

Matchbook Memories

DECEMBER 1952

December 1952 brought changes to my life which would carry unending effects. Fiftyseven years ago this month, I was inducted into the U.S. Army. I had no idea on December 12, 1952, that my life was about to change forever. But even now, I can trace how that day set me on a path that would lead to this very day.

At 5:30 a.m. that Friday morning, Hoss Crowe and I got into the car with my brother, A.W., and left Bradley. As we drove up the Bradley hill, the houses were dark, and the town was asleep. Bomhak's Cafe and McCann's Store were dark and deserted. As we passed the Alex exit, we talked about how we would miss Drennan's Cafe. We talked about the night before when we had sat in a booth in the back room, talking to Mollie Sue Drennan and Kathleen Cotton as we listened to the jukebox play Kay Starr's "Wheel of Fortune." We had no idea that our wheel of fortune was about to change our lives forever.

As we arrived in front of the U.S. Post Office across from the Grady County Court House, dawn was breaking in the east. As we stood shivering in frosty air in our jeans and Levi jackets, other young men began to arrive. Soon a Greyhound Bus pulled up to the curb, its exhaust sending clouds of steam into the crisp air. As soon as the door opened, Hoss and I jumped in and settled into a seat near the front. In a short time, other young men climbed aboard, filling the seats. We were soon rolling toward the induction center on North Robinson in Oklahoma City.

The induction center was a whirlwind of confusion. We were herded into rooms, bombarded with forms to fill out and sign, and told to line up in single file. We were told to undress for our physical examination. As we stood shivering in the large room, doctors punched, probed, and prodded us. Those who had a pulse were told to get our clothes back on and go into the next room. There we were told to raise our right hands and recite the oath of allegiance. As we lowered our hands, we became members of the U.S. Army.

Later in the afternoon, we boarded a bus for Fort Sill. We arrived after dark and were assigned to tents with doubledeck bunks. After we drew our bedding, Hoss and I chose bunks along the wall. I took the top bunk, and Hoss took the bottom bunk. Then, about 8:00 p.m., we were marched, even though we didn't know how to march, to a large mess hall where we dined on cold cuts, bread, and coffee.

As we returned to our tents, we began to meet our tentmates. One of our tentmates was a quiet young Black man from Tatums, Oklahoma, named Willie Winslett. I had never talked to a Black person in my life. I am sure Willie had not had much contact with white people. Since Hoss had grown up in Mississippi, he had been around Black people all of his life. As we played poker that night, Willie sat silently watching. Before the week was over, Willie was our friend.

At 9:55 p.m., a sergeant stuck his head in the tent door and yelled, "Lights out in five minutes." Five minutes later, we were sitting in the dark. Hoss and I fired up our Zippo lighters and found our way to bed. In what seemed like only a few minutes, someone blew a whistle, turned on the lights, and yelled, "Fall out!" I was not quite awake. I asked Hoss what the guy said. Hoss answered, "He said 'fall out,' but he must have been joking. It's not even daylight," When the sergeant came back five minutes later and we were not dressed, we found out that he meant what he said.

The next week, we drew our uniforms, took batteries of tests, and filled out preference forms for the kind of training we preferred. Hoss asked for infantry training. I asked for engineer training. Hoss was sent to Camp Stoneman, California. I was assigned to Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri. We left Fort Sill on Friday morning, December 19, 1952. I went out one door of the tent, and Hoss went out the other. The last time I saw Hoss, his barracks bag was stuck in the tent door, and he was saying some blunt words about it. I never saw Hoss again. Two years ago, I made sure that his obituary was printed in The Lindsay News after he died in Texas, where he had a career in the oil fields.

My two years in the U.S. Army changed my life forever. I learned many things that I did not want to do in the future. I qualified for the G.I. Bill, which would pay my way through college. I had many adventures in Korea, where I grew up in many ways.

On Saturday, December 12, I was in Oklahoma City at a gun show with my son, Chad, and my grandson, Walker. As I passed one of the display tables, I picked up an MI rifle. As I held that weapon, I remembered that day 57 years ago when I took the oath to become a soldier. I thought about my Bradley friends who entered the Army that fall. From September to December in 1952, Boyd English, Loyd English, Gary Word, Hoss Crowe, and I all entered the Army. All of the others have left this earth. I am the last one remaining. I miss my friends and those long ago times when the future lay shining before us. Now, as the shadows lengthen, I remember those days long ago and the ones who shared those good times.

New Laws to Aid Oklahomans By state Rep. Lisa J. Billy

show legislators can advance worthwhile measures that will aid Oklahomans without new spending during a down economy.

Among the roughly 200 new laws are the following:

•House Bill 2026 creates a core benefits package for young, healthy Oklahomans to purchase cheaper insurance policies free of the cost increases created by the state's 36 mandates. The bill also creates an insurance hub to help match Oklahomans to private insurance plans that fit their needs.

•House Bill 1603 puts in place landmark lawsuit reform, which will help reduce health care costs for all Oklahomans, reverse a doctor and nurse shortage trend and attract business and economic development to our state. The bill caps noneconomic damages except in cases of gross negligence, which will bring added certainty to the system and help cut down on frivolous lawsuits.

•House Bill 1114 bans human cloning in Oklahoma.

•Senate Bill 135 enacts a plan to increase the number of therapists serving children with autism.

•House Bill 1595 makes it illegal to abort a child based on the baby's gender and implements new reporting requirements. The data collected will help officials better understand the situations leading women to have abortions and develop policies that help those women avoid reaching that point. (Unfortunately, the law is currently in limbo due to a legal challenge brought by abortion supporters.)

taking effect is House Bill OK 73105.

Several new laws 2174, which increases financial recently took effect that transparency during the adoption process and prevents crooked lawyers from extorting adoptive families. The law requires public reporting of adoption expenses and that only one prospective adoptive family at a time may be billed

> of Human Services has a code that adoption agencies must follow, there has been no oversight of the attorneys involved in adoptions. As a result, a May 2006 multicounty grand jury report found that some adoptive parents had been forced to pay for automobiles, car parts, traffic tickets, court costs in unrelated criminal cases, driver's license reinstatement fees, television sets and utility bills - all masked as "adoption costs."

> According to the grand jury report, the haphazard regulation of "adoption expenses" has created an atmosphere where some women and their attorneys effectively sold children.

> That is unacceptable, which is why I was proud to

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

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

"She is very talented, and stepped up and played anywhere we put her. I wish her the best of luck in college."




