Life Line Screening To Be Offered In Lindsay

Residents living in and around the Lindsay community can be screened to reduce their risk of having a stroke or bone fracture. The Lindsay United Methodist Church will host Life Line Screening December 16. The site is located at 114 W Chickasaw Street in Lindsay. Appointments will begin at 9 a.m.

Four key points every person needs to know: stroke is the third leading cause of death and a leading cause of permanent disability; 80% of stroke victims had no apparent warning signs prior to their stroke; preventive ultrasound screenings can help you avoid a stroke; and screenings are fast, noninvasive, painless, affordable, and convenient.

Screenings identify potential

cardiovascular conditions such as blocked arteries and irregular heart rhythm, abdominal aortic aneurysms, and hardening of the arteries in the legs, which is a strong predictor of heart disease. A bone density screening to assess osteoporosis risk is also offered and is appropriate for both men and women.

Packages start at \$139. All five screenings take 60-90 minutes to complete. For more information regarding the screenings or to schedule an appointment, call 1-877-237-1287 or visit the website at www.lifelinescreening.com. Pre-registration is required.

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Matchbook Memories

FROM PITCHER TO WRITER

Several times I have mentioned in my column that interesting items arrive in the mail or on my computer screen. Last week, it happened again. Late one afternoon, I checked my e-mail and found a message from Joe Royal. At first the name did not register with me. I almost clicked it off as just another Spam message. But something in the back of my mind told me to read the message. I will always be grateful that I did.

When the e-mail flashed on the screen, I was delighted to see that it was from Joe Don Royal, the best pitcher I ever coached. I had not heard from Joe Don in many years, but I had many memories of him when he played baseball for me at Northern Junior College at Tonkawa. Not only was he the best pitcher I ever coached, but also he was one of the most impressive young men I have ever known. I observed him as a student, a player, and a resident in the dorm where my wife and I were dorm parents.

Joe Don was born into an athletic family. His father was Don Royal, a very good athlete from Hollis. Don coached his son at Tipton High School. Joe Don's uncle was Darrell Royal, an All-American for the Oklahoma Sooners and the legendary coach of the Texas Longhorns. Joe Don was born with good athletic genes.

Joe Don was an extremely handsome, mannerly, intelligent, quiet young man. He was a left-handed pitcher with a blazing fastball and crackling curve. He was so coachable, always trying to do what I asked him to do. Teaming with Bruce Harkins, another remarkable young athlete from Eldorado, they carried the burden for our team. After he graduated from Northern, Joe Don went on to pitch for Wichita State University where he was a

pitching star. He graduated from Wichita State at the height of the Vietnam war, where he served with distinction.

As I read the e-mail from Joe Don, I was excited to learn that he had just completed a novel. Joe Don explained that the novel was set at a fictional southern university during his college baseball days. He explained that he is the star left-handed pitcher as well as a couple of other characters. He said that I would recognize some of the things that happened as well as a few of the characters. I have now received the novel and am ready to begin reading Joe Don's first novel. He is starting to write his second novel this week.

As soon as I finished reading his e-mail, I wrote a reply. After congratulating him on his first novel, I recalled the greatest game he ever pitched for me. He immediately answered my e-mail and gave me his memories of that game. We both had vivid memories of that day.

It was late April in 1965. We were playing Bacone Junior College on our home field. The day was made for baseball – perfectly clear, warm, and no wind. Bacone was coming into the game with a perfect 28-0 record. Earlier in the season, they had beaten us twice at Bacone. Bacone was coached by Enos Semore, a great coach and an admirable man, who would go on to post a remarkable record as the coach of the Oklahoma Sooners.

Before the game began, Enos suggested that we both pitch our aces against each other in the first game. I immediately agreed. I started Joe Don, and Enos started his ace, a small right hander who had all of the pitches – fastball, curve, and a tantalizing knuckle ball that fluttered like a butterfly. As the game went on, both pitchers were nearly perfect. Since we had no lights at Northern, we were

scheduled to play two seven-inning games.

At the end of the seventh inning, the game was scoreless. At the end of the eighth inning, the score was still 0-0, and both pitchers were showing no signs of weakening. In the top of the ninth, Joe Don set Bacone down – one-two-three. As the ninth inning began, the Bacone pitcher hit our lead-off hitter with a pitch. It was our first base runner in a long time. From the third base coaching box, I gave the sign for a hit and run. As the runner on first broke for second, my hitter missed the sign. But the runner barely slid under the tag at second. On the next pitch, my hitter struck out. The next hitter popped up to the catcher.

With two outs and a runner on second, I decided to go for the win. We might never get another runner that far. My center fielder was at bat. He was a good hitter, so I gave him no signs. He was on his own. With the count 2-0, he tried to hold up on a pitch. Instead, he hit a soft line drive toward the shortstop. With two outs, the runner was moving. The Bacone shortstop made a great leap, but the ball ticked off his glove as I waved the runner home. The left fielder made a great throw to the plate as the runner slid home. The umpire hesitated for a moment, then gave the safe sign. We had beaten Bacone 1-0 in nine innings and had broken their undefeated streak.

As all of my other players and I went wild, Joe Don stood quietly in front of the dugout with his left hand in the air. In his usual classy way, Enos Semore walked across the field, shook Joe Don's hand, and congratulated him on pitching a wonderful game. That game still stands as the highlight of my coaching career.

When I read Joe Don's baseball novel, I hope there is some reference to that game. As a former coach, I will always be proud of Joe Don as a pitcher. Now, as an English professor, I am proud of him as a novelist.

Orchestra and at the same time they were recording many records under the billing "The Dorsey Brothers Orchestra". Their band continued through the early thirties until a dispute over a tempo of a song separated the brothers for decades.

Jimmy found himself an instant leader of the band that became the birth of the Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra. His records sold well in the late thirties, but as the forties got under way it was apparent that his momentum was increasing.

With hits like "Amapola" and "Green Eyes" featuring Helen O'Connell, the band jumped to the top of the charts making Jimmy the biggest success story of the year.

Other hit selling records and a series of motion pictures followed, establishing him firmly on top.

Helen played an important part of the band's success, both on records and in personal appearances. Her hits "I Remember You", "Tangerine" and others more took her to the top of the charts as well.

During the early fifties Jimmy was still a successful name in the business. Even with all of his success, he joined forces with his brother Tommy in 1953 to become the greatest band of all time!

With the untimely death of Tommy in 1956, Jimmy once again was left to carry on, but only for a short time as his own health was failing rapidly.

The Jimmy Dorsey Orchestra has continued successfully for decades and is still in great demand all over the world.

The past success of the Orchestra was due to the leadership of Lee Castle and

more recently from 1990 through the new millennium, Jim Miller.

The leadership has now passed to Bill Tole who continues to bring joy to young and the "young at heart" as they enjoy the sounds of American Music - our history.
