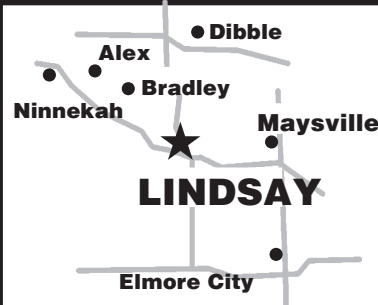

Grady Memorial Receives Award

The prestigious American Diabetes Association "Education Recognition Certificate" for a quality diabetes self-management education program was recently renewed for the Grady Memorial Hospital Diabetes Center of Excellence. The program was first recognized at Grady in 2002. ADA believes that "this program, using standards developed and tested under the auspices of the National Diabetes Advisory Board, offers high-quality education that is an essential component of effective diabetes treatment.

Susan Hankins, RN, Diabetes Education Coordinator and Cindy Wilcox, Registered Dietitian provide both bi-weekly educational classes and individual assistance for those with Diabetes. "Long-term quality of life for diabetic patients is very much impacted by how they control their diet, medications, weight and physical

activities on a daily basis," said Hankins. "Our goal is to help patients fully understand their options and help them develop an individual plan for an improved life. Steps that diabetic patients take each and every day are critical to their future health."

According to the American Diabetes Association, there are 20.8 million people or 7% of the population in the United States who have diabetes. While an estimated 14.6 million have been diagnosed, unfortunately, 6.2 million people are not aware that they have this disease. Each day approximately 4,110 people are diagnosed with diabetes. Many will first learn that they have diabetes when they are treated for one of its life-threatening complications - heart disease and stroke, kidney disease, blindness, and nerve disease and amputation. About 1.5 million new cases of diabetes were diagnosed in people aged

20 years or older in 2005. Diabetes contributed to 224,092 deaths in 2002. Since 1987 the death rate due to diabetes has increased by 45%, while the death rates due to heart disease, stroke, and cancer have declined.

Programs like Grady Memorial apply for recognition voluntarily. Those that achieve recognition status have a staff of knowledgeable health professionals who can provide participants with comprehensive information about diabetes management. "The process gives our staff a national standard by which to measure the quality of services we provide," said Hankins, "and that is important for our patients health."

OKLAHOMA BOOKS OKLAHOMA READS OKLAHOMA PART II

Part of the Oklahoma Centennial Celebration was the Oklahoma Reads Oklahoma program. From 2004 to 2007, four books were chosen as winners of the Oklahoma Reads Oklahoma Award. The 2004 Award winner was The Honk and Holler Opening Soon by Billie Letts. The 2005 award winner was Walking the Choctaw Road by Tim Tingle. In 2006, the award winner was The Saints and Sinners of Okay County by Dayna Dunbar. The final winner in 2007 was Fire in Beulah by Rilla Askew.

of Santa Fe in New Mexico and a master's degree in Spiritual Psychology from the University of Santa Monica in California. She has written screenplays and has been a member of a film production team.

Dayna Dunbar weaves an unusual and entertaining story in The Saints and Sinners of Okay County. It is the summer of 1976, and while the rest of Oklahoma celebrates the bicentennial, Aletta Honor, the main character in the novel, has much more on her mind than flags and fireworks. She is pregnant with her fourth child, flat broke, and hasn't seen her no-good husband, Jimmy, in weeks.

In her home town of Okay, it is Czech Festival time. Aletta decides to bake kolaches and sell them from her front lawn to make money for groceries. As she sells her kolaches, a woman touches her hand in sympathy. Aletta never touches anyone outside of her own family. If she does, she gets psychic visions of their lives and futures. Her psychic visions

started when she was a young girl. Now Aletta sees a vision about the woman who touches her hand. She sees the woman in a tragic accident and gives her a warning that will save her life.

In desperation, Aletta decides to go into business as a palm reader, knowing that the people in town will think she is crazy. She puts up a sign in her front yard which reads "Aletta Honor. Psychic Reader. Drop-Ins Welcome." Her visions raise many issues in her small hometown. But doing her readings for people opens a door she thought she had locked long ago, as memories of a terrible event came flooding back. As she deals with the problems of others, she learns to face her own demons in her past.

The final winner of the Oklahoma Reads Oklahoma Award in 2007 was Fire in Beulah by Rilla Askew. In this historical novel, Rilla Askew creates a story set during the 1921 Tulsa Race Riot. In this Centennial year, Oklahomans are still dealing with this tragedy. In Fire in Beulah, Rilla Askew tells a fictional story based on historical accounts of that sad episode in Oklahoma history.

Until recent years, the story of that race riot had been largely forgotten. But in recent years, an investigation has been conducted which suggests that the tragedy was much worse than originally believed. The newspapers at the time reported that four whites and twenty-four blacks had been killed. At the time, the official death toll was set at below 100, most of them black, but there was always doubt about the actual number. Experts now believe that at least 300 people, and perhaps as many as 3,000, died.

The riots began on May 31, 1921, when a mob went to the Tulsa jail with the intent to lynch a black man who had allegedly assaulted a white woman. A Tulsa newspaper reported that a lynching would occur that night. Mobs of blacks and whites converged on the Tulsa courthouse. A black man tried to protect the prisoner, resulting in a white man being killed. Then

novel builds to a violent climax, the two women and their families are caught up in the race riot that forever changed Tulsa. The final 100 pages of the novel are an apocalyptic ending as all of the characters are swept up in a terrible racial tidal wave. This novel presents exciting reading as well as a clear historical picture of this event in our state.

