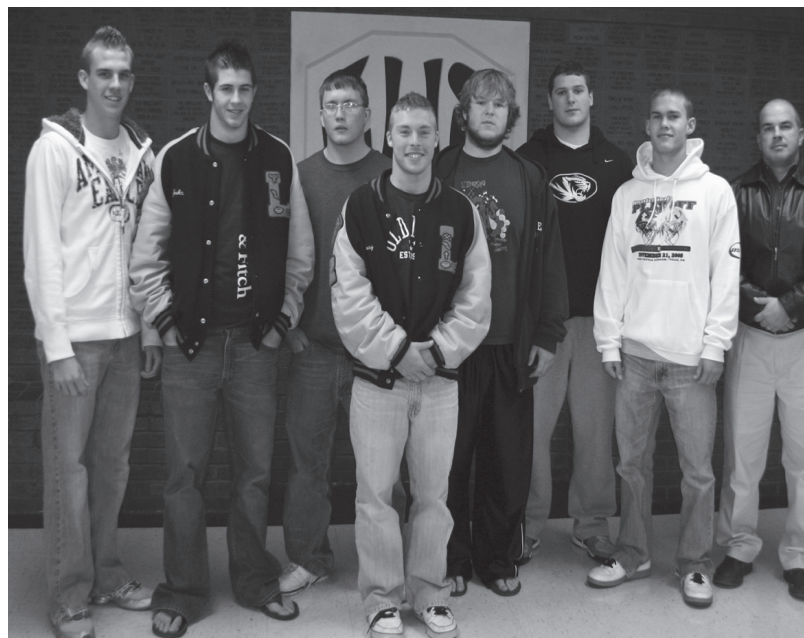

The Lindsay Leopardettes will be hitting the hardwood soon with the first game of the season at Wynnewood December 9. This year plans to be one full of exciting action with the Leopard Shoot Out in January and another tournament at Tishomingo.

Three seniors will lead the Leopardettes in experience. Kylie Blough, Deven Robbins, and Donna Jones are all returning starters. Deven is deadly with her 15 foot jumper, Donna is the steady Eddy-dependable in any situation or position, and Kylie will nail the 3-pointers with precision.

Junior, Shelby Lee, who saw floor time last year, will bring speed with an elevated jump shot that will prove hard for the opponents to block. Julie Howard, also a junior, is the spark plug of the team with her quickness and defensive tactics. The third junior, Whitney Cole, will provide depth as back-up point guard with her ball handling skills and ability with the 3-point shot.

Taylor's defensive fundamentals and 3-point shot will add strength to these areas. Tess is the work horse of this team, very strong and determined, no task too menial for her to attack. Sadie, the tallest player, is a good ball handler for back up point, able to see over the opponents for post entries, or fill in at the post position. Last, but not least, is Courtney, known for the softest touch off the glass.

Tonya Loman is the head coach, assisted by Jon Jacques. Managers are Taylor Shoemake, Allison Hall, and Chloe Litty.

When discussing the outlook for this year's team, Coach Loman had these comments, "We may lack the depth or the size of past teams, but don't let that fool you. It's not the size of the dog in the fight, but the size of the fight in the dog. My girls have a very strong desire to win due to their exceptionally competitive

nature."

Coach Jaques added that the improvement on team defense lends the potential of playing more man-to-man defense this season.

What the Leopardettes may be deficient in are numbers and post-size girls, but this team will be quicker and possess more endurance out of necessity. These girls are not extremely adaptable, show more camaraderie and respect the leadership that had developed on this year's team.

It will take five players on the court who will challenge the opponents in scoring and defense for 32 minutes each game to finish with the win. An overall scoring strategy will make it virtually impossible for rivals to focus entirely on one or two players to shut down the Leopardette offense-everyone must capitalize on every opportunity to contribute as a scoring threat. The team is merely as strong as its weakest link. Minimize the weaknesses, compound on the strengths-a philosophy that will certainly bring expected results! Best wishes for a winning season!

