and, especially, the mood of the place. As Billie Letts did in her first novel, Where The Heart Is, about an abandoned girl who lives in the local Wal Mart, Billie writes a warm, touching story of Oklahoma people living out their lives with courage, honesty, and human compassion.

In 2005, the Oklahoma Reads Oklahoma Award winner was Walking the Choctaw Road by Tim Tingle. This book is a collection of Choctaw stories from "Red People memory." The stories are chronologically arranged from the days when most Choctaws were still living in Mississippi, to the Trail of Tears into Oklahoma, to modern day tales of Tingle's own family. Truthfulness, generosity, respect for elders, and otherworldy occurrences are hallmarks of traditional Choctaw narratives. These stories give readers a sense of what it is to be Choctaw.

My favorite story is entitled "The Choctaw Way." It is a story about justice, honor, and the Choctaw Way. It is the story of Willie Frazier, a Choctaw who kills another Choctaw in a fight over the ownership of a pony. Willie goes to the Choctaw Council and turns himself in. The Council follows the law, which decrees that a man who kills another must die for his

The Council gives him a sack containing 30 pieces of cane. He is to bury one piece of cane each day. When the sack is empty, he must appear before the Council for his execution. Willie goes home, prepares his family for his death, and returns 30 days later to be executed. His small son listens from a distance and hears the rifle shot that ends his father's life. The boy understands that his father has died with honor, following the Choctaw

I heard Tim Tingle, the author, read this story and others from his book. It was a memorable experience to hear his calm, resonant voice recount these stories of his Choctaw ancestry. This book is a wonderful contribution to the rich history of Oklahoma.



Own a Business? Put Retirement, Succession Plans in Order

If you own a small business, you probably laugh at the notion of a "9 to 5" workday. Unfortunately, many small-business owners work so hard, and are so focused on the "here and now"- increasing sales, controlling costs, attracting new customers, etc. - that they forget to plan for their own retirement and for the fate of their business

Beyond these similarities, though, these plans have different requirements and features, so, to find the one that's right for you, consult with a financial advisor who is experienced in helping business owners

Once you've established your retirement plan, it's time to think about succession planning. Here are a few general recommendations to keep in mind:

Always know what your business is worth. Your succession plan may involve either selling the business or passing it to your heirs, so it's essential you know the sales price or its inheritance value. Once you have this information, you can help draw up plans for selling the business or helping your family pay estate taxes.

Integrate your succession plans with your estate plans. Many small-business owners just plan on leaving the business to their spouse - a move that could cut off other heirs from an inheritance. This can be particularly troublesome if all your net worth is tied up in the business - a situation you'll want to avoid by having some outside investments, in addition to one of the retirement plans mentioned above.

Include key employees in your planning. If you'd like to keep some key employees on after the business is transferred, let them know your plans while you're still in charge. Of course, if you plan on selling your business to one of them, you'll need to invest and organize the proceeds in such a way that they can be efficiently passed on to your family.

Plan for "what if?" A good succession plan must also include plans for contingencies. To cite just one possible complication, what if you want to leave your business to an adult child, but that child dies before you? You may need to take many "what ifs" into account when you construct your plans

You invest your heart and soul into your business. To protect that investment, work with your financial, tax and legal advisors to create the appropriate retirement and succession plans. Even as busy as you are, it will be time well spent.