The four books which were awarded the Oklahoma Reads Oklahoma Award are diverse pictures of Oklahoma, its people, and its rich heritage. Along with many other authors, these writers have recorded the Oklahoma experience, part of the saga of our great state.

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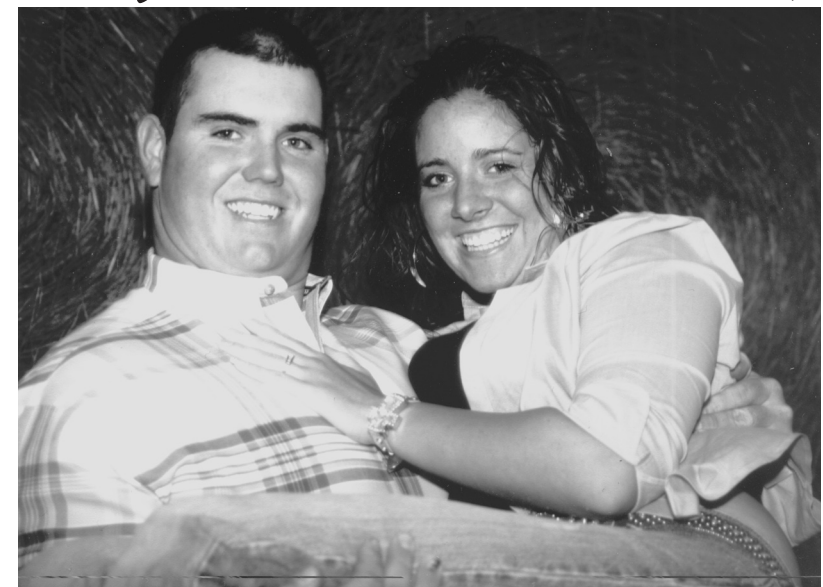
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Ashford~Witt To Marry

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Financial Focus

Investments Can Make Great Holiday Gifts

Now that the holidays are here, you're probably looking around for the right gifts for your loved ones. Of course, as you know, it's not always easy to find gifts that are both meaningful and useful. This year, why not add financial gifts to your shopping list?

What types of financial gifts should you consider giving? Let's look at a few possibilities:

Contributions to Section 529 plans - If you have a child (or grandchild) that will be headed off to college in a few years, you may want to contribute to a Section 529 college savings plan. Your earnings and withdrawals will be exempt from federal taxes as long as the money goes toward paying college costs. There may be additional tax benefits to those who participate in their own state's plan. Also, you can contribute generous amounts to your savings plan. Plus, you can change beneficiaries; if you've been putting money in a Section 529 plan for your child or grandchild, and he or she decides to forego college, you can transfer the money to another family member.

Contributions to an IRA - If you know a loved one has an IRA, consider making a contribution. Many people don't fully fund their IRA each year - so any help you can give toward that goal will be important.

Stocks - Consider giving shares of a company that produces products or services that are used by your intended recipient. If you're going to give away some of your own shares, you'll need to know what you originally paid for the stock, how long you've held it and its fair market value at the date of the gift. Recipients of your gift will need this information to determine gains or losses if they decide to sell the stock. (You'll also need to determine if you have to pay gift taxes. You can give up to \$12,000 per year, free of gift taxes, to as many people as you want; over your lifetime, you can give up to \$1,000,000 without incurring gift taxes.)

Savings Bonds - They may sound old-fashioned and stodgy, but U.S. Savings Bonds can still make nice financial gifts, especially for young people who can use the money in the future. Among the most popular savings bonds are Series EE Bonds, which can be purchased in denominations ranging from \$50 (or \$25.00 for Electronic EE Bonds) to \$10,000. Paper EE Bonds are sold at half their face amount and will increase in value until they are cashed in or reach final maturity in 30 years. Electronic EE Bonds are sold at face value and reach maturity immediately. You can learn more about Series EE Bonds and TIPS, or even purchase them directly, from the Treasury Department's web site devoted to savings bonds: www.savingsbonds.gov.

A financial gift may not be traditional, but it can have a big impact on the recipient's life - and it won't be forgotten after the holidays are over.

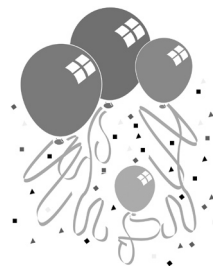

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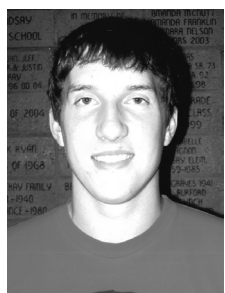
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Leopard News

The Lady Eagles out rebounded the Leopardettes throughout the game, but Lindsay showed a big improvement in the number of turnovers from last season.

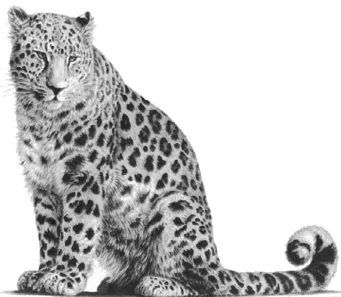