# Matchbook Memories

## SMALL TOWN CAFES PART I

The latest issue of *Texas Monthly* features a cover story entitled "The 40 Best Small-Town Cafes." The picture on the cover shows a back view of two men sitting on low stools at the counter of a classic small cafe. One of the men appears to be an older man, perhaps a retired farmer. He is wearing blue Round House overalls, a plaid, short-sleeve shirt, an old gimme cap, and low-heel boots. Sitting beside him is a cowboy, perhaps in his early forties, wearing Wrangler jeans, a plaid western shirt, a brown cowboy hat, a cowboy belt, and cowboy boots with spurs. Although we see their backs, we know they are each holding a cup of hot coffee. This must be early morning coffee time. They are probably discussing the weather and the price of cattle. The cafe wall behind the counter is lined with shelves of cups, snacks, and a coffee maker.

The article in the magazine explains the nature of small town cafes – the kinds of food, the friendly waitresses, and the mood that defines these gathering places in towns all across Texas. Although this article is about cafes that are popular today, I was reminded of the same kinds of cafes that I recall from my younger years. As I sat reading the article and studying the descriptions of the food served in each cafe, I could almost see, smell, and taste the food in the cafes I knew long ago.

The first small town cafe I recall was A.A. Perry's Cafe in Bradley in the early 1940s. The cafe was located in a small shotgun building on the east side of Main Street near the creek that runs through town. Customers were seated at a

counter and in small booths along one wall. The grill was behind the counter so customers could watch Double A, as we called him, cook his large, delicious hamburgers, which nearly covered a plate. A juke box stood against one wall, its bright lights gleaming.

As Double A fried hamburgers and onions, he heated the buns on the grill, the bread soaking up some of the onion-flavored grease. A pot of stew and a pot of chili would be bubbling on the stove. Small pots of beans and corn and a pan of fried chicken would be waiting to be included as part of the popular plate lunches that Double A served. The prices of the food in the early 1940s were unbelievable by modern standards. Soft drinks such as Coke, RC, and Double Cola were five cents per bottle. A hamburger almost as large as a dinner plate was ten cents. I recall a scene where a stranger came into the cafe and asked if they had nickel hamburgers. Double A was insulted, explaining in no uncertain terms that he did not serve cheap food in his cafe.

But the food was not the only attraction at Double A Perry's Cafe. Double A was famous for his stories, often exaggerated beyond belief, but entertaining nevertheless. Not long ago, my friend, Paul Osborn, and I were recalling some of Double A's stories. One story had Double A racing his horse against Belle Starr's horse. He let her win because she would have killed him if he had won. Another story had him roping a wild steer as he stood on the banks of a Texas river. The steer hit the end of the rope so hard that it jerked the heels off a new pair of

boots, leaving them embedded in the ground. As young boys, Paul and I loved Double A's stories.

I recall a late winter evening in December 1943. My brother, Sam, and I were in Bradley as darkness fell. For some reason, we decided to have a hamburger at Double A's cafe before we drove back to our home on the Victoria farm north of Bradley. A cold wind was blowing outside, and the 1936 Ford we were in had no heater. The warm cafe with its delicious smells of frying hamburgers was like an island of comfort in a frigid world. We each ordered a hamburger and a Coke. As Double A fried the hamburgers and the slices of onions, Sam went to the juke box to play a record. As we read the titles, I wanted him to play Roy Acuff's "The Wreck on the Highway." He did not want to hear that mournful dirge. Instead, he played Earnest Tubb's "Walking the Floor Over You." The music was good. The hamburgers were delicious. And the warm cafe was cozy before we walked out into the icy wind for our long, cold drive home.

Some of my readers may remember Double A Perry's cafe in Bradley. If they do, they may recall it as I do, an old-fashioned small town cafe from long ago. The Perry family has played an important role in the history of Bradley and Lindsay. Double A's son, Jonie, was a long-time barber in Bradley and Lindsay, once having a barber shop where the Cable printing press is now located. Double A's grandson, Lural, was once the Lindsay school superintendent. Double A's great-grandson, Brad, recently ran for State Representative. But Double A was the patriarch of the family, a colorful character who epitomized the small town cafe owner from long ago.

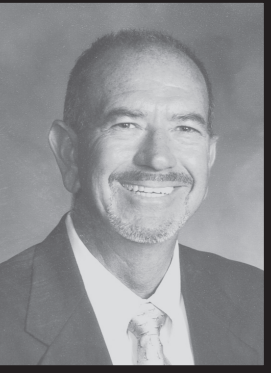

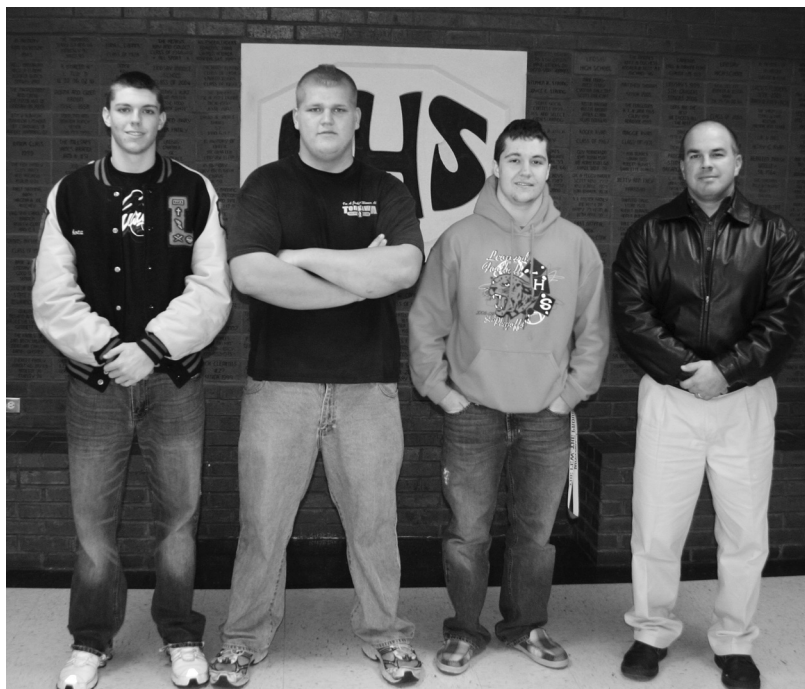

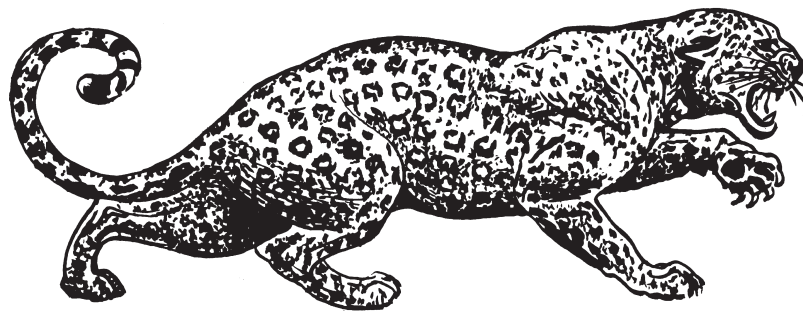

"Farm to You" is an interactive, walk through exhibit for students in kindergarten through sixth grade, that features nine interactive learning stations that show students how food gets from the farm to the market and travels through the body. It teaches students that their food Each station teaches for six minutes how agriculture, food, and health are interrelated.

The nine stations and their parents, aides, and student volunteers were: Cheeseburger Farm, Shannon Delk; Market, Larissa James; Cool Café, Donna Otey; Mouth, Natalie Harrington; Stomach, Nancy Pearson; Small Intestine, Tammy Staggs; Muscle, Chancy Witt; Bone, Carrie Anderson; Skin, Cindy Hefner. Students learned by using "Glo Foam" and a black light how germs are transmitted from person to person, that your small intestine is the length of a school bus, that your body has 206 bones

and and 636 muscles.

2nd graders in Mrs. Howe's class Brennae Hines liked matching a certain food to the plant or animal on the farm that it comes from, while Faith Terry said, "it was fun to sit on one of the teeth" and Lydia Stewart was surprised that the tomato, lettuce, and cheese on a hamburger are actually good for you.

Mrs. Brandon's 4th grade student, Mason Barrington said, "I should have brought a notebook to write down all this neat stuff".

The exhibit is a joint effort between the Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service, 4-H, agricultural programs, OSU Dept. of Nutritional Sciences, and the Ok. State Dept. of Health (WIC) and SW Dairy Farmers.

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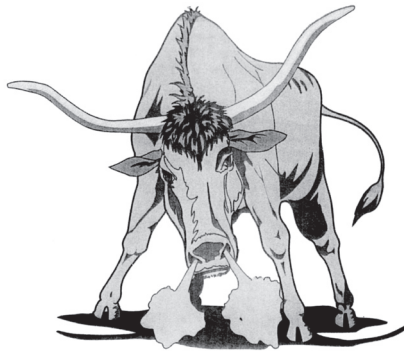
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Those old cotton fields back home.

When it came time for lunch, Faye and I pulled our sacks out to the end of the row and sat down on them. As usual, her sack had more cotton in it than mine. Mama had packed some sausage and mustard in some biscuits left over from breakfast. As we sat and ate the biscuits and drank lukewarm tea, we joked about our fancy Thanksgiving dinner. Working on holidays is something we have always done. Take last Labor Day, for instance. For us, it was a day of labor. The

only thing special about it was that we didn't get any mail. But there is one holiday we really celebrate and that's Christmas. We usually have some of our relative come for a visit. On Christmas morning we got to pen gifts from Santa Claus and Mama fixes an extra special Christmas dinner. But back to cotton picking. Weather permitting, we should be finished with boll pulling by the end of next week. I asked Papa why he didn't plant more broomcorn and less cotton next year. He said if he planted two different crops, and one of them didn't make, he would still have the other one to count on. So, between now and next fall, I guess I will just have to replace my worn out gloves. Thank goodness, some things have changed down the Wallville Road.

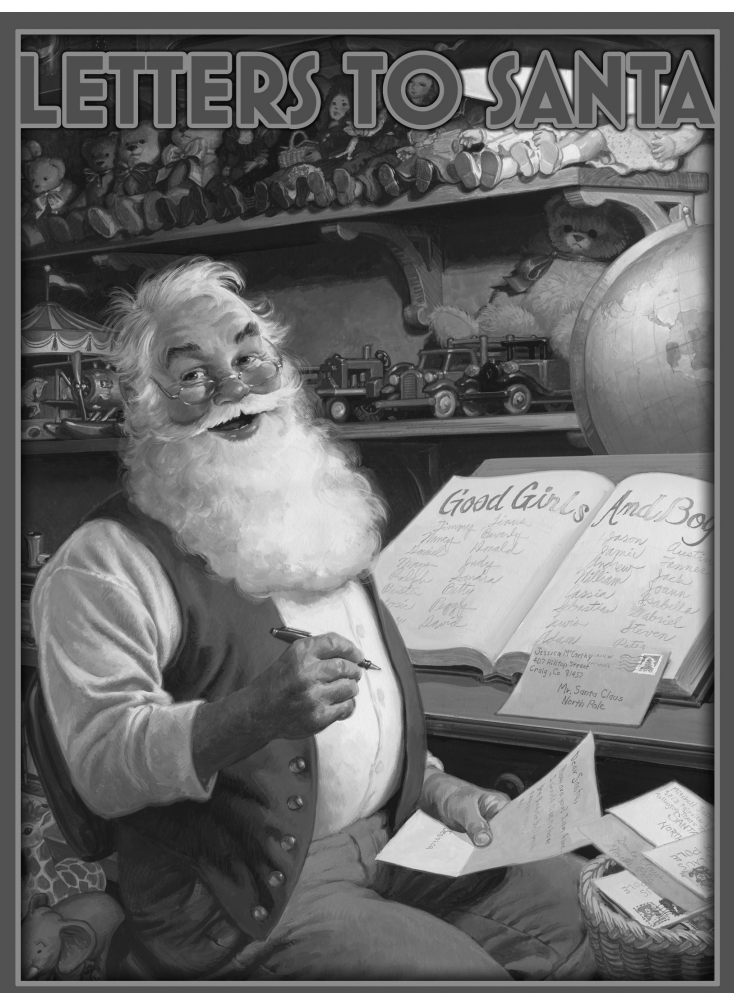
